Gilchrist Home At Fullback

Mauch picked up nine on the first carry and Smith four to the five-yard line and a first and 10. On the next play, Mauch dented left tackle for another yard before Smith broke over right guard to score. Senior quarterback Frank LaSalvia tossed to Carl Balsizer for the two-point conversion.

The invaders, ended the season with a 4-6 and 2-6 record while St. Mary's finished the campaign 5-4-1 and 3-4-1. Gibsonburg also snapped a two-game losing streak to the Blue and Gold as it marked the third time this season the Panthers were shutout in the point department. St. Mary's lost to Margaretta 20-0 and tied Oak Harbor 0-0.

The shutout also was the 16th in the series between the two schools. St. Mary's holds the edge 9-7. The Blue and Gold also leads in the overall series with a 16-9-1 record.
