

Ontario Repeats As League Victor

Ontario captured the Johnny Appleseed Conference high school football crown last night with a tremendous 30-0 triumph over previously unbeaten Fredericktown (4-1-1 and 6-1-1). Defending champion Ontario, with one JAC game remaining, is now 6-0-0 and 7-0-1.

Ontario . . .

ONTARIO — The Ontario Warriors saw red here last night and ran straight at the crimson-clad Fredericktown Freddie's for four touchdowns, a field goal and three extra points for the homecoming victory.

The Warriors completely dominated the "JAC Game-Of-The-Week" holding Fredericktown to a minus four yards from scrimmage through the errorless efforts of the defensive unit, aptly named "Savages." And Fredericktown garnered only a lone first down for its efforts, that coming on a 12-yard pass completion in the third period Ontario rushed for 318 yards.

Ontario's offensive slashes left little doubt as to the outcome of the contest following the first series of plays. Mike Riley, Ron Cooper and Randy Gates alternated running for yard-

age in a 61-yard drive in 13 plays. Riley hit off tackle for three yards and a touchdown with 5.46 left in the initial period.

Hard-charging fullback Vernon Yancey scored the touchdown show. Yancey scored three times on runs of 14, four and four yards, gaining 96 yards in the course of the contest.

But it was the running of sophomore halfback Craig Hunt that make Warrior football hopes seem bright. Hunt, who entered the offensive battle in the second quarter gained 113 yards from scrimmage, one run covering 60 yards.

Ontario's exchange student Eduardo Mata, from Costa Rica scored four points. Mata booted a 26-yard field goal with 14 seconds remaining and was perfect on an extra point try.

LOUDONVILLE — Lexington and Loudonville knotted the score in the first half and neither team could push the ball across a goal line in the remainder of the game.

The Minutemen hit the scoring lights first when Tony Delinides threw a short pass in the flat to Fred McLaughlin who found the path from the Loudonville twenty to the end stripe clear. The lone Lexington touchdown capped a 60-yard drive at the 4:39 mark in the initial segment of the game. Greg Ammons split the goal post to build the 7-0 lead.

Lexington was not able to mount a scoring drive in the remainder of the contest;

the deepest penetration being to the Loudonville 33-yard line in the fourth quarter.

Loudonville quarterback, Rick Browning, kept the ball and ran 25 yards with 4:04 in the second quarter left to play Maurizio Schindler kicked the points.

PLYMOUTH — It was homecoming night at Plymouth prior to the kickoff. Coach Larry Root was asked: "Will homecoming provide your team some incentive?" Root replied, "I sure hope so."

Root's answer, somewhat hopeful but somewhat cautionable, took the turn for the best here last night when his Plymouth Big Red team out-dueled Clear Fork when it counted, and walked off the field with its win.

Following a scoreless first half in which Clear Fork outgained Plymouth on the ground 143 to 27 but saw the Big Red making the right defensive play at the right time, the scoreboard was finally dented.

Going into the shotgun offense on their own 30, the Big Red used the arm of Kim Carter to move all the way to the Colt 25. After two plays gained one yard and

The prices are \$16 for reserve seats, \$13.50 for adult season tickets general admission and \$6.75 for student season tickets general admission.

