

Teams Impressive In Final Outings

- Flyers Win - By DON HOHLER

The St. Paul Flyers made it nine wins in ten games Friday night as they rolled over Lakeshore Conference foe Woodville, 50-0 on the Whitney Field turf. In doing so, they became the second team in the history of the city to record that many victories in a single season.

A well-showered Coach Mike Gottfried praised his club following the locker room ceremony stating, "These kids did everything that was humanly possible. I will never forget this season as long as I am in the coaching profession."

Although the Saints rolled up their biggest point total of the year, it was not only the offense that got the job done. The defense limited the Warriors to just four first downs, three of these coming in the first half. The only time the chains were moved in the second half was on a two-yard pass interference call against the Saints.

Offensively it was the power running of halfback Dick Hillman and Nick Takacs and fullback Bill Rospert plus the throwing of sophomore quarterback Chris Amato.

For the game Amato hit on 14 of 23 passes for 231 yards while the Saints ground game smashed out an additional 208 yards to give them a combined total of 20 first downs.

The Saints took the opening kickoff and drove 64 yards for their first score. Junior halfback Steve Missler opened the drive with a 19 yard gallop and 11 plays later end Jim Grine caught a 12 yard pass from Amato to bring up a fourth and two situation on the three. Hillman then rammed the ball into the end zone on the next play and converted for a 7-0 first quarter lead.

With 9:45 left in the second quarter the Saints picked up six more points. They took advantage of a poor Woodville punt to start a drive of 51 yards. end Mike Vogus snared a 38 yard aerial to start things off and five plays later Hillman cracked over from the two. This time the kick was blocked.

The Saints third TD was just about a replay of the second with the exception that this time the Warriors elected to gamble on the fourth down play and missed, losing the ball on their own 37. Vogus again started the drive, this time hanging onto a 32 yard pass from Amato. Three plays later Amato went to Grine for the final five yards and the touchdown. Hillman added the extra point with 5:17 left in the half to make it 20-0.

Following a halftime show by the Flyers band plus the presentation of the Mr. and Mrs. Flyer Fan of 1967, the Saints waded back into the action for the final half of the campaign, one that produced 30 points with seven different players scoring.

The third quarter showed just one score, this being a four yard run by Rospert to cap off a 40 yard drive which took just six plays. Amato carried for the extra points.

Then came the final quarter. Hillman started the scoring parade with a 14-yard hike up the middle and then running partner Rospert bulled into the end zone for the extra points to make it 36-0.

This particular drive covered 62 yards and Hillman deserved the score as he carried for 43 yards of it. The big play to set up the scoring jaunt was a 14 yard pass to Grine.

Another short Woodville punt gave the Flyers good field position later in the quarter. The Saints needed just five plays to go 32 yards. Rospert carried for eight on a screen pass to start it off and Frine ran the last eight after taking a pass from Amato. Sophomore fullback Jack Lodermeier then carried for the extra points to hike the count to 44-0.

Just 2:58 remained in the game when the Flyers got on the board for the final time this season. Another sophomore, end Steve Collins, gave the Flyers the ball with a fumble recovery on the Woodville 38.

Lodermeier ripped off 15 yards on the second play of the drive to move the ball to the 18. Missler then ran by three Warrior tacklers for the final 18 yards and the score. A pass for the extra points failed.

The Saints defense, somewhat embarrassed over their showing last week, allowed the Warriors 87 yards for the night and only 37 in the last half.

- Truckers Lose - By BOB MALISKA

PERKINS -- The Norwalk Truckers played Perkins High School on fairly even terms for the entire game Friday night, minus 12 minutes. It was a disastrous first quarter which led to the 36-0 defeat handed to the Truckers by the Pirates.

The Pirates scored 22 points in that first quarter, and put the Truckers right in the hole from the start.

The Truckers came back in the second quarter however and drove towards the goal line, only to fall short once inside the ten yard line. Another time they came close, but fumbled away any chance of scoring.

On the other hand, the Pirates took advantage of just about every opportunity, and played heads-up ball, scoring three times in the first quarter, and once in the third and fourth quarters.

A good running attack by Bill Baines and Greg Keefer, both wearing the pads for the last time, and passing threats from quarterbacks Doug Ott and John Bohn kept the Pirate defense fairly loose.

