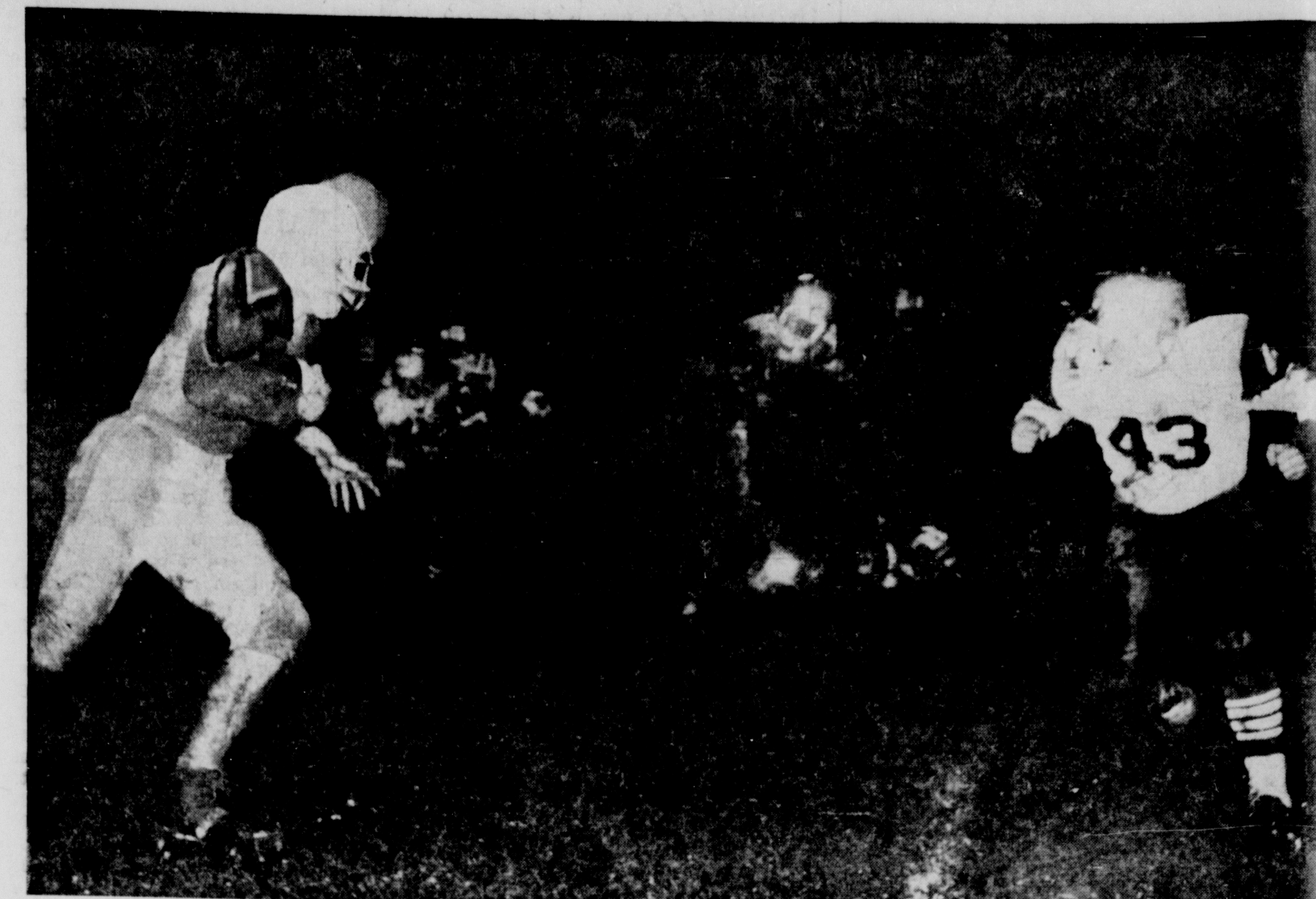


Truckers Blitzed By Whippets, 42-0

Bellevue, Tiffin, Upper Share Other League Wins

After the second week of Northern Ohio League play, the Shelby Whippets and the Bellevue Redmen are the only teams left without a defeat. The Whippets headed the Truckers a 42-0 lacing last night while Willard felt the wrath of Bellevue backs to the tune of 30-14. In the other two encounters, Tiffin Columbian blasted Bucyrus, 34-0 while Upper Sandusky has an overall season record of 3-1 after dropping Galion, 6-0.

This places Bellevue, Shelby and Upper in a three-way tie for first place in the N.O.L.

TIFFIN 34 - Bucyrus 0
TIFFIN — The entertaining Tiffin Columbian Tor-nadoes awoke from a deep sleep last night as they plastered the Bucyrus Redmen with both mud and scoring in rolling to a 34-0 victory.

