# Another Perfect Flyer Season

## Norwalk Rallies Late, Whips Perkins



By DON HOHLER PLYMOUTH - Norwalk St. Paul's shook off a first quarter scare by the Big Red from Plymouth here Friday night, and went on to

win 30-8. It crowned a second straight perfect season for the Flyers.

The Flyers got on the scoreboard first but Plymouth refused to be awed. Taking the ensuing kickoff from their own fouryard-line, they ripped 96 yards in 18 plays. The Big Red took the lead with a two - point conversion.

Behind the field generalship of senior quarterback Chris Amato, the Flyers marched right back, scoring in the final second of the first half. From this point, they were in complete control.

Junior halfback Denny Meyer slashed three yards for the initial score for the Saints to cap a 54-yard

Potts converted to make it 7-0 with 4:49 left in the first quarter.

Plymouth was not about to call it quits, however, as the hard running of fullback Terry Buzard and halfback Craig Forquer soon got the game on even terms.

Going to the air only once, quarterback Mike Beard sent his two power runners slamming into the Saints line with positive results on almost every try.

It took 18 plays to get the job done with Buzard lunging over from the three. He added the extra points on an end run and the Redmen were on top, 8-7.

Amato then showed the capacity crowd why his arm has thrown for over 3,000 yards in his high school strikes in five tries in taking his team 59 yards in a minute and a half.

A 21-yard toss to Wasiniak set up the final play of the first half. The throw for the TD went to senior halfback Rich Frank who ran a flag pattern and caught the ball in full stride in the end zone. Fullback Jack Lodermeier crunched into the end zone for the extra points and the Saints were back on top, 15

• Statistics in the first half showed why the Big Red was in the game. Their defense allowed the Flyers just one net yard while they were rolling up 116. The Saints did have 131 yards topside with Amato hitting on 11 of 16 throws.

The Flyers took full command in the third quarter as Wasiniak set up the third touchdown when he partially deflected a Plymouth punt which rolled dead on the Flyer 48.


Amato hit Wasiniak for 42 yards on the first play and Meyer side-stepped his way the final 10 yards on the next play for the score. The extra point try failed, making it

WILLARD - Willard lost its last game of the season to Tiffin Calvert, 14-13 Friday night. Calvert finishes with an 8-2 season mark.

The game was marred by 18 penalties, 12 were called against Calvert setting them back 150 yards. Willard was called for six infractions for 70 yards.

Tiffin opened the scoring on their first offensive play as Senior halfback Roger Logsdon scored on an 81-yard run.

With 6:11 remaining in the first quarter, Willard's sophomore quarterback Steve Schwan passed 12 yards to sophomore end Cliff Maddocks to tie the game. Steve Schlatter's kick gave the Crimson Flashes a short lived 7-6 lead.

With 2:00 to go in the first quarter Logsdon again scored for Calvert, this time on a one-yard plunge. What proved to be the winning points came on a pass from Ron Walders to end Steve Callaghan for the points after and gave Calvert a 14-7 halftime lead.

Clay Wants To Fight Again

NEW YORK (UPI) - Deposed heavyweight champion Cassius Clay, whose efforts to get permission to fight again have ended in frustration, has taken his case to the courts again.

A suit was filed in Federal Court on behalf of Clay Friday to force the New York State Athletic Commission to issue him a boxing license. His license was suspended in June of 1967 when he refused to be inducted into the Army, and the commission turned down a new application for a license on Oct. 14.

At the time Clay's application was rejected, commission chairman Edwin B. Dooley said, "I think Clay is a fine man, ST. PAUL 7 8 6 9-30 POOLEY Said, I tillink Clay is a line man, PLYMOUTH 0 8 0 0-8 and I'd love to see him get a chance to

fight somewhere else. I think he's the greatest fighter in the world, and it's a shame he doesn't have a chance to fight. But we can't bend the rules to grant him a license here.'

Clay's application was turned down on the grounds that allowing him to fight would not be in the best interest of boxing.

Clay's suit charged that the New York Athletic Commission, Dooley and the other members were depriving him of his constitutional right to earn a livelihood. It alleged that he is a devout member of the Muslim faith and was ordained a minister.

SANDUSKY — Norwalk High School overcame three years of frustration here Friday night and wrote a surprise ending to a football season that opened in despair.

