Where'd The Tickets Go?

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (UPI)—It was a happy crowd at first but it didn't take long — about an hour — for it to look like the closest thing to a lynch mob this side of Dodge City.

The people had been waiting for hours, some well before daylight Thursday to purchase tickets for the Nov. 7 football game between Alabama and Louisiana State University.

The ticket office opened promptly at 9 a.m. CST and the line began to move.

However, it didn't move for very long or very fast because an hour later, after only 37 people had reached the counter, the tickets were all gone.

Temper began to flare, especially after it was learned that 1,000 of the 3,700 tickets offered for sale were gobbled up by one man who planked down \$5,000, shoved the tickets into a bag and escaped the wrath of the crowd.

Mayor Albert Boutwell's office became a battleground as highly irate citizens stormed in and demanded to know why restrictions weren't placed on the amount of tickets that could be bought by one person.

In an apparently gross understatement, Fran Wagner, superintendent of the park and recreation board, said, "I admit poor judgement on my part for agreeing to put the tickets on sale without any restriction."

Some of the disappointed ticket seekers complained that in passing a recent bond issue for erection of north end zone seats, the ones sold, they were assured of the chance to buy some tickets.

Over 10,000 of the new section seats have already been sold with the remaining 3,700 awaiting clearance from the contractor before being sold.

Rumors that "scalpers," who buy large quantities of tickets to sell later for large profits, had cornered the ticket market, prompted Birmingham police to issue a crackdown on the profiteers.

Irish Tackle Navy Saturday

ND Dormant Decade Over

They've stopped cheering tradition and started cheering the players once more at old Notre Dame, and it looks as if this year's Irish football squad has finally brought an end to a dormant decade of gridiron achievement.

Not since 1953 when the Irish won their last national championship has the enthusiasm and desire to win been as strong at South Bend. Feelers are already out for an Irish Bowl appearance, which would mark Notre Dame's first post season game in 40 years. The Irish's last extra-curricular excursion was in 1925 when they beat Stanford, 27-10, in the Rose Bowl.

That also was the senior year of the famous "Four Horsemen" backfield that included Harry Stuhldreher, Jimmy Crowley, Don Miller and Elmer Layden.

Notre Dame this season has

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quarterback John Huarte to pitch "bombs" against Navy Saturday and make the Middlesies its sixth straight victim. The Irish, ranked second in the nation behind Ohio State, have a revenge motive, too. Navy clobbered them, 35-14, last year and has beaten Notre Dame in three of their last four meetings.

Ohio State, meanwhile, contends Iowa in a Big Ten conference game that could spell the difference in a Buckeye trip to Pasadena. Quarterback Don Unverferth and Willard Sander lead the Ohio State air-ground offense, but the Hawkeyes of Iowa have the best conference passer in Gary Snook, who has completed 62 of 128 tosses for 844 yards and five TD's.

Third-ranked Alabama, with injured quarterback Joe Namath a doubtful starter, places a 6-0 record on the line against Mississippi State Saturday night. Dave Ray's 21-yard field goal provided the Tide's 17-14 winning margin over Florida last week.

Nebraska and Arkansas, rated fourth and fifth, respectively, also take perfect 6-0 marks against conference opponents. The Cornhuskers of Nebraska pit their rugged defense lead against Missouri in a Big Eight tussle and the Razorbacks seek to secure a Southwest Conference edge in their meeting with Texas A&M.

Texas In Easy Match

Texas, the 1963 national champion, rebounded last week against Rice after an Oct. 17 loss to Arkansas. The sixth-ranked Longhorns should have it easy against Southern Methodist, which has lost four of its five games.

Seventh-ranked Georgia Tech has won six straight, but the Engineers may be in for rough times against unbeaten, but once-tied Duke. Georgia Tech

Don't laugh, it could happen.

George Weiss, general manager of the Mets, revealed Thursday he had talked with the unfrocked manager of the Yankees about joining the Mets and will talk to him again.

The Yankees have offered Berra a two-year contract as GM special field assistant to GM Ralph Houk. However, Yogi has not signed yet, explaining "I'll have to see how I feel being out of uniform."

That's the catch.

Yogi has spent 22 of his 39 years in a Yankee uniform. He wouldn't mind leaving the Yankees, but he's not ready yet to surrender a uniform for a business suit.

"I'll have to wait to see how I would feel being out of uniform," Berra said today before leaving on a golfing vacation.

"I imagine it would be kind of hard."

New York baseball fans already are ecstatic over the possibility of Berra being reunited with Casey Stengel, who, like Yogi, was dumped by the Yankees after winning a pennant and losing the World Series.

"Yogi is my assistant manager," Stengel used to say when he was bossman of the Yankees and Berra was setting records as the greatest home run hitting catcher in the majors.