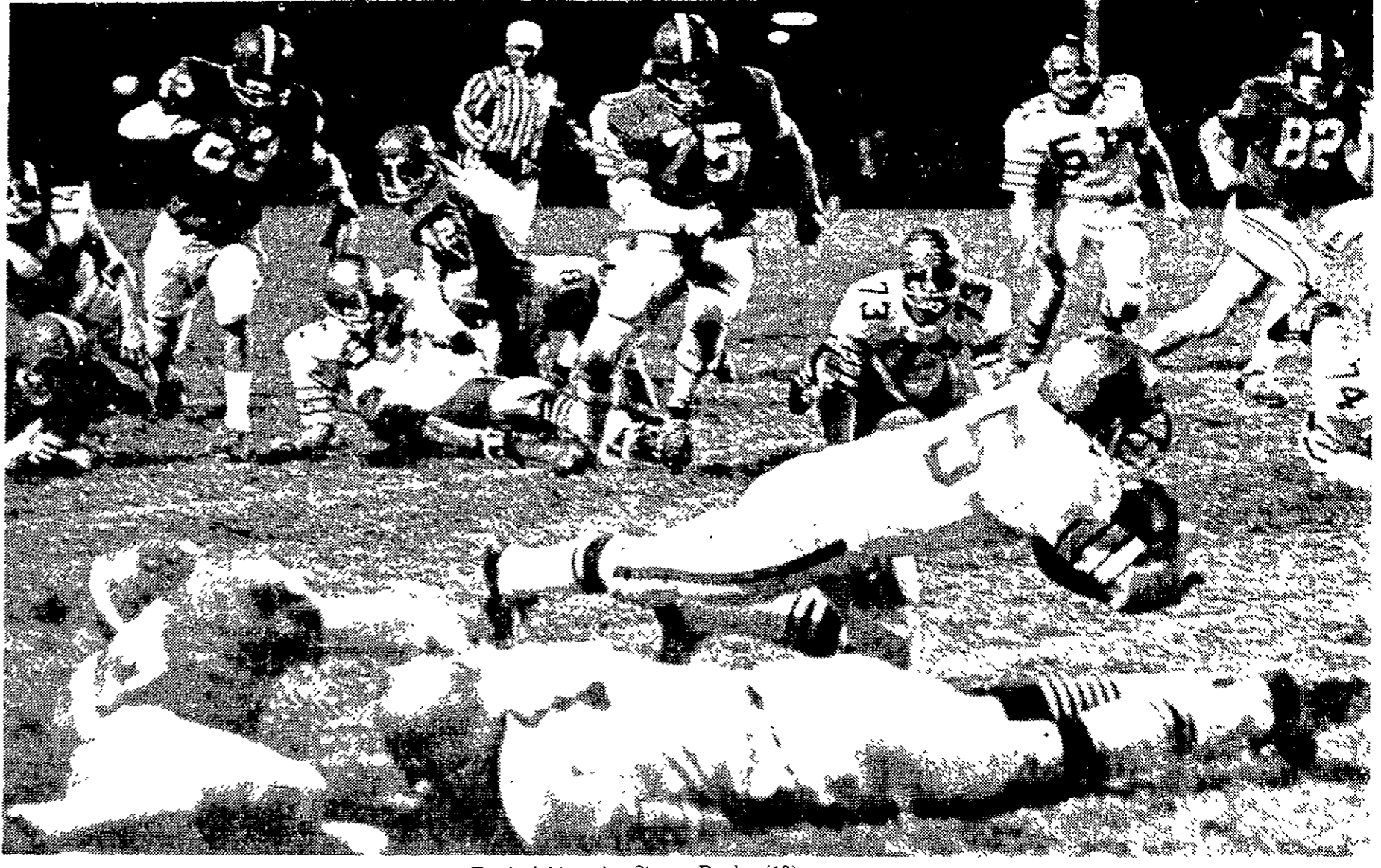

ASHLAND — The Ashland Arrows clinched at least a share of the Cardinal Conference title last night in a 35-14 football victory over Dover High School.

The defending CC champions took the opening kickoff on their own 37 and marched 63 yards in three plays to draw first blood in the test. Steve Strine capped the touchdown drive with 10:30 left in the first period on a 56-yard sprint around his own left end. Dave Bowersox successfully booted the first of three conversions.

Dover's second period score came with 4:20 remaining as the Tornados ripped off 58 yards in nine tries. Jon Devore snagged a Migliore pass for four yards to score. Ashland took inaugural possession of the Elks Clubs' rotating trophy after the game. The trophy was presented to the two schools by the Ashland and Dover Elks Clubs.

ELYRIA — Bay High School broke through Mansfield Christian's defense for two second half goals and subdued the Flames, 2-0, in the first round of the Lake Ridge Soccer Tournament here yesterday.

Bay (11-3), outshooting Christian, 23-10, kept the Flames in defensive posture through most of the match with a strong long-passing game. Mansfield (8-3) was to meet host Lake Ridge this afternoon for third place in the event.

Only tenacious defense, led by goalie Jerry Cline, kept the aggressive Rockets scoreless through the first half. Bay got off nine shots before intermission to just three Flame attempts.

Mansfield had a picture-play opportunity to break the scoreless deadlock midway through the second quarter. Wing Dave Storm, still recovering from a flu bout, broke free with a downfield dribble on the left side and chipped a pass across in front of the goal. Teammate Jim Haring won the race to the ball but his shot rose just above the crossbar.

Cline personally choked off Bay's best scoring chance in the half, a penalty kick in the 31st minute of play. Eric Johnson blasted the kick toward the right side of the net, but the 6-4 junior goalkeeper sprung to his left with the kick, knocking the ball away from the goal.

Friday he put together a two-under-par 69 for a two-round total of 134 — eight under par.

He was tied with a pair of the game's new breed, Rookies John Mahaffey and Lanny Wadkins, each seeking his first title. Mahaffey, 24, had a sparkling 66 that included eight birdies, and the 22-year-old Wadkins, who went to Wake Forest on an Arnold Palmer scholarship, had a 69.

At 136 were Bobby Mitchell, with a 66 and Dick Lotz, 69.

Lee Trevino, the defending title holder, took a 72 and was well back at 142.

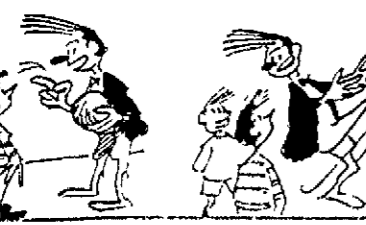