The Truckers netted 121 yards rushing and hit for 68 yards passing in an attack once described as almost nonexistent by Trucker mentor Bill Mrukowski. However, these 68 yards came from four completions in 19 attempts.

The Pirates were out to break a number of school records, which they did. At stake was a total school offensive record, an individual rushing record and individual scoring record.

The Pirates broke the first one by netting 370 yards total offense to bring the season total to 4,080 yards.

Halfback Steve Corso broke the other two, netting 126 yards against the Truckers to bring his season total to 1,601 yards. Corso also scored three times, breaking an individual scoring record with his last touchdown.

The record now stands at 23 touchdowns in a season.

Corso got off to a good start in his quest for these records when he scored the first two touchdowns of the game. The first one came with less than two minutes gone in the first quarter when he plunged one yard to score. About six minutes later, he burst in again from three yards out.

Quarterback Gus Sprow scored the last touchdown of the first quarter by going three yards through the line for paydirt.

The Trucker defense came alive in the second quarter and stymied the Pirate offense, while doing some threatening itself. But in the third quarter the Trucker defense was broken once - when Sprow connected with end Curt Williams via a 15-yards aerial to add six more to the board.

This set the scene in the fourth quarter for Corso's record-breaking touchdown. As the Pirates were near the goal line, the fans expected the ball to go to Corso. Sprow didn't let them down. He called a burst up the middle, which Corso took for the last two yards.

This win gave the Perkinites an 8-1-1 record, losing only to Fostoria St. Wendelin 18-14 in an upset, and being tied by Huron 20-20. Although the Truckers made a good attempt to bounce back from that disastrous first quarter, they couldn't and went down to their eighth loss of the year, against no wins, for their first winless season since 1943.

EXPECTED PASSING NEVER CAME

NL Crushed By Rushing, 21-0

HURON -- The New London Wildcats took on a superb passing team but were beaten on the ground by the Huron Tigers, 21-0 here Friday night.

The Wildcat defense was expecting a strong passing game from the Tigers, but it just never came, as Huron rushed for 224 yards on the ground. Its only pass went for 51 yards and a touchdown.

It seems that the Tigers found a gap in the middle of the Wildcat line, as much of the running was done through the center of the line. The Wildcats just couldn't seem to fill that gap, and left it wide open.

Left halfback Steve Baron went through this gap twice to score. The first time was with three minutes gone in the first quarter when he plunged one yard for the score. Then with two minutes left in the half, Baron doubled the distance and doubled the score, bursting through from two yards out.

The Wildcats, who are noted for a good passing attack, only threw once. Rick Gundlach intercepted a pass for the Tigers on their own 49-yard line. On the next play, quarterback Tony Legando uncorked a bomb to Gundlach for 51 yards and six more points.

During the game, Gundlach carried the ball 94 yards in 13 carries for a 7.2 average, while Baron netted 104 yards in 24 attempts for a rushing average of 4.3 yards per carry.

Dean Harmony took rushing honors for the Wildcats with 134 yards in 27 carries for an average of five yards a carry.

It was the poor blocking of the Wildcats that hurt them. They threatened the Tigers five times during the game, but all five times fell short, as the offense couldn't open the holes and get through on the big plays.

