

Needed or Not Vermilion LC Title Bid Getting Help

Middies Fall Two Behind As Sailors Rip Amherst, 50-0

Vermilion's long wait for a Lakeland Conference football championship is just about over as the Sailors pounded Amherst and, for the second week in succession, received help as well to clinch at least a share of the title.

Jerry Martin's veteran club smothered the Comets by a 50-0 margin and coupled with Clear-

view's 32-12 win over Midway gave them a two-game lead over the Clippers and Middies with a pair of conference games still remaining.

Vermilion, which plays New London next week and closes out its season at Huron on Nov. 9, coasted to its seventh consecutive win and sixth straight in the Lakeland.

Giant Back Out

NEW YORK (AP) — Dick Peterson, defensive halfback of the New York Giants, was on the doubtful list for Sunday's game with Washington after suffering a torn rib cartilage and a possible chip fracture in Sunday's game with Detroit.

In other action Friday, Wellington snapped a nine-game losing streak by cashing in on two third-period fumbles to topple Huron, 14-8, and New London edged Avon Lake by an 8-6 count with Bill Damron accounting for all of the Wildcats points.

MIKE BROTHERS set up Vermilion's first score by returning an intercepted pass to the Comet

Capital Loses PC Gridder For Year

PORT CLINTON (AP)—Charles (Chuck) Nielsen, sophomore gridder at Capital University, is out of action for the remainder of the season, with a broken arm and nose sustained in last week's non-conference game with Wittenberg. Nielsen, a member of the undefeated 1960 Port Clinton High School squad and a guard, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Amos Nielsen of rural Port Clinton and received several honors in high school.

Amherst drove to the Vermilion in the second period, but stalled on the 24 and the Sailors promptly marched 76 yards in 13 plays with Brothers getting the last 4 to make it 14-0 at intermission. Again Amherst lost the ball on downs in the third canto and the Sailors went 55 yards in 3 plays with Schisler covering the entire distance on another keeper and Frank Homitz cracked over for the PAT.

STARTING A WILD fourth period in which the Sailors hit paydirt four times, Brothers hauled in a pichout from his cousin, Schisler, to ramble 27 on the first play of the period and Homitz again added the bonus points.

Amherst was forced into a kicking situation minutes later, but the snap from center got away and Dan Williams recovered on the 18. Five plays later Homitz darted into paydirt from the 8.

The next score came when a host of Sailors charged in to block a Comet punt attempt and guard Ron Palmer picked up the ball and raced 25 yards into the end zone.

The final touchdown came with 1:04 left on the first play after a recovered fumble, with sophomore Bill Nowacki going around left end for 25 yards.

Vermilion netted 338 yards rushing with most of the yardage coming up the middle and around left end, while Amherst managed just 60 net yards on the ground.

HURON NOW stands at 2-5-1 on the season and 1-3-1 in the conference as Paul Greene's club continues to be plagued with injuries.

The Tigers were without ace half back Walt Taylor from the start, but lost the services of starting halfback Joe Silardi and veteran end John Bowers in the first half. Bowers was taken to the hospital for X-rays.

The Tigers grabbed an 8-0 lead in the second quarter when Tom Koehler slammed over from 1 yard out to cap a 68-yard drive which took 6 plays. Jim Cunningham's pass to Bowers added the bonus points.

The score remained 8-0 at halftime, but the Tigers fumbled twice in the third period and each time the Dukes recovered and went in to score.

Huron fumbled on its own 35 early in the period and Terry Waite recovered. Seven plays later quarterback Bo Skelton cracked over from the 1 after picking up 21 yards to the 2 just two plays earlier. Skelton also added the PAT to knot the count.

On the first play after the kickoff, Huron fumbled again and Gerald Waite recovered this one on the 17. Seven plays later Skelton blasted over from the 5 after the Tigers had apparently stopped the drive.

Huron threatened in the waning seconds of play and advanced to the Wellington 5, but was pushed back to the 11 and Cunningham's fourth-down pass was intercepted by Tom Gill in the end zone as time ran out.

The Tigers picked up 183 yards in 40 rushes to 149 in 46 attempts for the Dukes, but the fumbles gave the hosts an opportunity to score and they cashed in on the chances for their first win in 8 season encounters.

NEW LONDON and Avon Lake clashed in a battle of defenses. The Wildcats pushed across their marker in the second quarter when quarterback Tony Kirkpatrick tossed a 16-yard pass to Damron who picked off the aerial in the end zone with 11:02 left in the half.