The Truckers — playing the familiar role of underdogs came from behind in the fourth quarter to upset the Perkins Pirates 11-8.

Ironically it was a fellow named Perkins who smashed the Pirate lair. If Trucker halfback Dale Perkins is any kin to the

Sandusky school, he's one Perkins High would just as soon First, the curly-haired halfback booted a 24-yard field goal late in the third quarter after the Pirates had gone

ahead 8-0 early in the period. His kick made it 8-3. Then in the final quarter, he scored the winning touchdown, ramming through the middle for five yards,

The victory sweetened what had started as another dismal football season at Norwalk High School. Its third straight victory lifted the Truckers to a record of four wins and six losses.

And it must be especially sweet to Coach Leonard Hardman and his coaching staff who worked so hard to produce the results.

"We just started our season," beamed defensive coach Jerry Emmons in the noisy Norwalk dressing room. "Only trouble is we'll lose a couple stars during the midseason break. Huron (first 1970 game opponent) here we

The Truckers also picked up a two-point safety as tackle Dave McGuckin dropped a Perkins ball carrier in

Sonny Coles and Tom Edwards were the defensive men of the hour for the Truckers. The pair stormed through the Perkins offense to block two Pirate punts and

The Perkins game marked the first road victory for Hardman in his two years with the Truckers. It was the first time Norwalk has won three in a row since 1960 when the Truckers finished 8-1. It also was the best record since 1965 when the Truckers were 4-5.

The Truckers and Pirates could neither muster an offense in the first half and battled to a 0-0 halftime

The Pirates came on strong in the third quarter. On the fifth play of the quarter halfback Ernie Thomas sprinted 70 yards. The clock read 9:13 when halfback Robin Haddox ran in for the extra points to give the Pirates an 8-0 lead.

Perkins' field goal late in the period was set up by a blocked punt which was downed on the Pirate 14. After failing to move the ball on three plays, Perkins sailed a

perfect kick through the cross bars. Norwalk still needed six points to win and on the first Perkins' play of the fourth quarter the Truckers got their

chance. The Pirates were deep in their own territory on the 17 and had to punt. A bad pass from center prevented the kicker from getting the ball off, and Edwards and Coles tackled him on the 8. Three plays later, Perkins plowed through the middle from the five to put the Truckers

That was all Norwalk needed but the Trucker defense would have to hold the Pirates for 10 minutes and 26

seconds. They did. Norwalk took over again on its own 47. Norwalk's Perkins did all the ball-carrying to put the ball on the Pirate three before a fumble gave the ball to the Pirates

on fourth down. Perkins took over on the four from where McGuckin spurted through to down Pirate Robin Haddox for a

safety. Norwalk went ahead to stay 11-8 with a little over a minute to play.

Perkins got a free kick from the twenty and Norwalk quarterback Doug Ott ran the clock out to give the Truckers their third win in a row.

## Vikings Favored **Over Cleveland**

CLEVELAND (UPI) - For the second straight Sunday, the Cleveland Browns, leaders of the Century Division of the National Football League, play the leaders of another division in the climactic game of the pro-

The Browns Sunday demolished Dallas 42-10 despite the fact they were six-point underdogs to the previously undefeated Cowboys, leaders of the Capitol Division.

Unimpressed, the oddsmakers have made the Vikings 6-1 eight point favorites over Cleveland (5-1-1). The leaders of the Central Division have on their side the momentum of a six-game winning streak and their home

The Vikings are more feared for their defense than their offense. Their defensive linemen, Jim Marshall, Alan Page, Gary Larsen and Carl Eller, known as the "Four Norsemen" or "The Purple People Eaters," have trapped quarterbacks 33 times this year, second in the

Their hard rush squelched the attack of the Greenbay Packers in Minnesota's 19-7 triumph earlier this season. But the Vikings also have formidable offense. Joe

Kapp is tied for the league lead with 14 touchdown passes, with the Browns' Bill Nelsen and the Los Angeles Rams'

Kapp, who averages 6.9 yards per pass, has also run for 5.5 yards per carry. The burly Californian, who spent ten years in the Canadian leagues before coming to the NFL, is one of the loop's strongest men.

Kapp's favorite target is Gene Washington, who has 25 catches with an average gain of 23.2 yards.
