"I think Marion is probably the top challenger," Mehock added.

Seven schools are expected to compete in the 4:30 p. m. outing. Findlay is the lone league member not expected to appear.

Mansfield Senior, which placed third last year, will be paced by lettermen Dennis LaRue and Bob Bigelow. In the 1955 meet at Marion, LaRue was ninth in 10:59 and Bigelow 12th in 11:06. LaRue finished first in last week's district meet with a 10:36 clocking, his best of the season.

In Mansfield's only clash with a Buckeye Conference school this season, Marion took a 20-38 win at Mansfield's Possum Run Golf and Swim Club.

'Fired Up' Colorado Team Wins

FORT COLLINS, Colo. (AP) — A fired up Colorado State University football team upset 10th ranked University of Wyoming 12-10 Saturday.

Colorado State Rams broke a 10-year losing skid to the Wyoming Cowboys, who entered the game with a 6-0 record.

The Rams scored on two field goals and a touchdown in the last half after trailing 7-0 in the first two quarters.

Charger Flanker Plays With Two Broken Hands

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP) — Flanker Lance Alworth of the San Diego Chargers always has been considered about the best pass receiver in the American Football League.

He may also be the gutsiest.

Alworth revealed Thursday he played the first half of the season with two broken hands.

During this time, he caught 37 passes for 694 yards and six touchdowns, the highest number of catches in the AFL.

He kept secret the fact he had hairline fractures in each hand because "the other team might

try to hurt you or they might play a defense other than the one we hoped they would."

Alworth was injured in the Aug. 20 exhibition game against the Kansas City Chiefs, but at that time the mishap was reported as only a sprained wrist, which he also suffered.

Before the first game of the regular season, Alworth was unable to shake the hand of a writer at the Charger training camp. He asked sportswriters not to reveal his injuries.

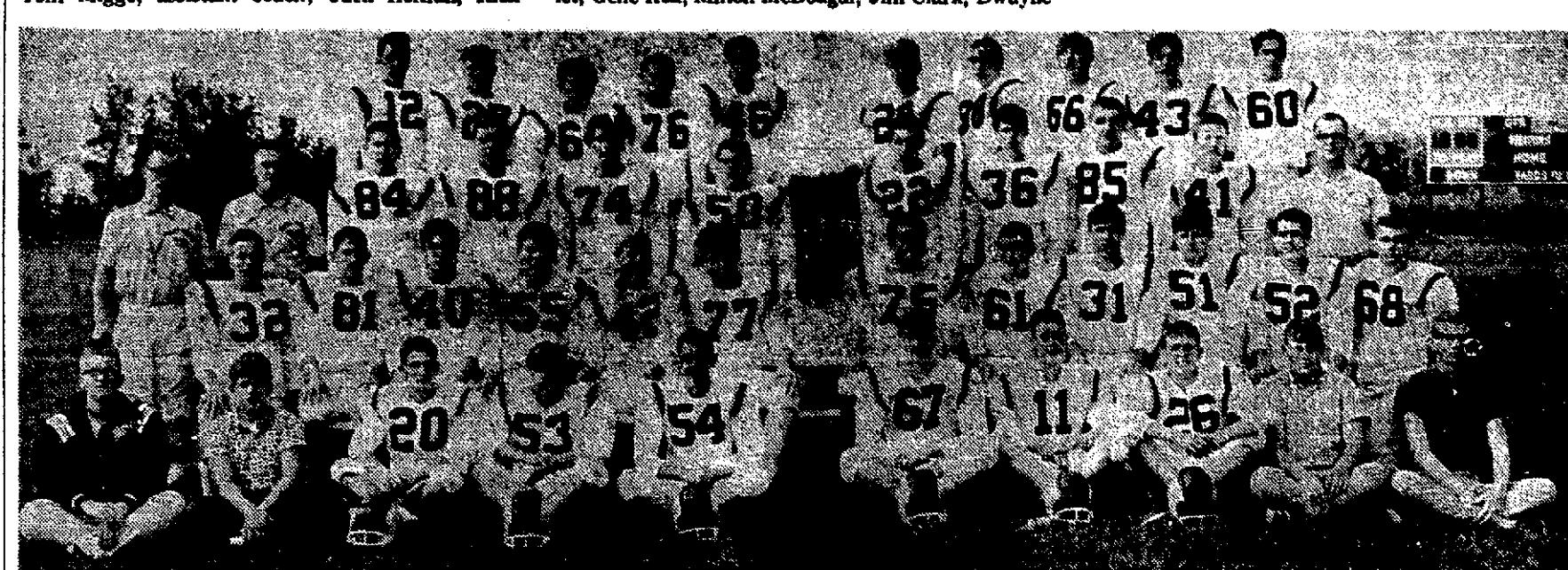
"We'll see what kind of football player I am," he said.
