St. Paul's Flyers last night came of age as a power football team, combining a devious attack and a stone-wall defense into a 44-0 victory over Avon. This was a lopsided conquest of the same team which held St. Paul's to a 0-0 tie a year ago.

Despite the overwhelming conquest the Flyers found one thorn in their side, fullback Gary Wojciechowski, who carried the ball on 22 of Avon's 40 running plays and accounted for a personal yardage total of 73 yards.

Despite this one-man gang the Flyers defense held the visitors to a mere 10 yards net gain in the first half and a total net yardage gain of 83 for the contest.

The overwhelming victory advanced the Bob Irvin-coached Flyers offensive total to 70 points in two games, while holding the opposition scoreless.

The statistics, with the exception of the lone Avon shining light, Wojciechowski, were as one-sided as the final score of the contest. St. Paul's added a sharp passing attack on seven completions in 11 attempts to its surging ground game. The Flyers totaled 268 net yards — 133 on rushing plays and 95 through the air.

An alert defense also gathered in the three Avon fumbles, capitalizing each into a touchdown drive. The passing game accounted for three St. Paul touchdowns. The Flyers soared into paydirt on both "grind-em-out" thrusts and the "long bomb." Lightning strikes by the victors came on touchdown plays of 22, 14 and 35 yards. Other scoring plays were of three, five and four yards.

Coach Irvin nearly cleared his bench, falling back on the service of his starters late in the second half primarily for defensive work. Reserves set up one drive and a full reserve team was in control for the final St. Paul touchdown.

Jim Christian, transfer student playing his second game in the red and white, tallied twice, once on a pass from senior quarterback Tom Seitz. Seitz also found the range on a 35-yard scoring pass to Jerry Rospert. Rospert crossed the final strip into paydirt twice.

Poor passes from the Avon center on punt attempts were keys to the early St. Paul scoring. The Flyers capitalized on two bad passes to the punter to account for both of the first quarter Norwalk team tallies. In the early moments of the game Avon suffered a 25-yard loss on fourth down when the pass from center soared over kicker Robert James' head.

St. Paul took over on the Avon 24-yard line and took only seven plays to cash in with Terry Ackerman carrying four times, including a 14-yard dash and the final three-yard plunge. Jerry Rospert added the two extra points by taking a Seitz pitchout and looping around the right end.

There were four minutes and 33 seconds left to play in the first quarter when Ackerman dove across the goal line the first time.

Two minutes and 55 seconds later Jim Wasinski gathered in a Seitz pass on a touchdown play that covered 22 yards. This was set up by a 20-yard loss on another errant center pass over the head of James which gave St. Paul the ball on the Avon 24 yard line.

Avon ventured into St. Paul territory only three times in the game with the deepest penetration coming after the final Flyer touchdown in the last five minutes of the game. This nine-play drive which covered 41 yards was stalled by a fourth down incomplete pass on the St. Paul 13-yard marker. Big play in this desperation push was a 20-yard keeper play gain by quarterback James after a fake to Wojciechowski.

Browns Are Favored By 3 Against New York

The Green Bay Packers will bank on an old reliable formula when they begin defense of their National Football League championship Sunday, but the Cleveland Browns will try something new in their efforts to get back on top.

Green Bay, standing pat with the brilliant talent and the rock-'em-sock-'em attack that won last season, starts the long hard quest for a second straight title against the Minnesota Vikings at Green Bay. The Packers are favored by 17 points.

The Browns, who have made more personnel changes from last season than any of the NFL's contending clubs, were the choice by 3 points at home against their perennial eastern division adversaries, the New York Giants.

Eagles Solid Favorites

In the other Sunday games that kick off the NFL's 43rd season, the Baltimore Colts were the choice by 7 points at home over the Los Angeles Rams; the San Francisco Forty Niners were picked by 7 over the Chicago Bears on the west coast; the Detroit Lions were favored by 7 at home over the Pittsburgh Steelers; the Philadelphia Eagles were 10-point picks at home over the St. Louis Cardinals, and the Dallas Cowboys and Washington Redskins were rated even in the Cotton Bowl.

Crowds totalling more than 325,000 were due to forget momentarily about the baseball pennant races and other sports and to jam NFL parks for the season openers. The largest turnouts were expected at Cleveland (60,000), Philadelphia (58,000), Baltimore (54,000) and San Francisco (48,000).

NFL experts and the Las Vegas oddsmakers (by odds of 2 to 5) have just about conceded a third straight Western Division title to the Packers.

