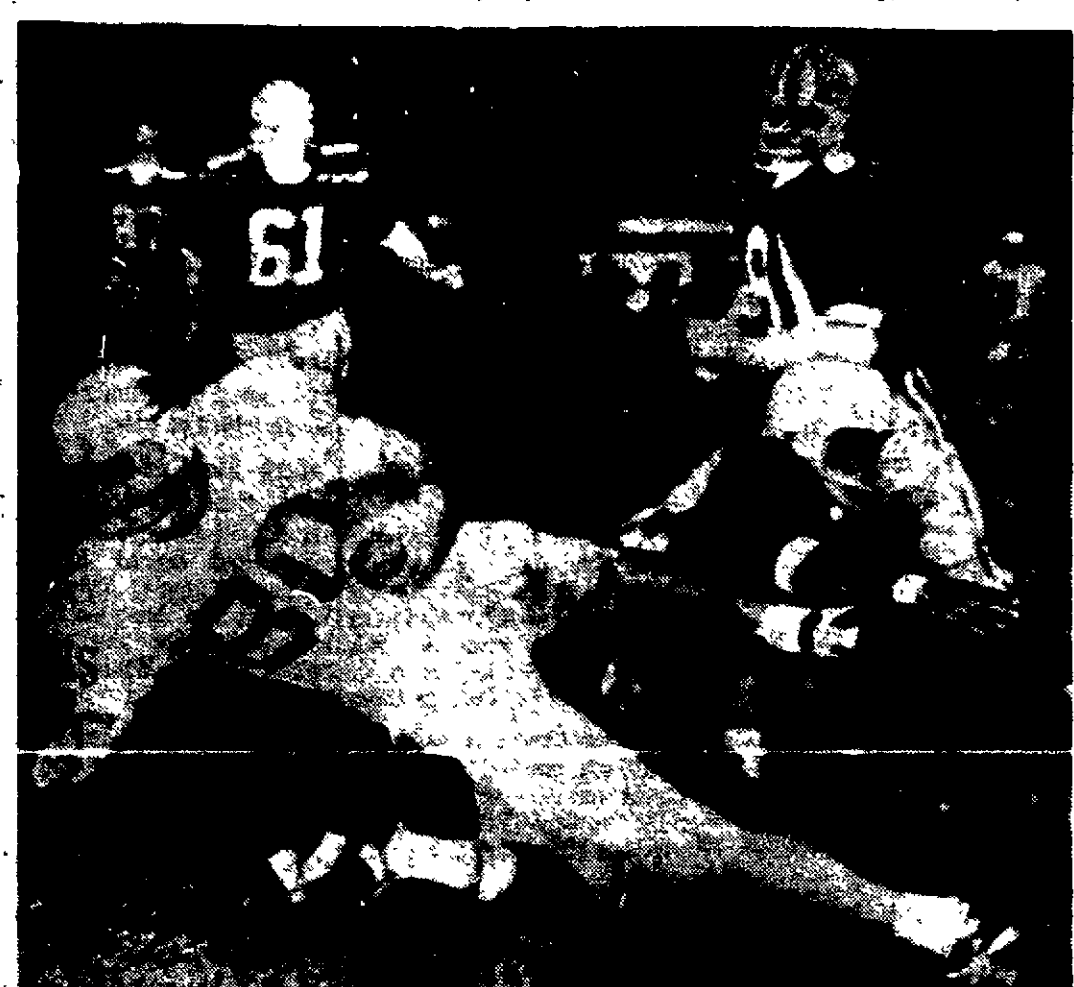
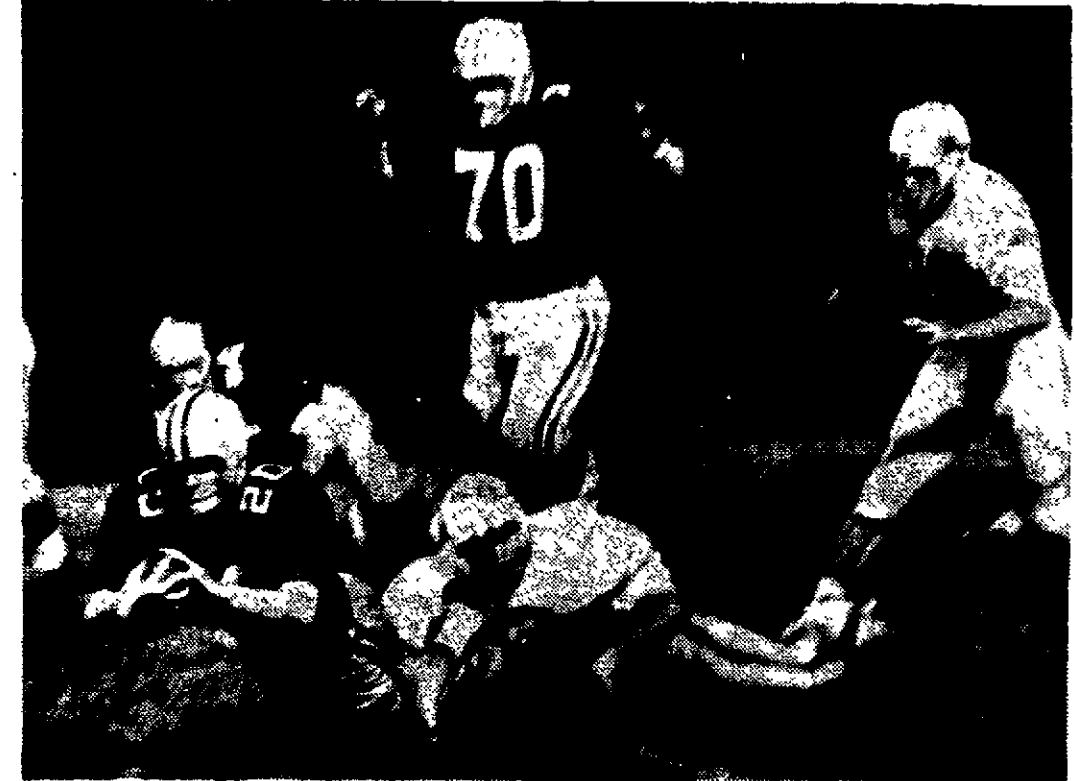

