

Tygers Veto Marion Presidents, 22 To 14

Mansfield Evens Buckeye Record

Mansfield Senior High scored twice in a weird fourth quarter battle of survival to gain a 22-14 Buckeye Conference football victory over Marion Harding before 3,000 last night at Arlin Field.

Almost everything that could happen in a football game happened in that fourth period which saw Marion scored once to cut a Tiger lead to 16-14. Four fumbles, two pass interceptions and wild laterals marred a quarter which also saw some line runs and pass catching.

Quarterback Dave Hallabrin again showed versatility as the Tygers did. Everything he ran, passed, caught passes, intercepted passes, played two different backfield positions, punted, returned punts, returned kickoffs and played some defense.

Hallabrin completed two passes to Don Blakley for Tyger touchdowns and ran 18 yards for another score. His net rushing yardage only came to 10. However, three of his runs, which totaled 30 yards, were called back because of Tyger penalties. Hallabrin ended with four completions in nine attempts for 74 yards and also caught three punts for 47 yards.

The huge Marion forward wall held the Tygers to minus rushing yardage in the first half and barred the Tyger passers there were three of them) unmercifully. However, the Presidents' rush slowed down after intermission and Mansfield gained huge chunks of real estate in the air and on the ground.

QUICK SCORES

Both Marion touchdowns came quickly. Harding recovered a Tyger fumble on the Tyger 31 on the last play of the first quarter. Then on the second play of the second quarter, sophomore Mickey Wells left the Tygers gasping with a shifty TD gallop for 28 yards for the first touchdown of the game.

The other Harding score came on a 58-yard interception return by the 167-pound Wells in the fourth period. On that one, a Marion blitz chased Quarterback Rick Wright far behind the line of scrimmage. He was hit as he attempted to pass and the ball wafted into the arms of the flying Wells 17 yards behind the Tyger line of scrimmage and his path to the TD was like cutting soft butter with a hot knife. That sliced the Tyger lead to 16-14.

Mansfield moved ahead for keeps with 34 seconds left in the first quarter when nine Wright and Hallabrin passes accounted for 68 yards. The last one was a 24-yard pitch into the end zone from Hallabrin to Blakley.

TWO COUNTERS

Paul Parr recovered a Marion fumble on his own 23 early in the fourth period and on the third play Hallabrin passed to Blakley for the final 19 yards. Mansfield marched 67 yards in five plays right after the second Marion score to get the final touchdown on an 18-yard burst by Hallabrin which was set up by a line block by sophomore Merrill Wittmer. Dave Phillips had a 30-yard gain to spark the drive.

Mansfield had drives stalled on the 17, nine and 20 in the last five minutes and another was stopped on the 11 in the second quarter after a 35-yard pass from Wright to Duane Hill.

Tyger Shawn Madison had his best showing since an ear-ri season injury when he completed the first pass of his career, gained 46 yards, intercepted two passes and recovered a fumble.

Bands of both teams played at the Homecoming game. Harding (1-3 and 1-6), 22-14. Queen Alison Davis and attendants Robin Burridge, Rita Gonzalez, Annette Mengert and Vicki Schwab arrived on

the field in convertibles squined by their fathers. The band saluted Homecoming with a "Shades of Amber" show.

Sandusky 'Squeaks'

