Nats Slow Twins

Tigers Trip Yankees On Cash's Homer

The Washington Senators slowed Minnesota's pennant progress Friday night with a 2-1 victory over the Twins in 10 innings.

It was only the third win in 13 games with Minnesota for the Senators and it was achieved after Pete Richter and Camilo Pascual dueled brilliantly for nine innings.

Both bowed to pinch hitters and neither was around at the finish, although Richter got credit for his 14th victory.

Lefty Jim Merritt worked the 10th for the Twins and took the loss.

Don Lock's bad hop single over Rich Rollins' head at third base with two out in the 10th scored Fred Valentine with the winning run. Valentine reached third on an infield hit

and Ken Hamlin's single.

Floyd Robinson's sacrifice fly in the 11th inning scored pinch runner Dave Nicholson from third base to give the Chicago White Sox a 5-4 victory over the Cleveland Indians.

A single by J. C. Martin, a sacrifice by Tom McCraw and an intentional walk to Don Buford set the stage for Robinson's blow. The victory went to Hoyt Wilhelm and Gary Bell took the loss.

A two-out, two-run homer by Norm Cash in the 10th inning and a clutch relief performance by Terry Fox enabled the Detroit Tigers to beat the New

York Yankees 4-3. Mickey Lolich was the winning pitcher and Whitey Ford, who went 10 innings for the first time this season, took his 11th loss against 15 victories. Tom Tresh drove in all the Yankee runs with a two-run homer and a bases-loaded walk.

Kansas City survived a Boston rally to nip the Red Sox 8-7 as reliever John Wyatt collected his 17th save. Roland Sheldon was the winning pitcher, working five innings and allowing five hits. Tony Conigliaro regained his American League home run lead by socking his 29th and 30th roundtrippers of the season.

Dean Chance hurled a four-hitter but it took two throwing errors by Baltimore to give the California Angels a 2-1 victory over the Orioles. Chance captured his eighth victory in his last 10 decisions to boost his over-all mark to 14-10. The winning run off loser Wally Bunker came in fourth inning on a single, shortstop Luis Aparicio's error and another miscue by third baseman Brooks Robinson.

Elmore took advantage of three Lakota miscues to town the invading Red Raiders. 22-6 in an independent grid contest Friday night.

Lakota, however, took the lead in the second quarter on Scott Chaney's 15-yard scoring pass to Les Graber, capping a long march. The try for the extra points was stopped, but Lakota led, 6-0, at halftime.

ELMORE CAME back in the third quarter to block a punt on the Lakota 20, with Ron Haar finishing up a short drive with a five-yard scoring jaunt.

Harr duplicated the feat in the fourth quarter after a Lakota fumble was gathered in at about the loser's 20.

Mike Ohl belted over from the five for the final score of the game after another fumble.

The Sandusky Bay Conference representatives were injury-riddled with the biggest blow coming when fullback Dick Stoner, who had been averaging 6.1 yards per carry, pulled a back muscle and couldn't play the second half.

Also injured in the first half was halfback Ron Neisel.

Frisco Halted At 14

Milwaukee Halts Giants' Express

The Milwaukee Braves rallied behind two home runs by Hank Aaron and brilliant relief pitching by Billy O'Dell Friday night to snap the San Francisco Giants' winning streak at 14 with a 9-1 victory.

Aaron's homers, his 30th and 31st of the year, gave Milwaukee a 4-1 lead after three innings and helped to chase the Giants' 22-game winner, Juan Marichal, who took his 11th defeat of the year.

Doubles by Frank Thomas, Bill Woodward and Frank Bolling also figured in the scoring, as the Braves shelled Marichal

for seven hits and five runs before sending him to the show-ers in the fourth.

O'Dell picked up his 15th save of the year when he came on in the sixth inning with the bases loaded and nobody out and retired the next three batters on two strikeouts and pop fly.

The Braves scored four runs in the sixth off reliever Gaylord Perry, with Thomas' second double of the night and Felipe Alou's bases-loaded single the big blows.

Phil Niekro, making his first Major League start for Milwaukee after 46 relief appearances last year and this,

picked up the victory, his second against three defeats. The only run he allowed was un-earned, coming in the second inning on a walk to Jim Hard.

The Los Angeles Dodgers and the Cincinnati Reds took advantage of the Giants' loss to move within 3 1/2 games of the leaders.

Don Drysdale, with an assist from Ron Perranoski, won his 29th game of the season as the Dodgers beat the St. Louis Cardinals 3-2. Drysdale, hitting 284 before the game, singled across two runs in the second inning off loser Curt Simmons and the Dodgers scored their other run in the third on Jim Gilliam's triple and Willie Davis' sacrifice fly.

Sammy Ellis, with a helping hand from Billy McCool, notched his 20th victory of the season as the Cincinnati Reds beat the Houston Astros 4-2. John Edwards' sacrifice fly scored pinch runner Marty Keough from third base to break a 1-1 tie in the seventh inning and the Reds added two insurance runs in the eighth on singles by Tommy Harper and Vada Pinson plus a double by Frank Robinson.

Don Cardwell hurled a three-hitter to give the Pittsburgh Pirates a 4-0 victory over the Philadelphia Phillies and snap a three-game losing streak. Cardwell retired 22 men in order after walking Bobby Wine in the second inning en route to his 12th victory against 10 losses. Willie Stargell drove in two Pittsburgh runs with his 27th homer.

Chicago and New York were not scheduled.

Plymouth's Dave Trout went 86 yards with the opening kickoff to score, but the Big Red couldn't mount a drive after that and lost its 1965 Johnny Appleseed Conference opener to invading Clear Fork, 28-8.

Bill Goth sliced over for the extra points after rout's thrilling run.

BUT IT WAS ALL CLEAR Fork (2-0) after that, Ken Holter scored on runs of 3 and

33, the latter tally capping a nine-play 69-yard drive.

Steve Walker smashed over from the three in the second quarter, and Roger Bowers sprinted 64 yards around left end on the first play after a 12-yard Plymouth pun to score the final six-point drive.

Neither team notched any yards passing, but Clear Fork rolled up a sparkling 365-yard total on the ground to 18 for the losers, who managed to have only two first downs to Clear Fork's 15.
