

New London, Vermilion Notch Lakeland Wins

Vermilion followed the lead of quarterback Ralph Mayer to a light 22-20 Lakeland Conference grid victory over Midview, and Huron's last ditch bid for a victory failed as the Tigers fought Clearview to a 12-12 deadlock Friday night.

In other loop encounters, favored Oberlin had to fight to down Amherst, 12-0, and New London unleashed a potent passing attack to blitz visiting Ridgeville, 30-8.

MAYER RAN FOR a 20-yard touchdown in the first quarter, passed 18 yards for another TD to Bruce Miskow and tossed an important aerial to Jeff Goodridge for a two-point conversion in a slick job of quarterbacking.

Bellevue's Crown Tilted

Although only two nights of action are completed in the Northern Ohio League, it appears a new king will reign at the end of the season.

Undefeated Shelby whipped defending champion Bellevue, 22-6, to announce its intentions of snagging the NOL crown this year.

THE LOSS WAS BELLEVUE'S second in four games and first in two league contests. Shelby is 4-0 and 2-0 for the season and league, respectively.

Shelby scored first when Dennis Alfrey slammed over from the 3-yard line, capping a 62-yard drive that consumed eight plays. Mel Westcott bolted into the end zone for the extra points.

Huron, Clearview Battle To 12-12 Tie

Miskow went 65 yards for another six - pointer in the fourth quarter to sew up the victory.

Midview's Al Stacey scored all of his team's points, scoring on runs of 20, and 40 yards and taking a 27-yard pass for another TD. Stacey also scored the points after his third touchdown.

HURON SCORED all its points in the first quarter in a contest that was a thriller right up to the last play. Tom Coe scored both times, once on a 1-yard run and another on a sprint around left end

for a nine-yard score. Clearview also scored in the first quarter when Preston Montgomery hit end Dave Batakey on a 32-yard scoring pitch.

The Clippers tied the score on a 3-yard run by Tony Horton with 8:37 remaining in the game.

But the best was yet to come. With less than a minute to go, Clearview reached Huron's 13 with first and 10. Two plays later, it was third and seven at the 10 when Montgomery hit speedy Tony Wilson with a

scoring strike but it was called back when a Clearview lineman was detected offside.

On the next play, Montgomery hit another scoring pitch but the receiver caught the pass out of bounds and Huron took over with just seconds remaining.

On the first play, Huron quarterback John Snyder went back to pass and hit Coe in the open, but the senior half-back was caught from behind at the Clearview 48 by the speedy Wilson.

RALPH (THE BEAR) Holoway blasted across twice on

Ross is 3-0-1 on the season, while Mansfield is 2-2, with its other loss at the hands of No. 1 ranked Massillon.
