

Huron Hit By Oberlin Sledgehammer, 52-6

Both Vermilion and Huron celebrated homecomings last night, but neither had much to rejoice about after their Lakeland Conference games were over Friday night.

Vermilion couldn't contain New London's Merv Nugent-sparked offense and fell, 20-8, while Huron was flattened by Oberlin's sledgehammer offense, 52-6.

THE LAKELAND race shapes up as a two-team affair at the present stage with both Oberlin and Wellington holding unblemished records, both in the league and overall.

The two powerhouses will meet Oct. 29 at Oberlin in what promises to be the league showdown.

SPARKED BY THE hard-running of Ralph (The Bear) Holloway and the sharp passing of Indian quarterback Ron Rybarczyk, the winners scored in every quarter but

the second. Holloway scored twice on runs of 3 and 1 yards, while Rybarczyk hit Don Ellington on a 43-yard scoring pass, and John Talbert on a 9-yard aerial for another score. Rybarczyk also plunged over from the 1.

Tom Coe, Huron's hard-running halfback, who has scored every Tiger touchdown except one, plunged over from the 2-yard-line in the fourth

quarter for the hosts only score. Frank Fiore's crew gained 192 yards rushing, rolling up 11 first downs, while Oberlin had 236 rushing, 141 passing on six of 10 passes and 17 first downs.

NUGENT THREW for one touchdown and set up two other New London scores with long runs as the Wildcats up their season mark to a fine 5-1. Vermilion is now 2-4.

Ed Harris went 2 yards up the middle for New London's first score, but Jerry Brothers scampered over from 3 yards out to tie the score, and Ralph Mayer tossed to Jeff Goodridge for the extra points and an 8-6 Vermilion lead.

Al Randleman got the lead back for New London, scoring from one-yard-out, Nugent set up the TD with a 40-yard sprint to the Vermilion 4. The NL quarterback ran for the

extra points. On the last touchdown, Nugent found his favorite target Rick Evans with a 10-yard scoring strike after Nugent had dashed 40 yards earlier in the drive.

Nugent has now passed 70 times in six games, completing 33 for 606 yards. Evans had caught 21 of the aerials good for 370 yards.

CLEARVIEW SCORED all its points in the first half, and

stopped a Midview drive in the final quarter for its victory.

Tony Wilson scored on a four-yard-run and Dick Bozicevich took a 50-yard Preston Montgomery pass into the end zone for the Clippers' scores in the first quarter. Wilson belted over from the points after.

In the second quarter, Clearview launched another drive, capped by Wilson's 1-yard plunge.

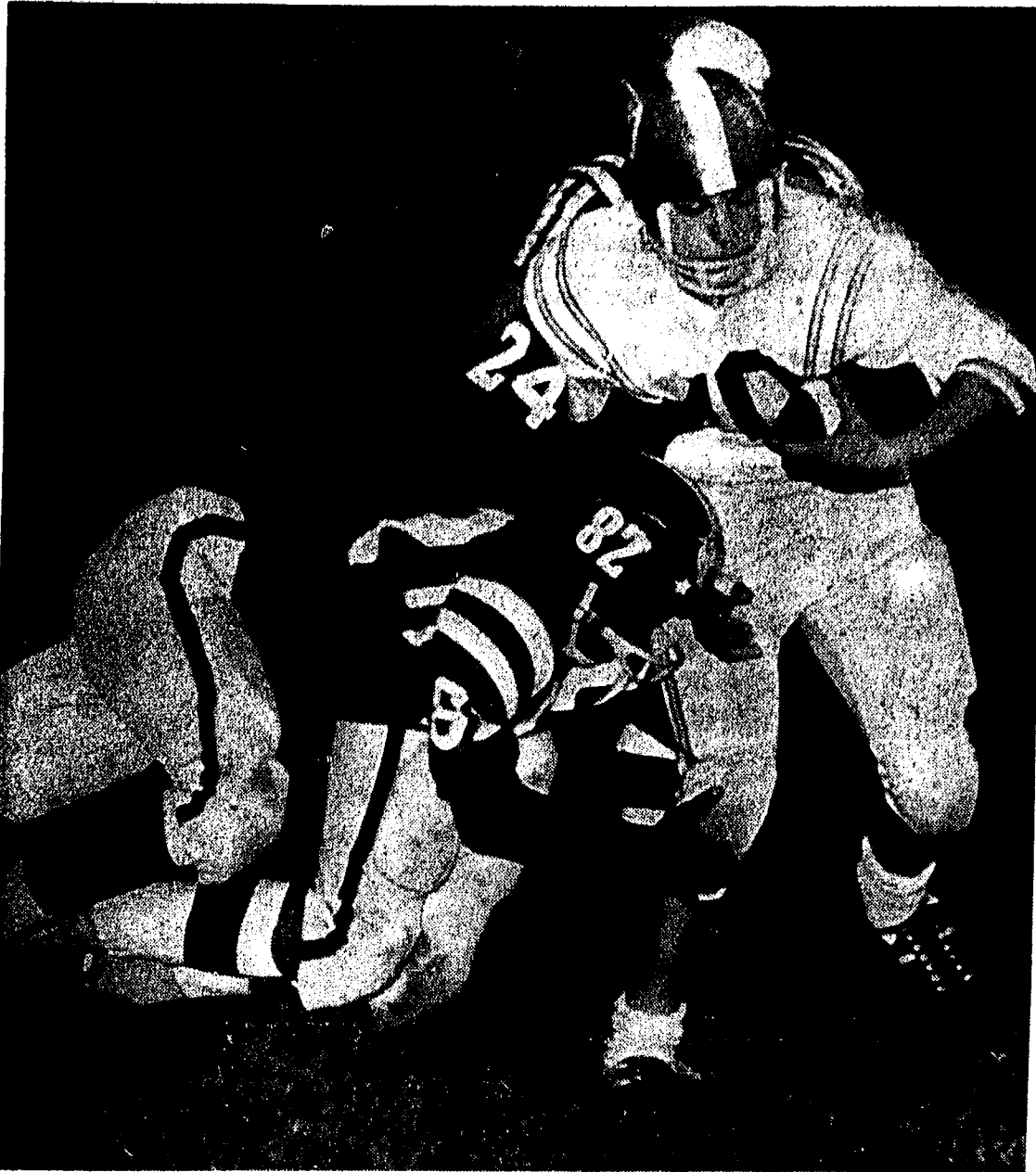
Larry Yost went over from the 1 for winless Midview, and Al Stacey hooked up with Don Gustovich on a 61-yard