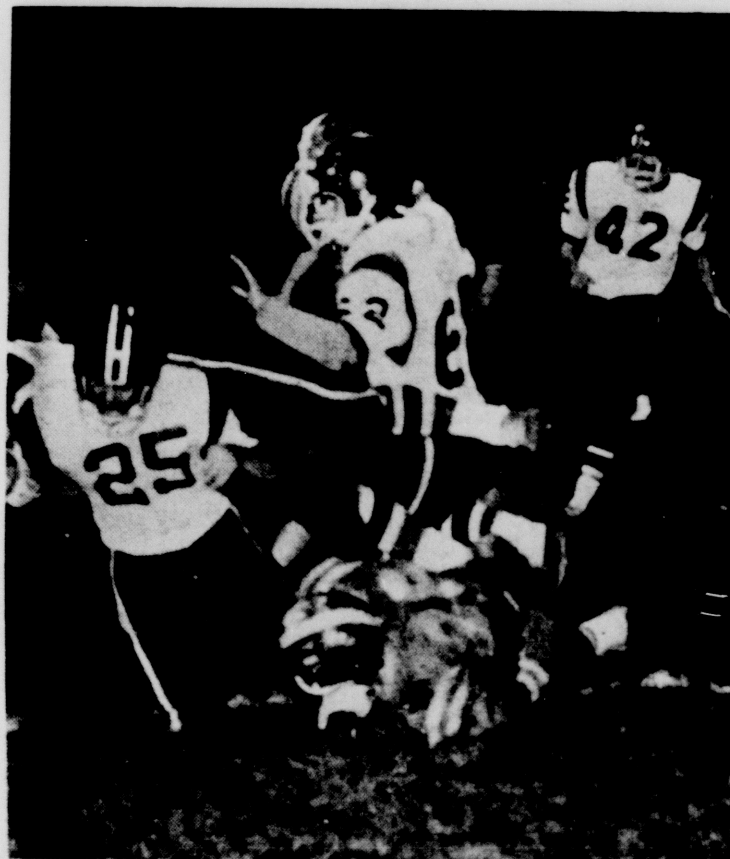
The win gives Huron a final record of 6-3-1 while the loss leaves the Wildcats with a 5-4-1 final tally.

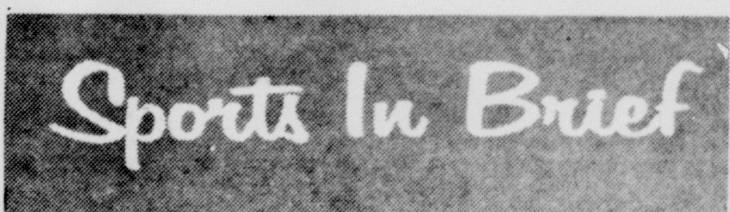

Trojans Lose Squeaker, 14-8

PLYMOUTH — The Big Red of Plymouth sneaked by the South Central Trojans 14-8 here Friday night in a defensive battle.

Each team's defense cracked only once, and each time resulted in a touchdown.

It was the South Central defense that accounted for the first score of the game in the third quarter.

The Big Red dropped into punt formation, but an alert and quick Trojan got his hands on the ball as it left the punter's toe. The ball bounced into the end zone, and rolled out of bounds, giving South Central two points on an automatic safety.

It was Plymouth's turn next when quarterback Jack Huffman faked out the Trojan defense with a pass to Dave McCowen from the three yard line to score with 8:26 left in the third quarter.

About 26 seconds later, the Trojans took the lead again when Paul Sanders found a hole in the Red defensive barrier and scam-

pered 43 yards through the center of the line.

The Trojans held this lead until the last three minutes of the game when Plymouth's Huffmen couldn't make up his mind whether to throw or not, and ran an option around the left end for 25 yards and the game winning touchdown. Fullback Dean Coke burst through for the points after touchdown.

Ruck Mullins, who was named first string fullback for the Firelands Conference All-Stars, did the bulk of the running for the Trojans, while Dean Coke did the job for the Big Red.

The win gives Plymouth a 6-4 season record, while the loss gives the Trojans with a 3-5-2 season total.

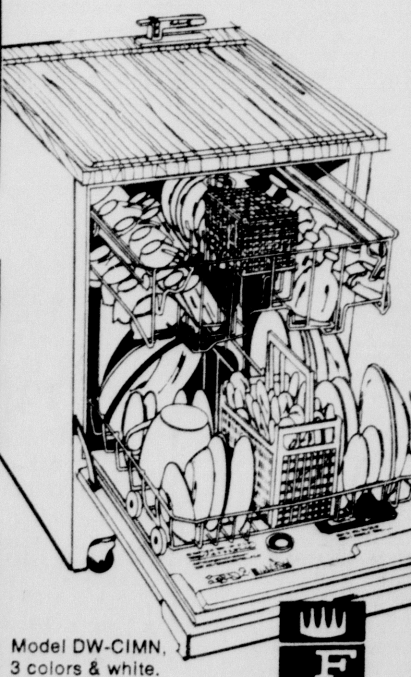