George. He picked off a Litz pass at Navy's 8 after Cole recovered a Middle fumble on the 31. On Navy's first play, Murray burst up the middle and raced 73 yards to the Air Force 3. Four plays later Murray plunged for the touchdown.

San Jose Air Bombs Rip Ducks Plymouth's Late Aerial Pays Off

EUGENE, Ore. (UPI) — National collegiate passing leader Danny Holman threw three touchdown strikes and passed Oregon dizzy in the second half Saturday as San Jose State scored a 21-7 football victory.

Holman, who had his first two passes intercepted, connected with rangy flanker S. T. Saffold on scoring aeriels of 56 and 28 yards. Then he completed a great afternoon by hitting John Crivello with an 18-yarder that clinched the win.

It was the first San Jose victory in three starts and the third straight loss for Oregon.

Holman, who was 41-66 going into this game, hit 19 of 26 for 306 yards against the Ducks. At one point he had 11 completions in a row.

With just five second remaining in the game and Lexington leading, 12-8, Plymouth's Bill Goth lofted a pass 34 yards into the end zone.

A pair of Lexington defenders baited the ball but it fell into the arms of Plymouth's Erv Howard, who was lying on the ground.

The touchdown toss capped a two-play, 80-yard drive for the Big Red. It was Howard's sec-

NEW HAVEN (UPI) — Rutgers took advantage of Yale fumbles to run up a 17-point lead Saturday and then fought off a fourth period Eli surge for a 17-14 win in a bone-chilling rain.

It was Rutgers' first victory against Yale in the 12-game series which dates back to 1873.

Rutgers jumped on two Yale fumbles to score a field goal and a touchdown for a 10-0 halftime lead. Another Yale miscue led to a second Scarlet touchdown in the third period.

Jim Dulin booted a 35-yard field goal early in the second quarter after Garth Weber recovered a fumble on the Yale 18. Dulin, a soccer-style kicker, booted the three-pointer four plays later from the 25.

PRINCETON, N.J. (UPI) — Doug James raced 83 yards through the rain and mud to score on a punt return Saturday and led Princeton to its 16th straight football victory over Columbia since 1945, 14-12.

Dick Bracken, a Canadian-born sophomore who played his first game of American football last year, started Princeton on the way to its opening Ivy League triumph with a six-yard touchdown run in the first period. But, it took the punt return by James to offset a pair of long-range Columbia touchdowns on passes from Rick Ballantine to Jim O'Connor.

Brazilian-born Ted Garcia, a left-footed soccer-style kicker, booted conversions after both Princeton touchdowns.

Tennessee Whips 'Stubborn' Rice

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Stopped on the ground by a stubborn Rice Defense, 10th-ranked Tennessee whipped the Owls 23-3 Saturday on the uncanny passing of quarterback Dewey Warren.

Warren threw three touchdown passes and completed 17 of 25 aeriels for 234 yards before retiring to the sidelines midway in the final period. End Johnny Mills caught a 12-yard toss three seconds before half time for the Vols' first TD.

Warren passed 12 yards to end Austin Denney for Tennessee's second touchdown in the third quarter, and put the game out of Rice's reach with a 13-yard scoring toss to Walter Chadwick later in the same stanza.

Rice went ahead 3-0 on a 24-yard field goal by Frank Puska in the first quarter. Tennessee's Gary Wright evened the count in the second period with

a 29-yard boot through the uprights.
