

Madison Builds Big Lead In 32-24 Victory

Dover High Rally Edges Ashlanders

Dover and Mansfield Madison continue in the one-two spots in Cardinal Conference football today.

Dover (5-0 and 8-0) maintained its one-game lead by edging Ashland (3-3 and 3-5), 14-8 while Madison (4-1 and 6-2) built up a huge early lead in tumbling Wooster (2-3 and 3-5), 32-24. New Philadelphia (1-4 and 2-6) upset Coshocton (2-3-0 and 3-4-1), 26-16, in the other game.

WOOSTER — Madison built a 32-0 lead after three quarters of play before Wooster struck for three touchdowns in the last six minutes to thrill a Parents Night crowd here last night.

Actually Wooster's comeback just made the score close. The Generals scored their third and final TD with just one second left. Madison, apparently looking forward to its meeting with Malabar next week, was relaxed with its 32-0 lead. Many Ram substitutes were also used in the fourth period as Coach Len Fontes played all 33 boys who dressed.

MADISON, which scored 38 points in the first half against Coshocton last week, shot off to a 14-0 lead in the first period. Junior Jim Frazier scored the first of his three TD's on a one-yard run with 6:24 left. Larry Hart ran over the only successful conversion to make it 8-0. Passes for 15 and 25 yards highlighted the 76-yard march that took 11 plays after the opening kickoff.

After taking Wooster's punt at their own 14, the Rams went 86 yards in six plays for their second TD. The fifth play was Dick Johnson's 55-yard run to the Wooster 13. Hart went the remaining distance on the next play for a 14-0 lead with 1:26 to go in the first frame.

Early in the second period, Hart's 46-yard quick kick was downed at the Wooster 14. Two plays later, Madison's Mike Laser recovered a fumble at the seven and on second down Johnson went three yards over right tackle to give the Rams a 20-0 lead with 9:33 to go in the half.

Wooster picked up its initial first down of the game at the 3:40 mark, but three plays later Frazier fell on a fumble at the General 29. With 28 seconds left in the half, Frazier went four yards over left tackle to make it 26-0.

TACKLE Tim Sinerson intercepted a Wooster pass on the first play after the kickoff. Frazier, kicking in his stocking feet, missed a 30-yard field goal on the final play of the half.

Madison's last TD came with 18 seconds remaining in the third period on Frazier's nine-yard run. Pass plays good for nine and 25 yards also highlighted this 89-yard march.

Jon Viar, a 200-pound junior fullback, led the Wooster rally. He gained 79 of his 139 yards in the fourth period and scored twice on one-yard plunges. Tony Moore tackled on the third TD on a four-yard end sweep.

Wooster is coached by Jack Peterson. He is the brother of Bill Peterson, former Mansfield Senior High coach and now coach at Clevela State.

Pass-Happy Miners Smash Lobos, 75-12

The more things change in El Paso, Tex., the more they remain the same for the mad-cap Miners of Bobby Dobbs. Texas Western, the home of close-to-the-vest basketball, wide-open football and way-out publicity blarbs, became the University of Texas at El Paso last winter.

But brilliant Billy Stevens made certain the footballs kept flying this fall for the pass-happy Miners. He set an all-time collegiate record for career passing yardage and, after firing six touchdowns passes a week ago, was zeroing in on another NCAA mark when a virus grounded him for Friday night's game against New Mexico.

So, back-up quarterback Brooks Dawson stepped in —

DOVER — Colby "Rabbit" Byrom caught a 30-yard touchdown pass from Quarterback Rich Trustdorf with 2:05 left to play to give Dover its win over a fired-up Ashland team here last night.

Dover, down 8-6, drove 95 yards in 11 plays for its winning score. There were five punts exchanged in the final period that was a climax to a defensive battle.

Ashland scored first in the second period on a 12-yard pass from Quarterback Mark Humrichouser to End Ron Stouffer. It was the eighth touchdown pass of the season for Humrichouser, a 6-2 jun-

ior. He also passed to End Bill Newkirk for the two-point conversion.

Ashland's touchdown ended a 72-yard drive that took 12 plays, 11 on the ground before the TD pass. It gave the Arrows an 8-0 lead with 10:34 remaining in the half.

