Mansfield Wins, 13-8

Mansfield Senior High parlayed a superior first-half effort into a 13-8 football victory over Cleveland East Tech before 4,500 fans at Arlin Field.

The Tygers struck for touchdowns in each of the first two periods to build up a 13-0 lead at intermission. They held off a determined last-quarter performance by the mountainous East Techers to open the campaign on a victo-

Hark-working Greg Warndorf scored the first touchdown on a one-yard drive into the line and a six-yard pass from junior quarterback Ron Castle to Keith Shulko accounted for the second. East Tech scored early in the fourth period on a 63-yard aerial from Willie Smith to Monroe Larkin.

Mansfield's only other sojurn into scoring territory was aborted by the first-half gun. The Tygers had scored with 29 seconds left in the half and on the first play after the kickoff junior tackle John Hafford stole the ball from Smith on the 40. A Castle pass was incomplete. Then with time running out Castle hit junior halfback Marty Lamie on a modified screen he sped 31 yards to the nine before being decked by the final Scarab defender.

Warndorf, a 200-pound senior veteran, pounded into the giant East Tech defensive line 25 times for 101 yards. Six of those carries came on the first Tyger touchdown drive. Don Blakely, a junior tackle, had recovered a East Tech fumble on the 25. Warndorf drove 13 yards on the first play and then spliced together five short gainers to put six points on the scoreboard.

A 16-play, 49-yard drive gave the Tygers the winning touchdown. Longest plays on the march were a ten-yard sweep by Lamie and a 10-yard pass from Castle to the sixfoot-three Shulko. On fourth down, Shulko slipped behind the East Tech defense in the end zone and Castle lofted the ball to him for the score.

East Tech made its first journey deep into Tyger land in the third quarter, but the effort fell short on the ten when a Smith pass was incomplete. Then in the fourth quarter, Larkin was interfered with on a pass pattern but bounced away, grabbed a long pass from Smith and romped into the end zone on the 63-yard play.

Late in the quarter East Tech took over on the Tyger 34 and mixed power sweeps with aerial strikes into the porous Mansfield pass defense and marched to the 16. There on fourth down, Blakely broke through to smear Smith with 1:24 remaining and the Tygers ran out the dock.

The 96-member Tyger marching band presented a halftime show of "musical styles throught the years." Tunes included "Marching Along to the Blues," a Dixieland arrangement of "Jazz Me Blues," "Acapulco 1922" and "Big Red," a tune which has been recorded by the Baja Marim-




