Bob Hart sat in his office after his 25th win as St. Mary's coach and tried to explain the Panther's success in 1966.

"This team had that all for one and one for all attitude and never gave up especially in the key game against St. Joe," said the youthful coach who had just won his 12th game in a row.

He also commented that any good team can be a great team if they can keep the mistakes to a minimum. He pointed to 1966 as a year when the mental and mechanical mistakes of the team and his own mistakes had been cut to the minimum.

HART ADMITTED that after the St. Joe game he and the team felt they could go

the route unbeaten, "but we (the coaches) had to make the boys realize the pitfalls of looking too far ahead."

As far as the leadership was concerned, Hart said the tri-captains Dick Wiesler, Ron Weyer and Dan Brady all did a fine job, especially when it came to demonstrating leadership through performance.

Hart also cited others in the same category. Denny Fitz called almost all the defensive plays and did such a good job that he made it much easier for the head mentor.

HE ADDED, "Many came up with performances better than we expected, and I guess it was the spirit that did it." He was speaking specifically

of Dennis Strasser and Dennis Faber who both played their first year of football as seniors and Dick Finneran who switched from defense to offense this season.

Crestline Tops Plymouth, 9-0

Knudson Captures Fancy Of Gallery

Arnie-Jack Well Out In Front

TOKYO (UPI)—Arnold Palmer's 69 and Jack Nicklaus' 67 kept the United States well out in front in the Canada Cup team standings today, but George Knudson of Canada stole the show with a 66 that put him four strokes ahead of Palmer for the Individual trophy after

three rounds.

Knudson's opening round of eight-under-par 64 was the lowest in the 14-year history of Canada Cup play and it made him the darling of the gallery. His 198 is low among 72 players from 36 nations in the tourney.

Palmer and Nicklaus have a combined total of 406 to top the teams with Australians Kel Nagle and Bruce Devlin in second place with 413. South

Africans Gary Player and Frank Fowler are third with 415, followed by Nationalist China at 416 and Canada and Japan at 417.

"It feels wonderful to lead," Knudson said, removing his dark sunglasses for the television cameras.

The American golf giants played similar games. They both drove well and had success on the greens. Palmer topped out it was a case of two strokes to the green and two more to the cup. He was not satisfied with his putting, though. He's had putter troubles for two

years. "I was very bad on the greens today," he said. "The four birdies I made were on the long holes."

Nicklaus, the master of the booming drive, agreed with his teammate.

Compares Big Cat's Punch With Wallop Of Mule

HOUSTON (UPI)—The punch of Cleveland (Big Cat) Williams is said to be more powerful than Sonny Liston's or Joe Louis' or anybody else since the great Jack Dempsey. Williams' manager, Hugh Benbow, compares it to the wallop of a Missouri mule.

Williams' supporters have a multitude of facts and circumstantial evidence to back up their claims. It's true that Williams is the only person to knock out Ernie Terrell, the World Boxing Association's hea-

vyweight champion. It's also true that Williams has more first-round knockouts than any champion in boxing history except Dempsey. Williams has 15.

Louis and Primo Carnera had 14, Rocky Marciano and Max Schmeling had 11. Gene Tunney and Liston had only 7 and Cassius Clay, who will defend his title against Williams in the Astrodome Monday night, has only 1.

Tod Herring, the last of Williams' 51 knockouts, also

quit fighting after their June 29 bout, but Herring said the beating from Williams was not the reason.

Williams' fists are as big as Jim Jeffries', his chest as big as Liston's and his wrist as big as John L. Sullivan's.

But just as telling, his ankles, 11 and 1-2 inches around, are the same size as the slow-footed Primo Carnera. So, despite the punch, it may be the legs who have the final say for the 33-year-old challenger against the speedy, 24-year-old champion.

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Injury Forces Ryon Out Of Race

LAWRENCE, Kan. (UPI)—Jim Ryon, world record holder for the mile run, will not compete in the 28th annual NCAA national championship cross-country meet at the University of Kansas, Nov. 21. Bob Timmons, Kansas track coach, said Friday that Ryon has been hampered by a back injury.
