

Truckers Lose Finale To Upper Sandusky; Flyers Romp Over Cantius

Upper Victory Snaps 19 Game Losing Streak

Almost every bell in the town of Upper Sandusky rang last night as the joyful Rams' rooters after 19 games finally found something to cheer about. Meanwhile, in the Norwalk High dressing room, there was sadness and despair. The reason for the different attitudes — Upper Sandusky snapped a 19-game losing streak in dropping the Nannmen by a 16-8 count.

The Truckers, who started almost a completely new squad, never led in the game although a 48-yard touchdown run by fullback Jim Wise and his two point conversion managed to tie it early in the fourth quarter.

The game was played in a hard rain for the first half with numbers on both teams almost invisible after the first series of plays. This made for rough going on both offense and defense. Consequently the better part of the first half was played in the middle 40 yards of the field.

The Truckers' deepest penetration in the first 24 minutes was to their own 40-yard line. Actually they never had much of a chance to handle the ball to much more as they ran just 16 plays during this time.

Upper didn't do a lot better. On their second series of plays, they moved the ball to the Truckers 36-yard line and then ran out of gas due to a fourth down play that was thrown for a nine-yard loss when the quarterback fumbled the snap.

Score After Kickoff

The Rams took the second half kickoff and behind the great running of fullback John Roth, marched 58 yards to break the scoreless deadlock. All told, it took the Rams 16 plays but the hard work and mud eating paid off when Roth busted into the end zone. A pass play from quarterback Bob Wolfe to end Mike McConnell was good for the extra points.

The Truckers bounced right back, however, and in six plays found themselves right back in the game. It all started when the Truckers returned the kickoff to their own 30-yard line. Three ground plays gained them a first down and then after another short gainer fullback Gregg Maxwell ate up 10 more yards to put the ball on the Rams' 48. This proved to be the only time that Norwalk had possession of the ball in Upper Sandusky territory.

Wise Goes 48

Alternating fullback Jim Wise then gave the Norwalk fans something to cheer about as he took a handoff and went up the middle of the Rams line for about 15 yards and then cut to his right and down the sidelines. He was tackled just as he got into the end zone and the ball squirted out of his hands. The officials ruled that he fumbled the ball in the end zone and that it rolled out of the end zone before it was recovered. Wise then added the extra points with another run up the mid-

die and the game started anew with each club having eight points.

The Truckers got their biggest break just seconds later in the game as they made an offside kick work as an Upper lineman bobbled the ball and gave a Truckers a shot at the greasy piskin.

The break turned out to be a nightmare for the Truckers, however, as they fumbled the ball on their second play of the series with 120-pound halfback Dennis Mundy recovering. Less than eight minutes remained in the game when they started off on their winning touchdown jaunt.

Halfback Dan Trease started it off for the winners with a 15-yard pickup. Roth then moved the ball to the Norwalk 25 on the next play.

Roth was the big ground gainer in this drive, picking up all of the yardage once the Rams moved inside the 20-yard stripe.

The drive was nearly stopped on two occasions by penalties but Roth managed to blast into the end zone from the one on a third down and goal to go situation. A pass from Wolfe to halfback Dan Trease was good for the points after and to all intents and purposes, this was the game.

Norwalk returned the kickoff to their own 43-yard line but failed to get a first down and gave the ball to the Rams after an attempted run for short yardage was nipped. The Rams nearly managed to score again and had the ball on the Truckers four-yard line before time ran out in the game.

Future Brighter

The Truckers can look forward to a much brighter future after the showing last night by some of the sophomores and juniors. The Nannmen looked good, especially on defense. Their offense will have to have plenty of polish but with runners like Wise and Marcum Fowler back in the fold for next year, Coach Sam Nan can expect much better things.

The lone Bucyrus score came in the second period when quarterback Bill Burham connected with Joe Sandlin on a four yard aerial.

Cofeatured on the same program is the starting heat of the \$80,000 American Trotting Classic which features the rematching of the two top 3-year-olds Harlan Dean and Duke Rodney.

Ackerman Leads Saints To New Winning Mark

A rock-ribbed defense which cracked only once and an offense that struck in streaks paced Norwalk St. Paul to a surprising 36-6 Friday night victory over Cleveland St. John Cantius. The Flyers ignored a cold, driving rain to smear its highly-rated opponent into the mud.

The victory gave Coach Bob Irvin's Flyers the best winning record in the history of St. Paul's high school. Last night's win was the seventh in nine outings, giving the 1961 edition of the Flyers more victories than any other in the school's history. The previous high had been six by the 1956 St. Paul team. The Flyers now stand at seven wins, one loss and one tie for the season.

The Flyer defensive line held the visitors to zero yardage on the ground in the first half and gave up a total of only 44 for the game. The Cleveland team actually gained 77 yards but was thrown for 33 yards in losses.

Goes For Broke

St. John had a little more success though the air, throwing an early scare into the Flyers until the secondary took precautions against the pass.

After the opening kickoff St. Paul marched 49 yards to the Cantius 16 before losing the ball on a fumble recovered by fullback Tom Holz. With the ball deep in their own territory the visitors didn't hesitate to take to the air. After one unsuccessful pass attempt and a one-yard loss on the ground, St. John quarterback Mike Bober launched one of two consecutive passes that moved the ball to the Norwalk 38.

After a first down on the ground, the only one of the first half for St. John, the Cantius attack appeared stalled by a 15-yard holding penalty. Bober then uncorked a 44-yard scoring pass to Bob Bolin for a touchdown with a minute and 52 seconds left in the first period.

The only crack in the ground defense by the Flyers came in the opening moments of the third period. This brief Cantius gaining spree was the only other serious threat in the game for the visitors. St. John traveled 64 yards on 16 plays, all on the ground, before stalling on the St. Paul one. With third and one to score, Cantius was first held on third down and then halfback Joe Gilson was thrown for a one-yard loss on fourth down with a rush from Denny Hackathorne, Jerry and Jack Rospert.

In this one ground drive of the game for Cantius Tom Stachowski carried the ball eight times and gained 34 yards.

Ackerman Tops

For the Flyers it was the slashing drives of Terry Ackerman which provided the spark. Ackerman tallied three touchdowns, one on a 45-yard dash, and set up another with

a 42-yard run. The slender fullback averaged over 10 yards a carry on 176 yards in 16 punches at the line.

After fighting off a severe case of shell-shock from the early passing antics of the visitors the Irvinmen erupted in grand style in the second period. In this frame the Flyers had the ball four times and scored three of these times. The final touchdown on a five-yard Ackerman run came after time had run off on the clock. The play was started with only a few seconds remaining. It took St. Paul a little over a minute in the second period to score its first touchdown.

The third period was largely monopolized by the Cantius ground drive, but St. Paul regained complete control in the final stanza. The final two St. Paul touchdowns were scored in the last four minutes of the game.

Only six seconds were left to be played when Tom Seitz quarterback-sneaked over with the last tally, his second from the one-yard line for the night. Seitz also set up the next to last

St. Paul touchdown with the interception of a Bober pass at the St. John 40. He returned the ball to the 29-yard line and a personal foul penalty against the losers moved the ball to the St. John 14. Three plays later Ron Ware went in from the four-yard stripe.
