

Tyger Lair...

The Mansfield Tygers were forced to play football without yard-eating Henry Weaver for the first time in three years last night.

And the once-beaten Bengals came out of a sea of mud with a shining new reputation as a solid football team.

"The boys suffered a short letdown after Weaver's injury," Coach Bill Doolittle said last night. "However, they played more as a team than ever before. The boys kept their poise — they were real tremendous."

Weaver was hurt early in the game but contributed a 90-yard run on one of his three plays before being taken to General Hospital. He helped the Tygers roll up a sizable 348 net yards.

Don Cole enjoyed his finest hour. The 180-pound senior played the entire way on offense and defense and did everything expected of a complete football player.

With the help of a 75-yard run on an option he piled up 136 yards in seven carries — the second best over-all performance of any Tyger this season. Five of his runs were over 10 yards. His running on the option and on bootlegs left Woodward defenders grasping at air.

Seven different Tyger backs gained 20 or more yards and Doolittle found a surprise package in Tom Curl, who had been a third-string fullback most of the season. After Weaver's injury Curl ran from right halfback for the first time in varsity play and ground out 77 yards in 12 carries.

He had carried the ball only four times previously all season. Bill Mitchell was the No. 4 ball carrier with three tries for 32 yards.

Curl had trouble though on punting situations.

Booting for the first time in varsity play, he saw two wide passes from center roll away from him and another boot was blocked when his protection crumbled.

Curl got even with the board when one of his kicks traveled 40 yards and another Woodward ball carriers with 40.

Linebacker Jim Wareham, a 160-pound senior, gave the Woodward backs fits with his blitzing tactics.

Wareham also kicked his third straight extra point.

Willie Mitchell topped the Woodward ball carriers with 67 yards in eight tries and Roger Truss had 57 in 18.

Bands of both schools played at halftime and before the game.

The Tyger musicians saluted the Dad's Night turnout. They greeted the dads with "For He's a Jolly Good Fellow" and the mothers with "I Want a Girl Just Like the Girl That Married Dear Old Dad."

The coldest person as rain swept Arlin Field last night just had to be Tyger assistant Bob Geiger.

Geiger appeared on the sidelines in a short-sleeved summer shirt just as he has in all nine Tyger games. Must be a message there somewhere.

TIFFIN — With Whippet Halfback Chuck Wetz scoring two touchdowns within 21 seconds in the fourth quarter, the Shelby Whippets came from behind to dump the Tiffin Columbian Tornadoes in a sea of mud.

Fullback Howard Kerchner raced 43 yards through the mud to score the Columbian touchdown with 10:31 left in the third quarter, after the two elevens had battled without a score in the first half.

Wetz raced the final 29 yards for Shelby's first touchdown after a 40-yard drive with 5:29 left in the fourth period.

The Whippets tried an on-sides kick-off which hit Tornado guard Dick Wetz and was recovered by a Whippet. On the first play, Wetz raced 49 yards to clinch the victory.

It was the seventh time that the Whippets have dumped the Tornadoes since Columbian entered the NOL in 1954, replacing Crestline, against only one loss. Columbian has never defeated Shelby on the Tiffin field.

The Whippet and Tornado Marching Bands turned in good performances at the intermission between the halves.
