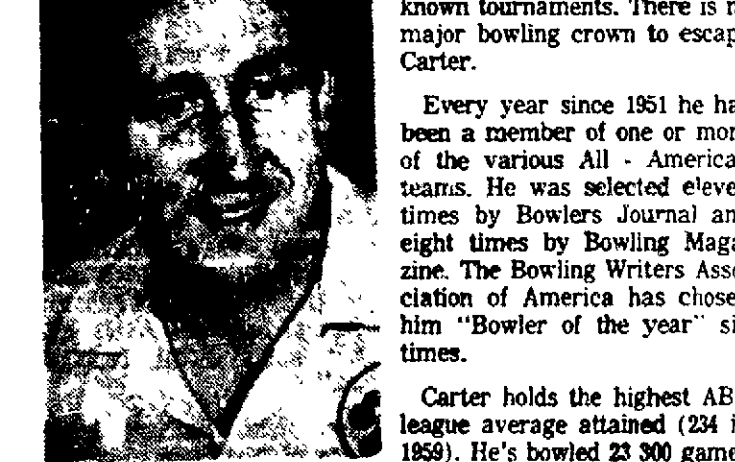

New Philadelphia Topples Ashland

NEW PHILADELPHIA—New Philadelphia remained "alive" in the Cardinal Conference football race by coming from behind to defeat defending champion Ashland here last night, 14-8.

The New Philly Quakers (5-1) won their second league game in three starts while Ashland (2-2-2) lost for the second time in league play against one win and one tie.

Ashland scored first after Bill Ehrig recovered a Jamie McGary fumble on the New Philadelphia 24-yard line. In six plays Ashland went on to score with 1:21 remaining in the opening period. Key play was an 11-yard pass from Denny Humrichouser to End Bill Newkirk. Humrichouser sneaked over for the TD from three yards out.

New Philadelphia capitalized on an Ashland fumble when Humrichouser went back to pass and was hit by Clark Rosenberry and knocked the ball loose in the second quarter.

Tackle John Elvin recovered on the Ashland 48-yard line and nine plays later McGary swept right end for seven yards and the touchdown. The score was tied 6-6 with 1:05 remaining in the half.

New Philadelphia took the opening kickoff in the second half and drove 64 yards for a touchdown with Leo Richards going the final yard after a drive covering 14 plays in which Richards carried 10 times for 46 yards.

In the fourth period Ashland marched to the nine-yard line with the big play being a 53-yard pass completion from Humrichouser to Tim Mast. Joe Shidler went to the three where he fumbled and Quaker Clyde Lamb recovered on the three.

Three plays later Craig Chuhaloff threw McGary into the end zone for a safety with 1:3 left in the game.

Carter Hit With Charge Of Murder

PATERSON, N. J. (AP)—Middleweight boxer Rubin "Hurricane" Carter was arrested today with a second man and charged with murder for a triple slaying in a Paterson tavern last June.

The fighter, 29, who lost a title bid against champion Joey Giardello in December 1964, had been picked up in a car with John Artis near the scene and questioned after the June 17 crime but was released. Artis, 21, and Carter were charged with three counts each of murder.

The slayings occurred in the Lafayette Grill in what appeared to be a holdup attempt. The two armed men involved reportedly walked in and began firing. Police said that money was missing from the place. The shootings were believed to have been an effort to eliminate any witnesses.

Four persons were gunned down, two dying there and one in a hospital a month later. One man survived his wounds.

Barber, a native of Shreveport, La., who graduated from the University of Arkansas and represents a golf club in San Antonio, Tex., had 11 one-putt greens and a total of 27 putts in his round of 64—two shots shy of the course record.

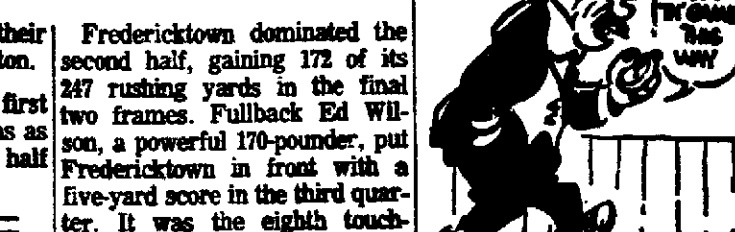
Barber had seven birdies and parred all other holes.