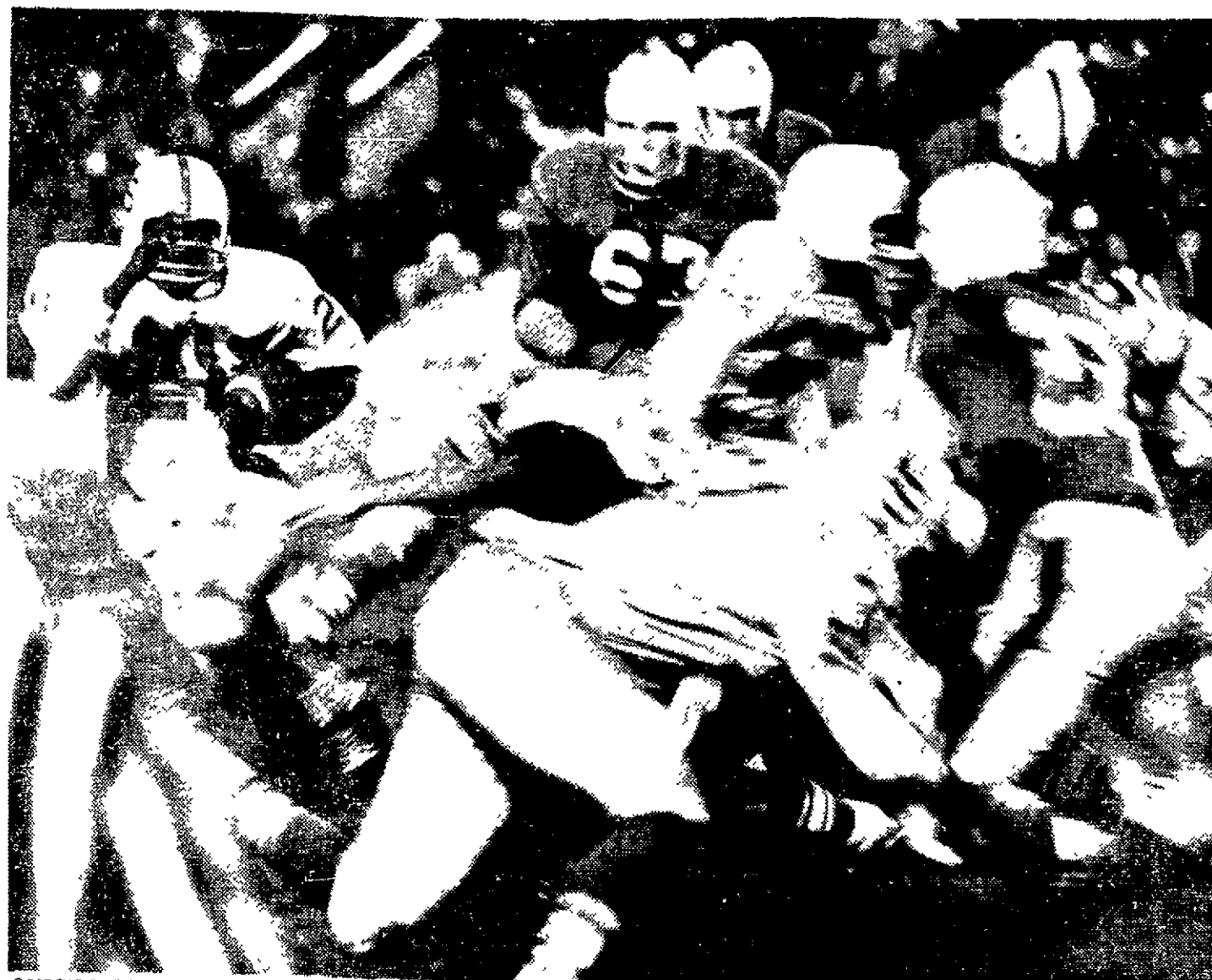
Sandusky continues to be both good and lucky. The Blue Streaks edged Elvria 14-13, last night to remain unbeaten in Buckeye Conference play.

