PLYMOUTH — Two interceptions and a pair of big pass plays gave the Plymouth Big Red a 26-7 victory over Monroeville Friday night. The Eagles now have two losses, both on the road.

The first Big Red TD came in the second quarter, on a pass from senior quarterback Mike Beard to back Eyrts, who ran for the TD on the 62 yard play.

Plymouth's Fureman intercepted an Eagle pass in early in the third quarter and ran 40 yards for a TD.

The Big Red added another six points in the third when Beard and Eyrts combined for 65 yards on a pass.

Mike Beverly intercepted a pass in the fourth quarter and made a 50-yard run for Plymouth's final TD.

Monroeville lit the board for the first time when only seven seconds remained in the game. Polishing off a 33-yard drive over seven plays, Jeff Eby passed to Aaron Fries for the final eight yards to score. Hank Fairchild kicked the extra point.

GRAMBLING, La. (UPI) — James Gregory of Corcoran, Calif., has become the first white athlete to receive a football scholarship from Grambling College.

Gregory, a rollout type quarterback, will serve his apprenticeship under senior signal caller James Harris.

Amato nursed a tender ankle all week and it did not take long to see that his stand-in, Dave Wasiniak, was going to have to do the job again.

Usually running from the halfback spot, Wasiniak stepped into the signal-calling spot and again came through with a fine performance. Had it not been for numerous dropped passes his record would have been even more enviable.

Only after a goal line stand by the Flyer defense late in the first period and into the second stanza did the St. Paul offense start to roll.

Woodmore received a Flyer punt on its own 40 and after two pass plays, one which netted 14-yards to big end Rex Durdell, the Lakeshore Conference club was on the move. Aided by an unnecessary roughness penalty, Woodmore moved inside the Saints 10-yard line. Here the drive ran out of steam as the first play netted two yards and then an offensive interference penalty plus a pair of incompleted passes turned the ball around.

It was on their own 10 yard line that the Flyers started a drive toward the first six points. Fullback Jack Lodermeier punched out 19 yards on a crucial third down play to keep the drive going. Wasiniak then hit speedy Steve Missler

for a 40-yard gainer, and a half-the-distance penalty moved the ball to the seven.

Halfback Dave Heyman then appeared to be hemmed in on the sidelines on the next call but somehow shook loose and went the distance for the score. Missler came to the right side for the extra points to make it 8-0 with 8:45 left in the first half.

The Saints mounted a drive early in the third quarter which carried them to the Woodmore 39 before it ran out of steam.

After a series of two interceptions and as many fumbles in two minutes time, the Saints got hold of the pigskin on the loser's 41. Lodermeier mashed his way for 25 yards on the second play and five running plays later he coasted home from eight yards out. The pass for the extra points failed.

The Saints added a little insurance just five minutes later when the Woodmore punter found his own player running in front of the ball as it left his foot. The result was a St. Paul recovery just 25 yards from paydirt. Seven plays later the third Flyer hit the scoring column as Missler raced in from three yards out. Again the pass failed and the score held at 20-0.

St Paul mounted another attack before the game was over and only manners

stopped them from scoring. On a second down play Wasiniak had two players wide open in the end zone but neither could decide on who was going to get the six points and during the course of the "argument" the ball dropped harmlessly into the end zone.

Gottfried's charges showed their best offense of the young season as they rushed for 222 yards, 162 of them coming in the second half. An additional 99 came in the air and 19 first downs were jotted in the ledger.

The defense again rose to the occasion after some early anxious moments. Woodmore picked up six first downs and 84 yards in the first half but then managed just one fumble-aided first down and 26 yards in the second half.

A much more satisfied Flyer team and coaching staff left the field after this one and the locker room chatter centered around the phrase, "Eight more to go."

A Key To Victory

Cardinals Doing It Hard Way

(UPI) — The St. Louis Cardinals are showing how to back into the National League pennant without really trying.

The Cardinals have had their second straight pennant virtually locked up for weeks, but they're having a difficult time making it official because their play has become so haphazard.

The Cards committed four errors and suffered their seventh loss in the last nine games Friday night when the Houston Astros exploded for three runs in the first inning and registered a 4-2 triumph.