Jerry Kramer, star offensive guard who missed most of last season with a broken ankle, has recovered. Paul Hornung, NFL player-of-the-year in 1961, line-backer Ray Nitschke and flanker Boyd Dowler have been discharged from the Army, which claimed much of their time last season.

Packers Bolster Reserves

And although Coach Vince Lombardi does not plan to start any rookies in the opener against Minnesota, the Packers have four newcomers who should be solid reserves. They are fullback Earl Gross of LSU; guard Ed Baline of Missouri; end Gary Barnes of Clemson; and defensive end Ron Gassert of Virginia.

Cleveland, which now has gone three straight seasons without an Eastern Division title, will have at least seven new faces for its opener against the Giants.

Most important of these will be quarterback Jim Ninowski, obtained in a big off-season trade with the Lions. Other new figures are halfbacks Tom Wilson and

Hopalong Cassidy, defensive end Bill Glass, and rookies Gary Collins, reserve end, and Mike Lucci, starting linebacker.

The word from Cleveland also has it that coach Paul Brown plans to give Ninowski more leeway in calling plays than previous Browns quarterbacks.

This would mean an end to Brown's "messenger boy" system of shutting offensive linemen into the game to relay his instructions to quarterbacks.

The Giants, who have broken exactly even with the Browns (12-12-2) down through the years, should find out Sunday whether it's tougher to out-think the boss or his boys.

Mira Faces Pittsburgh In TV Contest

Some 40,000 fans at Pitt Stadium and millions of television viewers across the nation saw the University of Pittsburgh meet Miami of Florida today in the top game of college football's first, although skimpy, weekend of the 1962 season.

The Pitt-Miami clash brought together two top-notch teams in a repeat of last year's television inaugural. Pitt pulled out last year's game, 10-7, at the Orange Bowl, despite the passing heroics of George Mira.

Mira Holds Key

Mira, now a junior, held the key to the Hurricanes chances of upsetting the host Panthers. The scrawny, rifle-armed Mira, who gained over 1,000 yards through the air last season, looked for some able receivers to take the place of the graduated Bill Miller and Larry Wilson.

Pitt, with its most wide open offense in history, possessed a double passing threat in Jim Traficant and Paul Martha. Traficant holds the No. 1 quarterback job while Martha, who shared the signal-calling duties last year as a soph, has been moved to right halfback. Martha, who's also a speedy runner, gives Pitt a good target for the long-throwing Traficant.

Iowa State, with its powerful running attack headed by Dave Hoppmann, warmed up for Big Eight competition against underdog Drake. Hoppmann, who led the nation in total offense last season, will handle both quarterback and tailback duties in Iowa State's new winged-T offense.

Southern Conference Play

In Southern Conference openers, Virginia Tech met William and Mary and George Washington will play Virginia Military Institute in a night game. Another after dark encounter pits the Citadel, 1961 Southern Conference champion, against Florida State.

Utah State, the nation's top offensive power last year, plays San Jose State in a night game.

Redmen Continue Scoring Pace; Belt Clyde, 42-6

CLYDE — The Bellevue Redmen are apparently attempting to make another bid at their school record books as they continued to pile up points like nobody's business last night at the expense of arch-rival, Clyde.

The Redmen came home with a pulsating, 42-6 win and now have rolled up 110 points in their first two games of the season.

The Redmen did it like this last night. Halfback Marc McClain scored once from five yards out, halfback Ted Rhudy scored another from three yards out, Gil Sands picked up a six pointer from the two-yard strip. Then came fullback Wayne Warden. They tallied 18 points on touchdown runs of 26, 26 and one yards.

The three points after the touchdowns were picked up on passes from quarterback Jim Culler to end Tom Lopenman.

McClain gained 217 yards in 11 carries plus running an additional 50 yards on a pass completion. Warden ended the night with 113 while Rhud had 62.

Loudenville Tops Wildcats By 18-6 Count

NEW LONDON — The New London Wildcats went down to their second defeat in as many starts as Loudenville's speedy back Les Steele scored three touchdowns to top the Cats 18-6.

New London started on the right foot as they scored in the first quarter on a pass play from Tony Kirkpatrick to Doug Randleman which covered 60 yards.

The tide changed from the second quarter on as Steele came to life for the visiting Loudenville. The ball-hustling Steele scored two touchdowns in the second quarter, one on a 15-yard trot and the other on a five-yard plunge. The conversions were not good and the scoreboard read 12-6 at half time.

Both teams played good defensive ball in the third quarter. Then in the fourth, Steele broke loose with a run of 70 yards to paydirt, ending the scoring.

