St. Mary's Extends Win Streak To 13

An aggressive defense and the foot of George Maczuga were the main ingredients as St. Mary's stretched its winning streak to 13 games Saturday night at Strobel Field.

New Panther Coach Bill Philbin felt his defensive unit had come around, but plenty of work was needed with the offense and he proved to be 100 per cent correct as he chalked up a big victory in his debut at St. Mary's.

A strong Clear Fork club, which hadn't lost in 25 games was far from expectations as the Richland County club went down to defeat by an unusual score of 10-2.


Both teams were ranked in the top 10 a year ago, St. Mary's third in one poll and fourth in another, while the Cougars placed sixth in one Class A rating and eighth in another.

Defense Sparkles In 10-2 Victory

St. Mary's offense sputtered most of the night, but the defense was sensational for an opening-game encounter and the Panthers had just one starter from 1966 on the unit.

THE PANTHERS LIMITED CLEAR FORK to a mere 31 net vards in 23 rushes in the second half and 94 yards for the game. St. Mary's managed but 77 net yards on the ground, but the defense gave them numerous chances to score.

Maczuga, 182-pound senior letterman, failed on a 40-yard field goal midway in the opening period when he appeared to

However, he came back when the chips were down in the fourth period to split the uprights on a 29-yard attempt from

an angle to give the Panthers a 3-2 lead.

Four plays after the kickoff, the defense came up with the big play and two minutes later halfback Tom Erne zipped eight yards into the end zone and St. Mary's was out front by a 10-2 margin.

ST MARY'S HASN'T LOST in its 16 games. They have won 13 in a row since the 20-20 standoff at Tiffin Calvert in 1965, including 10 consecutive wins last season.

Despite the tremendous defense the Panthers appeared to be in deep trouble as a result of a Clear Fork safety in the second quarter.

Punter Chris Snyder of Clear Fork had punts of 1 and seven yards before he booted one 35 yards at the coffin corner and the ball went out of bounds on the four.

St. Mary's was unable to move the ball, in fact lost one yard in three attempts.

Mike Roth stood deep in the end zone to kick and received a low snap from center. Trying to hurry the punt, the youngster's kick was low, so low in fact that the ball struck a player on the line of scrimmage and carromed back toward Roth.

THE 140-POUND JUNIOR OUTRACED two Cougar defensive players to fall on the ball to prevent a touchdown, but

Clear Fork was on the board with two points. St. Mary's was unable to generate much of an offense despite the fact Philbin changed quarterbacks at intermission, but the hustling Panther defense continued its sharp play, and

in fact, seemed to improve as time moved on. The Clear Fork backfield - all veterans - ran with a little authority in the first half, but at a snails pace in the last

ST. MARY'S FINALLY TOOK ADVANTAGE of a big break. A clipping penalty set the Cougars deep in their own territory to start the final canto. Two running plays resulted in a net loss of seven yards and Snyder went back to punt with third and 17 at the 13.

St. Mary's, which rushed the punter hard all night long and twice came within a whitsker of blocking the kicks, once again had the big rush on and Snyder managed a weak 22yard boot to the 35.

The Panthers gained 29 yards on the first two plays. Maczuga passed for seven yards to halfback Mike Samstag on the first play and a personal foul against Clear Fork resulted in a 22-yard advance on the next call.
