

# Reserve 'Fouls Out' **Against BR**



Slaughter carried the ball 47 times for the Redmen

and gained most of their 264 yards on the ground. During the first half it looked as though Norwalk might end a 16-game losing streak. At the half Bucyrus was ahead by just a single point, 14-13.

Slaughter was practically a one-man show. He carried 47 of the Redmen's 61 plays on the ground, returned one punt for 11 yards, and threw two passes, both of them incomplete.

One fan commented after the game, "He's still running — pulling the bus back to Bucyrus.'

The Truckers scored first when Tom Budziszewski returned a Bucyrus punt 28 yards. Dale Perkins added the extra point with a kick and Norwalk led 7-0.

But Bucyrus came down the field in only five plays and Slaughter carried from the one-yard line for the score. Slaughter ran for the conversion and Bucyrus led 8

The Truckers took the kick and drove from their own 20 in 11 plays, with the help of a couple of pass interference calls. At the Bucyrus 15, quarterback Willie Robinson, who started in place of injured Jed Bohn, called an end around reverse, which worked perfectly and end Dan Smith scampered into the end zone.

Bucyrus defender Tim Spurlock blocked the kick and the Truckers held a 13-8 edge.

Rick Wilson returned the kickoff to his own 45 and it took Bucyrus 11 plays to score with Carl McMichael hitting end Dave Foulk with a 33-yard scoring pass.

The second half was all Bucyrus. Neither team moved the ball well until late in the third period when Bucyrus started a drive on its own 42.

Slaughter carried the ball nine straight times to the Norwalk seven. After back Dick Predmore carried to the one, Slaughter plunged over. He ran for the two extra

After Norwalk had the ball again for a series of plays, Bucyrus started another drive, this time from the Norwalk 44. Slaughter scored again with an 18-yard run. Tackle Ned Raybuck kicked the extra point.

With the game well out of reach for the Truckers, Bucyrus added another score with a little more than five minutes remaining in the game.

Dwight Felkey intercepted a Willie Robinson pass at the Norwalk 48 and six plays later, Slaughter ran for the TD from the one.