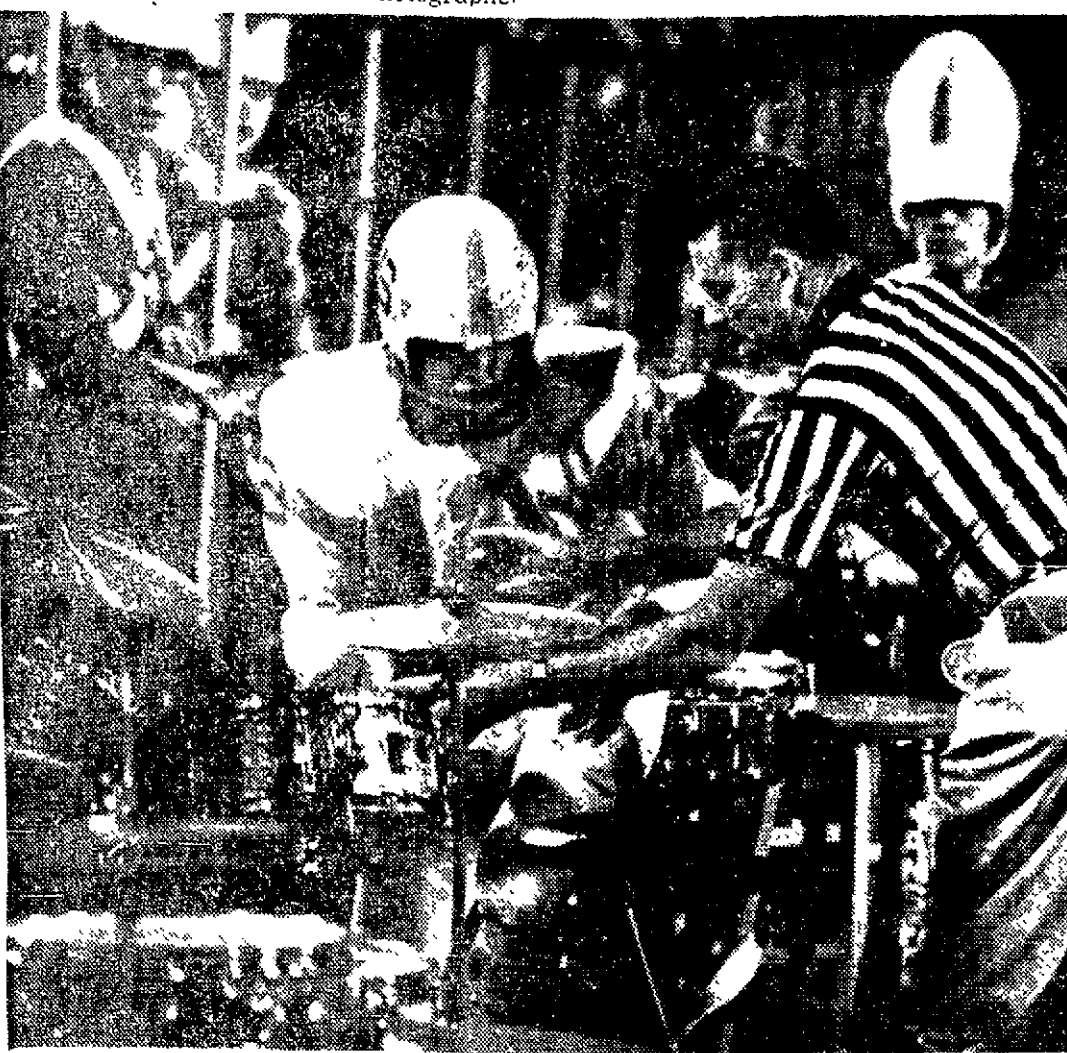
Loran Admiral King (3-1 and 5-2) made a field goal the margin of victory over Loran Senior (2-2 and 3-4), 9-6.

Jackson briefly held the B altered national standard at 10.19 seconds but this record has been lowered to 10.13. Bill did much of his running out of the division and will thus be classed as a Division One entrant. Cates, who still holds the C altered national record at 10.81 seconds, finished fifth in Division Three.

Not just anyone can enter. The field will be five cars from each division in each bracket. Competition will be close as almost every car is capable of running right on the national record or breaking it. Qualifying will be today with eliminations Sunday.
