LONDON (AP) — The International Amateur Athletics Federation said there is no chance of Communist China's Ni Chinh - chin being recognized as the world record high jumper

Ni cleared 7 feet, 61-10 inches last Sunday, surpassing the official record of 7 feet, 5 9 - 10 inches held by Russia's Valery Brumel seven years ago.

"Communist China is not a member of the federation," said John Holt, executive director of the IAAF. "Therefore we have no machinery for checking the jump. All we can do is to note it with the greatest in-