Galion's fighting Tigers narrowed the ranks of the undefeated in the Northern Ohio League to two Friday night by handing host Willard a 30-12 lacing.

Shelby and Galion are now the only two NOL teams with unblemished slates, setting the stage for the Oct. 29 meeting between the two which will probably decide the league championship.

WILLARD SCORED first when Ron Pugh hit end Charles Coleman with a 6-yard pass for a first quarter score. A pass for the points

Galion fought right back and went ahead 8-6 when Mike Tupps tallied on a 6-yard-run and Rich Halsey swept end for the points after.

THERE WAS 6:37 LEFT in the half when the Streaks put the ball in play — time enough for the Streaks to show who was boss.

On the first play from the SHS 46, Dave LeVier, seemingly trapped, suddenly tore free and raced 15 yards to the Findlay 39. Willie Amison hit in for 4, and Dickerson swept his own left side for 16 yards to the 19.

Trying out the other side on the next play, Dickerson was run down 7 yards behind the line but Amison came right back on a trap up the middle and bolted 18 yards to the 8. Amison went to the 1 on the next play and then over.

Amison made a great catch of Healy's PAT pass and it was 8-6 with 2:52 remaining.

EAGER FOR MORE, THE STREAKS stopped Findlay cold to get the ball again.

Kaser swarmed all over Gonso for a 3-yard loss, middle guard Brian Clark stacked up 218-pound fullback Bob Bright after 1 yard and corner linebacker Paul Cross "blitzed" to smash Gonso to the turf 8 yards behind the line — running right through a blocker to get to him.

Bill Deming brought the punt back five yards to the Findlay 37, and the Streaks scored in just three plays, all aerials by Healy.

Starting off with just 32 seconds on the clock, Amison made a great finger-tips grab for a 14-yard advance, Kaser took the next one over the middle and lunged to the 3 for a 20-yard advance and Kaser then alertly hauled in a deflected pass in the end zone for the score with only 13 seconds left.

Healy swept his own right side and scooted into the end zone standing up for the 16-6 halftime count.

SANDUSKY LOST POSSESSION TWO plays into the second half on a fumble, forced Findlay to punt but then had to do likewise, before LeVier halted a promising Findlay drive with a fourth down interception at the SHS 17.

Only three plays were needed again.

LeVier scampered 61 yards to the Findlay 22, but a clipping call brought the ball all the way back to the SHS 41. Amison went for 6 and then Arty Keys, the junior "swing" halfback, went swingin' 53 yards into the Findlay end zone.

He bolted through a gaping hole over his own left side and it was no contest less than 10 yards into the secondary.

Findlay was forced to punt again as tackle Werner Hall poured in on John Cindric, who was trying to pass on third down, for a loss of 8 yards.

SANDUSKY THEN PUT TOGETHER a 9-play, 65-yard march for its final touchdown, coming with 6:27 left in the game.

A Healy to Keys aerial connection on the sixth play ate up 16 of the distance, and then Healy clicked with halfback Eddie Williams for the six-pointer, from 24 yards away, with split end George Garrett — who was also in the same vicinity — throwing a block to give the big sophomore a path to the final stripe.

Healy threw to Charlie May in the deep corner of the end zone to add the final frosting.

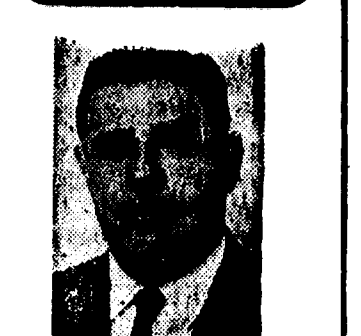
Roger Darlano and Joe Zenger scored the other two Seneca touchdowns.
