the Blue and White have been in complete control. Sandusky is solid favorite again with four seniors, two juniors and one sophomore representing the Big Blue.

LEADING THE CONTINGENT is junior letterman Rich Brown who has a 10:05 to his credit at Mills Creek this season and a bestever mark of 10 minutes flat on the road. The four seniors are, Al Ferguson, John Lee Jefferson, Jack Bennett and Dave Leslie. Bill Fish is the other junior and Gordon Terrell the lone sophomore selected by Hartsook. Each of the nine schools will have seven entrants, but only the top five count in the official standings.

Other teams in the field will be Clyde, Fremont Ross, Genoa, Lake, Norwalk, Oak Harbor, Oregon Clay, and Port

The top two teams will qualify for the regional meet at Lima, Friday, Oct. 25, along with the top 10 individuals. Awards will be presented to the winner and runnerup in the

team race and to the top 10 finishers.

us," remarked Nugent. The junior defensive end, who was honored three weeks ago as the Mid-American Conference's "Lineman' of the Week" continued, "Being ran-ked No. 1 in the nation will give us extra incentive against Ohio. I want to win this game more than any athletic contest I have ever been

It's not surprising he should feel that way, for the winner of this week's tilt will most certainly have a clear track for the MAC crown and an invitation to the Tangerine Bowl in Orlando, Florida, December 27. In that post season encounter the MAC winner will take on the champions of the Southern Conference.

THE MIAMI-OHIO clash has all the earmarks of a truly titanic battle, and Athens is preparing for an Armageddon at the fifty yard line. Miami's defensive credentials need no explanation; they have simply held their opponents to less yardage than anyone else in the country. Ohio, however

boasts of records that are also impressive.

The Bobcats lead the MAC in total offense, and have averaged 40 points for their three MAC contests.

Of course, the Redskins hold the conference defense mark, and have blanked each of their three league opponents. Ohio has the conference's best passing attack, while Miami has the best defense against invasion from the air.

The Redskin's power is not restricted to defense. however, as they lead the MAC in rushing, and boast the league's top ground gainer, Cleveland Dickerson.

DICKERSON, of course,

will be remembered for his outstanding career at Sandusky High. The powerful fullback has gained 296 yards in 63 attempts for a 4.7 average in Miami's three league encounters. Along with his league-leading yardage total, Dickerson has scored three touchdowns, a total which he hopes to add to Saturday.

Nugent also hopes to add to his personal statistics of 26 tackles and 19 assists. Against an offensive powerhouse such as Ohio he should have ample opportunity, and along with his defensive cohorts will have to do excellent work, if Miami is to take their fourth straight from Ohio and earn the trip to Florida.