But the Cards still moved a step closer to the pennant, reducing their "magic number" to three because the San Francisco Giants were beaten by the Cincinnati Reds 6-3. The Cards are going to have to find their form again if they hope to win a second straight World Series.

Elsewhere in the National League, New York blanked Pittsburgh 2-0, Los Angeles whitewashed Atlanta 2-0, and Philadelphia beat Chicago 3-1 in the first game of a doubleheader but lost the second game 9-1.

In the American League, Detroit blanked Oakland 3-0, Boston shutout Minnesota 3-0, New York swept a doubleheader from Washington 4-2 and 2-1, Chicago nipped California 2-1 and Cleveland bombed Baltimore 10-2.

The New York Yankees, who used to get fat on the lean of the American League are back on their old diet.

Although practically stripped bare of the talent which abounded on their championship teams, the Yankees have shown in the last week a resurgence of the old familiar pattern of destroying the lesser-likes.

The Yankees, with Mel Stottlemyre gaining his 20th victory in the first game and rookie Stan Bahnsen posting his 16th triumph in the nightcap, stretched their winning streak to eight games Friday night by sweeping a doubleheader from the Washington Senators 4-2 and 2-1, and in so doing moved to within one-half game of fourth place.

All eight victories during the streak have come against the tenth place Senators and the ninth place Chicago White Sox.

Mickey Mantle, one of the last links to the glory days, aided Stottlemyre in the opener with a sacrifice fly and a run-scoring double as the Yankees pinned the loss on Joe Coleman.

Willard Wins 24-8

WILLARD — The Willard Crimson Flashes won their second consecutive victory here Friday night against Lexington 24-8. The Flashes made three touchdowns in a space of five minutes in the second quarter.

Senior quarterback Tim King was in the game for only one play, and made good use of that time by

making the Flashes' first touchdown, with 7:33 left in the half. Chuck Barrison threw a block as King went around the left end from only a few yards out.

Three minutes later, Barrison capped a 64-yard drive with an 11-yard run into the end zone. Halfback Bob Stover set up the scoring play with a 44-yard

rush in the drive on a trap play up the middle.

Lexington was allowed only four plays before the Flashes were back in possession. Getting the ball on their own 25, the Flashes drove the 75 yards to pay dirt with two minutes remaining.

Willard added its final six points in the third quarter on a double pass play. Quarterback Bob Thornton passed to Don Wilson, who threw a halfback option pass to end Mike Pelchar. The play covered 30 yards.

Lexington picked up its touchdown in the last quarter when Steve Cokely ran nine yards around the right end. The TD came after a drive of eight plays that covered 54 yards.

Lexington picked up the bonus points on a pass from Steve Bowen to Ken Norke.

NEW ORLEANS (UPI) — The money will be on the line for real Sunday as the Cleveland Browns meet the New Orleans Saints in their season opener.

With the start of the regular season, some unanswered questions are posed by the new Browns lineup. For example, can

Charlie Harraway handle the fullback role vacated by Ernie Green when he injured his knee during the early part of the exhibition season?

Coach Blanton Collier apparently thinks so, having chosen Harraway for the starting job after much juggling of running backs

which included the purchase of a Canadian League dropout and the trade of Notre Dame ace Larry Conjar to Philadelphia for a high draft choice.

Harraway is 6-2 and weighs 215 pounds. He has been hoping for a starting assignment ever since Jim Brown retired.

In appearances thus far, Harraway has exhibited only flashes of the power and speed the Browns believe he has.

Besides Harraway, there are other question marks in the Cleveland backfield. Take Frank Ryan. For most of the exhibition season, the mathematician -

quarterback was unable to hit his receivers with any regularity. The Browns expect him to be back on the beam Sunday with all the experimenting out of his system.

Backing up Ryan is former Pittsburgh Steeler quarterback Bill Nelsen who came to the Browns

around the beginning of training camp and is still adjusting to Cleveland's style of play.

The Browns have only two quarterbacks, having dealt away Dick Shiner to get Nelsen and Gary Lane to the New York Giants for a draft choice.
