A survey of the entire Lake Erie marsh region by the Ohio Division of Wildlife revealed the lowest duck population in the last 20 years.

There will be more theories to explain the duck shortage than we can use. The most common, as always, will be the weather. "They're still up North because of the warm weather." Others will say, "They've all gone South because of the cold." Still others will claim the drought has dried up so many local marshes that the birds have left. I do not buy the latter

theory. Although some marshes were not pumped up to their usual levels, Sandusky Bay is not dry; Lake Erie is not dry, and most marshes have more than enough water to attract ducks if there were any ducks to attract. Another popular theory is

lack of food. This is about like saving there is a lack of people in India. The marshes are loaded with smartweed, millet, and rice-cutgrass; to say nothing of the thousands of bushels of shelled corn, soybeans, and buckwheat left in adjacent fields by mechanical pickers What few birds the hunters are bringing in are fatter than groundhogs in Septemher.

But the sate administrators, who usually are political appointers with no training, were mostly in favor of four ducks and fortv davs.

Later, in Washington, the federal s aff recommended about the same regulations as last year, because, they said. there had been only a maderate increase over the provious year's all-time law. I t. around the Dept. of Interior, the word was that Congr 3man Mike Kirwan of Ohio, and Thompson of Louisia"a had told the U.S. Wildlife Service that unlass the bag limit was doubled, the appropriations for the wildlife service would never get through their committees.

Where are the ducks? Maybe they're all up North. Or down South. Maybe there ain't none. I don't know. I know that as of today there are very few in the famous Lake Erie marshes.