The winners had a big lead in every statistical department as they scored at least one touchdown in every quarter.

Halfback Barry Spoon opened the scoring for the winners in the first quarter with a four-yard plunge. His try for the points after was a failure.

Halfback Tom Young then made it 12-0 in the second quarter when he blasted into the end zone from two yards out. Later in the period, quarterback Harry Bozarth hit the middle of the Bucyrus line for a yard and six more points. A pass to end Tony Simpson made it a 20-0 game at halftime.

Margaretta Splashes By Wildcats, 8-6

CASTALIA — The Margaretta Polar Bears were first with the most last night and hung on to squeeze out an 8-6 victory over the New London Wildcats.

Statistically-wise the Wildcats led in all departments.

The Bears scored on a combination pass and run play which covered 15 yards. Quarterback Dan West fired a strike to his end Paul Messenberg for the tally. Fullback Bob Harple lunged for the points after.

Margaretta fumbled a New London punt in the first quarter and the Cats recovered on the Bears' 15 yard line. A few running player later Bill Danvon dove into the end zone from the one. The try for the points after fell short.

Rodney Stover was forced to the sidelines midway through the second quarter with a dislocated left shoulder.

Margaretta had one more scoring threat going in the fourth quarter as they raced the clock down field. A pass into the end zone from 10 yards out fell short of its mark.

The winners picked up another touchdown in the third quarter as Bozarth hit end Carl Assenheimer on a 13-yard aerial. The star quarterback then ran for the extra points.

Young scored the final touchdown on a three yard run.

BELLEVUE 30 - WILLARD 14
WILLARD — The Bellevue Redmen found the runnings considerably tougher but still scored their 14th straight victory last night when they bombed the entertaining Willard Flashes, 30-14.

Fullback Wayne Warden scored the first Bellevue touchdown in the second quarter when he went in from the one-yard line. Halfback Marc McClain picked up the extra points. McClain then did a little running of his own when he raced 55 yards for the Redmen's second six pointer. Rhudy added the extra point.

Rhudy went 40 yards for the winners' first score in the second half and then dashed 51 more in the final quarter. A pass play from quarterback Jim Culler to end Tom Lope-man picked up the points after.

Wynn Misses Another Shot At 300th Win

NEW YORK (UPI)—It's going to take old trumper Early Wynn a week or two to decide whether reaching the 300-victory mark is really worth punishing himself through another spring training.

Wynn's chance to become the 14th pitcher in baseball history to win 300 games evaporated for this year at least Friday night when he and the Chicago White Sox suffered a 7-3 loss to the New York Yankees.

The 42-year-old right-hander carried a 3-1 lead into the last of the seventh inning against the Yankees but Joe Pepitone's two-run pinch-homer tied the score and the Yankees poured over four runs in the eighth.

"I'll make up my mind about next year in a week or two," said Wynn after the disappointing defeat. "I feel okay but it takes a long time for a man of my age to get into pitching shape."

It was the third time Wynn failed in an effort to win his 300th game — a plateau reached by only 13 pitchers in baseball history and last accomplished by a right-handed pitcher when Grover Cleveland Alexander got his 300th win in 1924. Warren Spahn of the Milwaukee Braves and Hall of Fame Lefty Grove are the only living 300-game winners.

Willard scored twice in the final period. Halfback Amos Bolen did it both times. He stole the ball from Culler the first time and went 22 yards for a score and then late in the game he tallied on a 51-yard scoring aerial from quarterback Scott Swamer. Bolen then picked up the PAT after the final touchdown.

UPPER 6 - GALION 0
UPPER SANDUSKY — The Upper Sandusky Rams won their second straight league game last night but again did it by the slimmest of margins. Last week the Rams topped the Truckers, 6-0, and they showed no favoritism to Galion last evening.

The scoring play came on the final play from scrimmage in the game as fullback John Roth went in from four yards out to send a dempened home crowd away with a smile.

The scoring drive lasted 17 plays and was 53 yards in length. Earlier in the quarter, the Rams moved to the 10 yard line before their drive was halted.

Galion never was in contention for a score.

Angels-Indians Doubleheaders End Season

CLEVELAND (UPI) — If the weather cooperates, the Cleveland Indians and the Los Angeles Angels planned to launch a two-day, four-game series at the Lakefront Stadium today.

The two teams were originally scheduled to play a two-nighter Friday, but a steady downpour that already has dumped more than two inches of rain on the city forced a postponement.

The Tribe then rescheduled the rainout affair as a doubleheader for today and another one for Sunday — the final day of the American League season.

The Tribesmen, who are in sixth place sporting a one-game bulge over Baltimore, need a sweep of the four games to end the season with a 500 mark.

The Angels, however, also can use a sweep in order to deadlock Minnesota for runnerup honors in the loop.