New London was penalized 70 yards in the contest and this definitely hurt their offensive punch.

Margaretta One TD Better Than Plymouth

CASTALIA — The Margaretta Polar Bears, who always seem to have the last quarter momentum to carry them to victory, defeated the Plymouth Redmen last night 14-8.

The Bears scored early as Bob Harple plunged from the one yard line. Harple then ran for the points after touchdown.

BOWLING GREEN — The Norwalk High Truckers probably played their best defensive game when everything is taken into consideration but did so in a losing cause.

Playing without the services of their fullback John Scherer who is sidelined with a ankle injury, the locals dropped a crape-hanging, 8-2 decision to the Bowling Green Bobcats last evening.

Only the fans who were on hand could ever imagine what a defensive contest the game turned out to be for 48 minutes. One statistic showed the biggest ground gain on any one play in the first quarter was a five-yard pickup by Butch Meagrow of the Truckers with 1:42 left in the initial canto.

The Bobcats picked up just 16 yards until they started their touchdown drive midway through the second quarter. When they struck, they struck quick.

They took possession of the ball on their own 30-yard line after the Truckers failed to gain the necessary yardage to maintain their grip on the pigskin. Fullback Mike Weger, who runs the way a fullback should run, gained 16 yards on the first two carries. After a short gain by Phil Parsons, quarterback Keith Kaufman faked a handoff and skirted left end for 20 yards only to have the play called back due to a holding penalty.

Doesn't Stop Bobcats

The Bobcats refused to call it quits after the penalty and after a short gain on a running play, Kaufman threw complete to Parsons on the 21 yard line. Weger then netted three more, and then Parsons, behind two fine blocks, went to his left and raced behind his interference the final 21 yards and the only touchdown of the game. Weger then bulled his way around the right side of the Norwalk line for the points after to make it an 8-0 game.

Before the half ended both teams had good opportunities to push across scores but when the big play was needed, the opponents' defense was there to meet the challenge. The Truckers drove to the Bobcats' 26 yard line following their touchdown but then ran out of gas. The winners did as well in the gaining department but also had trouble in the fuel department the next time they got their hands on the pigskin.

Score Safety

Norwalk received to open the second half but was hampered by a 15 yard penalty so kicker Eric Kohlmyer went to work. He rolled one to the 17 yard line where the Cats took over. In three plays they lost six yards as the hard charging Norwalk line went to work.

In trying to get off a good punt, the Bowling Green kicker apparently had his mind too much on laurels and not enough on catching the ball as it skipped between his hands and the turf and slid all the way out of the end zone for an automatic safety.

Norwalk made their most serious bid to score early in the fourth quarter as they took a Bowling Green punt on their opponents' 48 yard line and started

from there. With everybody in the backfield having at least one chance at running the ball, the Big Blue moved the ball to the BG 22 yard line in six carries. Quarterback Terry Albright picked up 10 more on a rollout play after fullback Taylor Hart gained four on a run.

From here on in the Big Blue had trouble as halfback Malcolm Fowler and Hart were both thrown for two yard losses. Meagrow and Albright picked up seven on the next two plays but this was far from being enough to maintain possession.

Fumble Halts Drive

The Bowling Green club handled the ball for just three running plays and were again forced to punt. It again was short and the Nammen took over on the winners' 40 yard line. In three plays they were on the 28 but the fourth play was costly as they fumbled with BG recovering.

Two minutes after the fumble, the Truckers again got their hands on the ball, only this time it was back on their own 27 yard line. Albright picked his plays and threw bulleeyes to Kohlmyer on three occasions to move the ball to the Bowling Green 20 yard line with 48 seconds left in the game. Another strike to Kohlmyer moved the pigskin to the 12 yard marker but then it seemed as if the magnet again drew the Truckers back toward minus yardage.

Albright tried two passes on the second and third down plays with two yards to go for the first down but could not connect on either. Then in a desperate attempt to go all out, he tried a double reverse, but the Bobcats came up with a key defensive stop to halt the halfback short of the first down.

After taking over, the Bobcats got off just one play before time ran out.

Defense Looks Good

Again the Norwalk defense looked great. The great defensive play of guard Bill Reagan was tremendous but nothing can be taken away from the rest of the Nammen's defensive unit, one that allowed their opponents only 168 yards on the ground for the entire game.

The punting of Kohlmyer also was great as he was forced to kick four times and averaged 41.4 per boot.

On the offense, the passing of Albright and the running of Meagrow were the eye-catchers.