Dover came back to score its first TD in the third period. The Tornadoes, ranked sixth in the state, went 50 yards in six plays. Dave Keitch raced 16 yards up the middle to make it 8-6 in favor of Ashland with 7:54 to play in the third stanza. Keitch has now scored 56 points in five league games. However, it was the first league game he failed to score two TD's.

Dover threatened once in the first half when it drove to the Ashland three-yard line as time ran out.

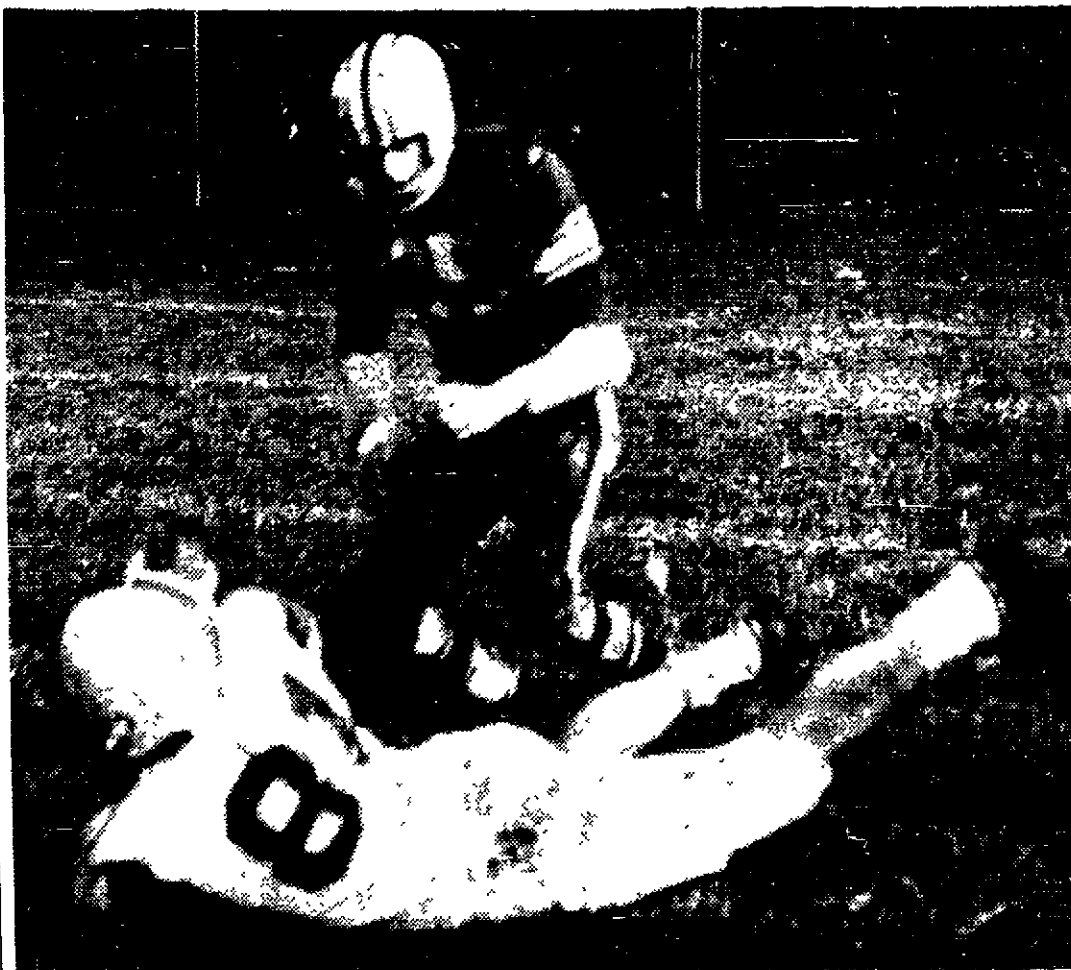

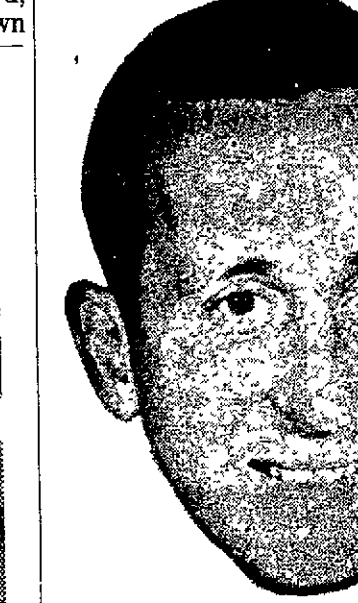

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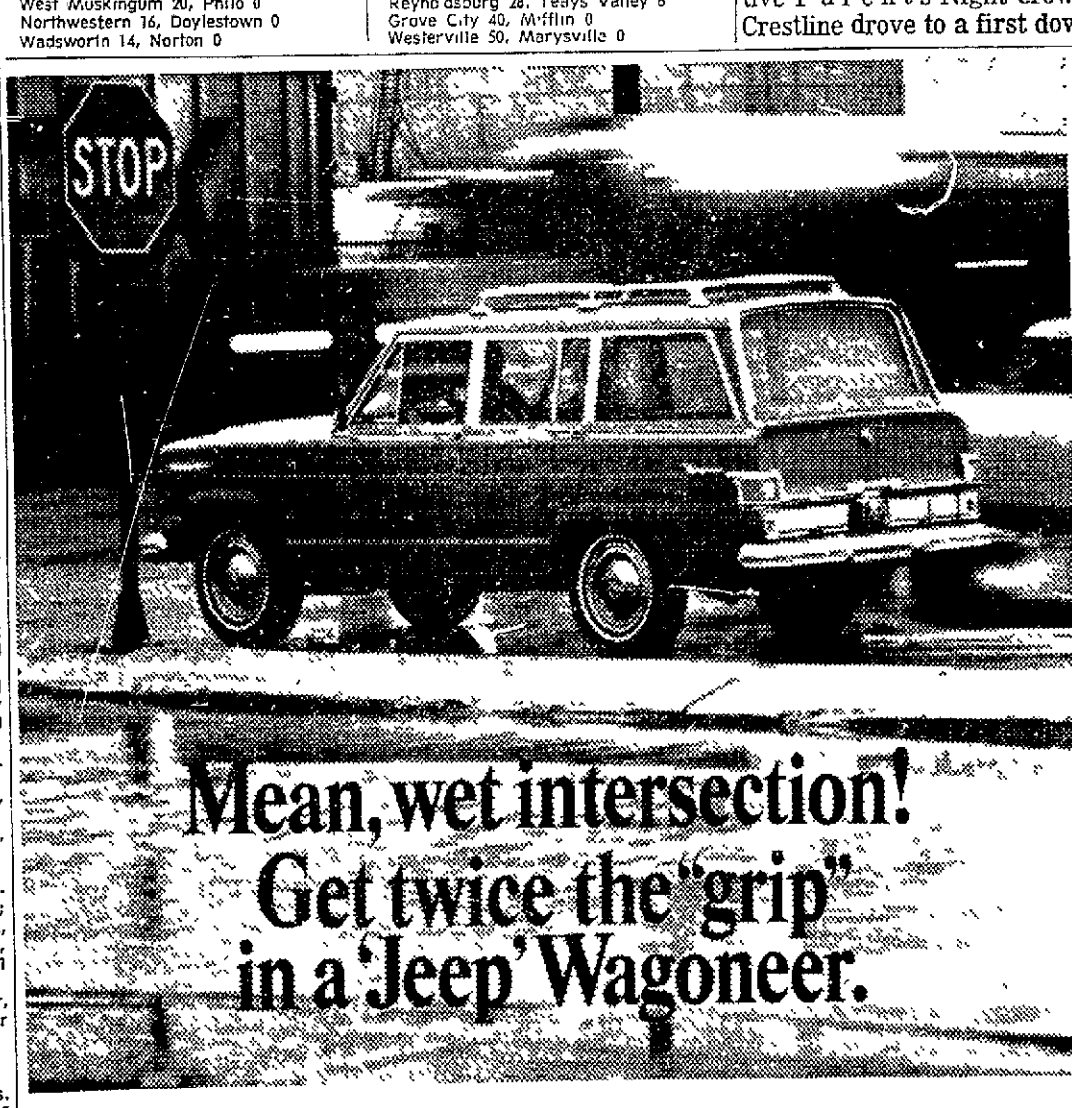
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