Cleveland was to start Dick Donovan and Jim Grant (6-10) today. The veteran Donovan, who has been the steadiest performer for the Tribe, will be after his 21st victory of the year.

Handling the pitching chores for the West Coast team will be Ohioan Dean Chance (14-10), who is a strong candidate for rookie of the year honors, and Bo Belinsky (9-11), a southpaw who has chalked up a no-hitter in his rookie season. He also has caused much comment by his off-field antics.

EXPECT GONZALEZ' RETURN
PHILADELPHIA (UPI) — Physicians are confident that outfielder Tony Gonzalez of the Philadelphia Phillies will be in excellent condition for spring training next year.

Gonzalez, who underwent back surgery Sept. 10, was released from Temple University Hospital Friday. He must wear a light cast from chest to hip for two weeks.

SHELBY — Fumbling the ball on six occasions and losing it every time, the Norwalk High Truckers found the muddy terrain and the Shelby Whippets far too much to handle last night as they were handed a 42-0 lacing.

Meanwhile, the Whippets were scoring in every quarter. Halfback Chuck Wetz proved to be their power runner although he scored only the first touchdown. Halfback Dick Miller proved to be the glory runner as he scored two touchdowns and added a pair of extra point runs for a 16-point evening.

Playing in literally a sea of mud, both teams had their troubles keeping their hands on the ball in the early part of the game. Both clubs lost the ball via this route in the first three minutes of play.

Late in the quarter, the Shelby team started its initial drive to paydirt. It came after a Norwalk fumble on their own 30 yard line. After a five yard pickup on the first play, Wetz blasted his way up the middle for 65 yards and the six pointer. Miller then picked up the points after with 2:16 left in the first quarter.

The Truckers then failed to move the ball on two occasions before the Shelby club came up with its second touchdown. On the first occasion, they were forced into a punting situation and on the other, they lost the ball on downs after punter Eric Kohlmeyer was unable to get his kick off and was trapped behind the line for a big loss.

Get Ball On 27
The Whippets took over the pigskin on the Norwalk 27-yard line and in four plays, they had another touchdown racked up on the scoreboard. The TD play came on

a 24-yard pass from quarterback Bill Baldrige to end Bill Ans-pach.

Miller then ran the extra points to make it 16-0 with 6:16 left to play in the half.

After the Truckers were unable to move the ball after the kickoff, the winners put on their longest drive of the night. They got possession of the ball on their own 32 yard line and started to grind it out from there.

It took them eight plays to go the distance, and, as usual, it was Wetz who had his hand in the drive. He carried the ball just twice but in those two attempts he picked up 34 yards.

With just 40 seconds remaining, Miller romped into the end zone from five yards out for the six pointer. Wetz, for the first time, was stopped short for the extra points.

Score After Fumble
The Truckers received to open the second half and on the first play from scrimmage they fumbled, with Shelby recovering. They started their drive on the Truckers' 29 and on the sixth play, Miller went six yards for the touchdown.

With 8:41 left on the clock in the third quarter, the try for the extra points went incomplete.

The same thing happened on the next occasion the locals got their hands on the ball. They fumbled on the first play after the kickoff with tackle Ron Argo recovering on the Truckers' 36.

On the third play from scrimmage, Baldrige hit Jim Henkel for what looked like a touchdown but the referee thought different. A penalty for illegal block was called by the referee. For the Truckers it was just misery prolonged for a moment. Three plays later, the same combination got together and this time there was no penalty. The touchdown play covered 34 yards. Baldrige then picked up the extra point on an end run to hike the score to 36-0.

Run In Substitutes
The Whippets then substituted freely on both offense and defense in the latter part of the game.

Their final drive came midway through the final quarter. It started after the Truckers lost the ball on downs on the Shelby 21-yard line. Striking for sizable yardage, both on the ground and in the air, the Whippets moved the pigskin to the Norwalk 15-yard line in eight plays.

Wetz then had the honor for three straight carries and he responded for 11 yards to move the ball to the four. Substitute halfback Danny Weaver then went in from the four for the final TD. His try for the points after was a failure.

Statistics Margin
The Whippets had a big margin in almost all of the statistics. They led in first downs, 15-4, net yards gained, 262-74, and in passing, 43-17.

The muddy field did little to help the locals. Their backs need good footing and have to rely on breakaway speed to go for the scores. Meanwhile, the Shelby backs used bull strength to plow through the line.

pion of 1961, Alabama is off and running with a 2-0 record this season and the next thing you know they'll be calling coach Paul Bryant "Shut the Gates of Mercy Bryant" because 'Bama's brutes have out-scored their opposition, 79-6, in two straight victories, including Friday night's 44-6 romp over Tulane.

