Cards To Get Quarterback For Opener

ST. LOUIS (UPI) — Army Lt. Charley Johnson will shed his uniform for St. Louis football Cardinal garb for the opening football game against the New York Giants Sept. 17.

The granting of a weekend pass to Johnson to allow him to take part in the game was announced by Army officials at Ft. Sill, Okla., where the veteran Cardinal quarterback reported for duty last month.

Coach Charley Winner said in a statement that Johnson "definitely could not start." Winner said he would consider using Johnson as a "back-up" quarterback to former Southern Illinois University quarterback Jim Hart of Chicago.

Notre Dame Choice To Repeat As Collegiate Grid Champion

Notre Dame, expected to produce another football powerhouse despite the loss of several star players, is picked to repeat as national college champions this year, according to The Associated Press, annual preseason poll.

Alabama also drew heavy support from the national panel of 32 sports writers and broadcasters participating in the voting. Michigan State placed third, followed by Texas, Miami of Florida, Georgia, Southern California, UCLA, Tennessee and Colorado.

VOTE STOCKPILES

Notre Dame, which beat out runner-up Michigan State by 35 points in last season's final poll, collected 17 first place votes and 296 points in the 1967 pre season balloting. Alabama, third a year ago, was selected as the top team by 11 voters and accumulated a second place 282 points on a basis of 10 for a first place vote, 9 for second, 8 for third etc.

Michigan State drew only one vote for first place and 183 points while Texas, unranked in last year's final poll, was a close fourth with two votes for the top spot and 176 points.

The final 1966 rankings in order were Notre Dame, Michigan State, Alabama, Georgia, UCLA, Nebraska, Purdue, Georgia Tech, Miami of Florida and Southern Methodist.

The Fighting Irish from South Bend, Ind., and Michigan State's Spartans locked up in an interesting duel for the poll lead through most of last year. Their dramatic late season meeting produced a 10-10 tie and Notre Dame pulled ahead in the voting in the final weeks.

The Irish have lost such stalwarts as Nick Eddy, Larry Conjar, Jim Lynch, Alan Page and Pete Duranko. However, they still have their crack passing combination of Terry Hanratty and Jim Seymour plus speedy halfback Rocky Bleier and huge Kevin

St. Mary's took a 3-2 lead on a 29-yard field goal by George Maczuga with 8:35 left in the contest. In the first period, Maczuga missed a field goal from 40 yards out.

Following the St. Mary's kick-off, Clear Fork was faced with a fourth- and one situation at its own 34. Chris Snyder went into punt formation, but faked the kick and ran the ball. He bobbled the ball, though, and was swarmed under by five Sandusky players at the Clear Fork 20.

St. Mary's drove in for the only touchdown of the game from there. Tom Erne capped the march with an eight-yard run with 4:21 left to play.

St. Mary's, unbeaten last year, has not lost in its last 17 games. St. Mary's has won 13 in a row. Clear Fork's last loss came to Ontario in 1964. The loss spoiled the debut of Kent Reed as coach at Clear Fork. A former Cardington mentor, Reed replaced Bill Frazier, who had a 44-3 mark in five years at Bellville and Clear Fork. Frazier is now head coach at Mansfield Malabar.

LUCAS — Plymouth came from behind to defeat Lucas in a non-league football game here yesterday afternoon, 19-6.

Lucas scored first in the second period on a 40-yard pass play from Quarterback Drew Arvay to End Neil Pan- yik.

Plymouth came right back to go ahead on a 11-yard pass from Jack Hoffman to Dave McKown. The 70-yard drive was highlighted by a 23-yard pass from Hoffman to Kenny Foreman. Gene Kok booted the extra point and the Big Red led 7-6 at halftime.

In the third quarter, Plymouth drove 65 yards for its second touchdown. Hoffman

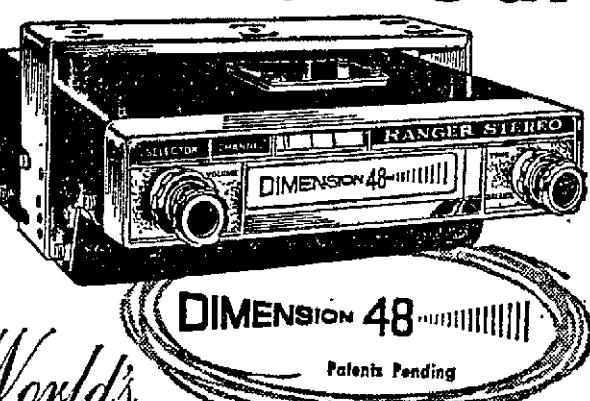
