Late Findlay Rally Tumbles Tygers, 20-19

FINDLAY — The Tygers of Mansfield Senior High came within nine seconds of recording an oft - postponed Buckeye Conference football victory here last night.

Findlay quarterback Keith Woodruff, although cooled through most of the way by an icily - proficient Tyger defense, came back to lead the Trojans (5-1 in BC and 7-2 overall) to a 20-19 victory before nearly 4,000 screaming

Mansfield (0-6 and 2-6-1) held a 19-8 advantage going into the final six minutes when Woodruff directed the Trojans on two scoring drives of 73 yards each. During those efforts, which took eight and five plays respectively, Woodruff hit on five of eight passes for 121 yards.

The 175 - pound senior, being touted for All - Ohio honors, closed the gap to 19-14 with a three - yard plunge with 4:40 remaining and connected with End Jeff Bixler for a

six - yard touchdown with nine seconds showing on the clock.

The Tygers, displaying a diversified offense which completely dominated play until the final minutes, came from an 8-0 first - quarter deficit to take a 13-8 lead at halftime. Halfback Ray Webb provided the scoring punches on a six yard burst and later on the 30 - yard running end of a 48 yard "flea - flicker" combination with End Jeff Weber providing the relay from Quarterback Ron Castle.

Castle scored the third - period touchdown with 1:47 left on a five - yard slant. The first and third tallies came as a result of pass interceptions by Tom Hipp and Joe Petrella. Russ Bishop snared a third Woodruff aerial in the closing moments of the first half and a second "flea-flicker" was stopped from going all the way when the pitch - out from Keith Shulko to Webb was fumbled and lost.

Hipp was lost to the Tygers midway through the third stanza with an injured shoulder. Tyger officials said a doctor indicated the arm was not broken, but Hipp will probably be sidelined for the 1970 finale against Sandusky next

The eveness of the statistics is misleading. While Findlay out - netted the Tygers by a 293-253 margin, 151 of those Trojan yards were racked up in those final six minutes.

And Woodruff, who has been the recipient of adequate protection in previous games, was dropped for six losses totalling 36 yards by the Tygers' defensive unit featuring Dan Blakely, Chuck Mason, John Hafford and Jim Lewis.

Greg Warndorf led the Tygers in rushing, collecting 64 yards on 17 carries as Trojan defenders keyed on the 200 pound All - Ohio candidate. Webb backed the charge netting 63 yards in 12 tries.

Also garnering well - deserved laurels is the Tygers' offensive line which allowed Castle time to connect on five of 13 pass attempts for 70 yards. Weber had the other Mansfield completion, throwing for 25 yards to Shulko on a take punt during their first scoring move.

The Tyger marching band shared the half - time show with the Findlay musicians.