The Tide made it look easy with a 36-point first-half which piled up a 36-6 lead and enabled it to coast the rest of the way. Halfback Butch Wilson scored on runs of seven and one yards to give 'Bama a 14-0 lead in the first period and then quarterback Joe Namath scored one touchdown and passed for two others to complete the rout.

Breaks Scoreless Skein
Tulane managed to score the first touchdown against Alabama in 35 quarters when Ted Miller passed six yards to Clem Dellen-gier in the second quarter but all it did was infuriate the 'bama offense.

Virginia Military Institute scored a 21-0 victory over Richmond in another Friday night game which helped to kick off the second big weekend of the college season. Halfback Donnie White scored two touchdowns—

one on a seven-yard run and the other on a 63-yard return of an interception—to pace VMI.

The Saturday day and night schedule sends just about all the national powers into action and includes the attractive nationally-televized game between Notre Dame and Oklahoma (CBS, 4:30 p.m. EDT) at Norman, Okla.

Army, Penn State, Louisiana State, Mississippi, Minnesota, Iowa, Michigan State and Washington are the favorites in some of the other key games.

The Notre Dame-Oklahoma clash brings together two teams that are in the process of rebuilding toward the national stature they knew a few years ago. It's the season opener for Notre Dame while Oklahoma will be seeking its second straight victory after last Saturday's 7-3 conquest of Syracuse.

Army Over Syracuse
Army, which walloped Wake Forest in its opener, faces much stronger opposition in Syracuse but is a four-point favorite. The Cadets will once again put on exhibition the famous three-plateon system of coach Paul Dietzel which helped to build LSU into a national power.

Penn State, possibly the strong-

est team in the East, rocked Navy a week ago and is a solid 19-point choice over the Air Force Academy; LSU is a 14-point favorite over Rice and Mississippi is picked by 17 points over Kentucky.

Big Ten teams are playing four big intersectional games and are favored in three of them. Michigan State is a 13-point favorite over Stanford, Iowa is 12 over Oregon State and Minnesota is a slim one-point pick over Missouri but Illinois is a 15-point underdog to Rose Bowl champion Washington.

Two of the best passers in the country oppose each other when Miami, Fla., faces Texas Christian. Miami's George Mira, a brilliant performer against Pittsburgh two weeks ago, will be pitchin' 'em against 6-foot, 7-inch Sonny Gibbs, who led TCU to an upset of Kansas last week.

The national schedule also includes SMU vs. California, Vanderbilt vs. Georgia, Columbia vs. Brown, Princeton vs. Rutgers, Auburn vs. Tennessee, Duke vs. South Carolina, Florida vs. Georgia Tech, Ohio State vs. North Carolina, Arkansas vs. Tulsa, Oregon vs. Utah and Wyoming vs. Washington State.

Musial Cuts Los Angeles Lead To 1½ Games; Frisco-Colts Game Rained Out

Yup, those back-sliding Dodgers lost another one Friday night and now they lead by only a game-and-a-half.

Stan (The Man) Musial, and old thorn from their by-gone Brooklyn days, was instrumental in doing the Dodgers in.

But at least he isn't playing favorites. He also killed the Giants with his bat earlier in the week.

While Musial was helping the St. Louis Cardinals to a 10-inning 3-2 victory over the Dodgers Friday night, the second-place Giants were sitting around chewing their fingernails over a rain-caused postponement of their game with the Houston Colts.

The Giants, who have three more games left, will play a double-header with the Colts today and the Dodgers, with only two more games remaining, can still clinch a tie for the pennant by beating the Cardinals tonight. If the Giants should lose one of their games today, the worst the Dodgers can get is a tie; and if the Giants lose both then they're mathematically dead.

Musial singled home a big run when he put the Cardinals ahead, 2-1, in the fifth inning. Stan the Man also contributed another single in the 10th when Charlie James drove in the winning run with the Cardinals' third single of the inning.

With Ron Perranoski pitching, Curt Flood led off the 10th with

a single and Musial singled him to third. Bobby Gene Smith then ran for Musial and Flood was out at the plate on Ken Boyer's fielder's choice.

Smith took second on the play and after Bill Wertz forced Boyer, James singled to right field scoring Smith.

In other National League games the Cincinnati Reds defeated the Philadelphia Phillies, 7-3, the Pittsburgh Pirates downed the Milwaukee Braves, 8-2, and the Chicago Cubs edged the New York Mets, 3-2.

Most of the attention in the American League was centered around Early Wynn, who made a heroic effort for his 300th victory

but failed to achieve it when the New York Yankees came from behind to beat the Chicago White Sox, 7-3. In other AL action, Minnesota blasted Baltimore, 11-5. Detroit topped Kansas City, 5-3, in a game limited to 6½ innings by rain, and a twin bill between the Cleveland Indians and Los Angeles Angels was washed out by rain.