The margin of victory came when Damron circled end for the bonus points.

Avon Lake struck for its score in the fourth period with 2:41 remaining as Bill Gammel connected on a short 5-yard pass to Tom Early in the end zone, but Gammel's pass on the PAT attempt failed and New London had a "homecoming" triumph.

The Wildcats fumbled 4 times, but lost only one of them and netted 122 yards on the ground and 183 through the air against the 1961 conference co-champions. The Shoreman managed 237 yards passing on 7 of 12 completions and netted 79 yards rushing.

LAMONT PARKS collared 4 touchdowns as Clearview rebounded from successive defeats at the hands of Vermilion and New London to drop Midway into a tie for the runnerup spot with the Clippers.

Parks plunged over from the 1 on the ninth play after the kickoff, but Midway shot out front with a pair of second-quarter touchdowns as Bob Stacey dashed around end for 34 yards with 9:34 left and 5 minutes later swept to put the Middies out front by a 12-6 margin at halftime.

BOSTON (AP) — The Boston Patriots are right on the course charted for them by Coach Mike Holovak and Gino Cappelletti as moving at a record scoring pace.

Boston began the American Football League weekend Friday night by defeating Oakland 26-16, the Raiders' 13th straight loss.

The Patriots have a 5-2 record at the halfway mark of the season and Holovak has returned to his original prediction that "a 10-4 record can win this eastern division title."

Houston, division co-leader with Boston prior to the game, plays the first of successive dates with tough Dallas Sunday on Oiler turf. The other games Sunday find Buffalo at western division pacesetter Denver and San Diego at New York.

CHICAGO (AP)—Heavyweight champion Sonny Liston is ready to live up to his promise to give Floyd Patterson a rematch "where and when he wants to fight me again."

Liston made his first appearance in Chicago Friday since winning the title from Patterson in the first round of their Sept. 25 meeting and ended reports that former Notre Dame football coach Frank Leahy would become his new manager.

"I don't need no manager," said the champion, Liston added in reference to Leahy, Liston added: "What fight can he get me?"

Holding a quickly called press conference in a downtown restaurant, Liston said he'd rather fight someone other than Patterson, but "I'll live up to my word and fight Patterson—I think he'll come out of his shell soon and say where and when he wants to fight me again."

Liston denied reports that he would meet Patterson in Miami in February.

Gators Could Spring Upset

Florida, a two-time loser and a 13-point underdog, just might be the team to extend the startling string of upsets that has spiced the college football season.

It would seem that Louisiana State, ranked sixth in the nation and unbeaten but tied once, has everything going its way in the game against the Gators tonight.

The Bengals have allowed only 16 points in five games, got past tough Kentucky 7-0 last week and haven't lost on their home field in two years.

But coach Ray Graves' Gators have rebounded smartly after losses to Georgia Tech and Duke. They ripped Texas A&M 42-8 and pounded Vanderbilt 42-7 in their last two games and just might find LSU looking ahead to its big one against Mississippi next week.

What's more, the last time the Bengals lost at home was to Florida, 13-10 two years ago.

It figures to be a test between LSU's stern defense, the running of Florida's Bob Hoover, Lindy Infante, Sam Mack and Larry Dupree and the passing of the Gator's Tom Shannon.

The other ranked teams in action tonight, Texas, Mississippi and Arkansas, all figure to have a much easier time of it.

Top-ranked Texas, unbeaten in five starts and safely past the big test against Arkansas, is a 13½ point pick over winless Rice, Mississippi, 4-0 and ranked seventh, is a four touchdown choice over Vanderbilt, which has a 13-game losing string going. Arkansas, 4-1 and No. 9, is a 20-point pick over Hardin-Simmons (1-5) at Little Rock.

The other ranked teams were in action this afternoon with the key tests pitting eighth-ranked Washington (4-0-1) against a rough Oregon (4-1) squad and fifth-ranked Wisconsin (4-0) against powerful but unpredictable Ohio State (2-2).

The others had Tulsa visiting second-ranked and unbeaten Alabama, third-ranked Northwestern hosting Notre Dame, Southern California, No. 4 and 4-0, visiting winless Illinois, and 10th-ranked Michigan State at Indiana.

Dayton edged Detroit 13-12 in the only major game Friday night. It was the first victory of the season for the Flyers, while Detroit has yet to win.
