

Red overcomes Cougars, 14-0

Plymouth struck for two scores at Crestview Saturday and throttled an admittedly weak Cougar offense to win its second game of the season, 14 to 0.

Crestview played a handful of freshmen and gained only 17 yards rushing and just 27 yards passing.

Meanwhile, Plymouth's offense was not so awesome. It collected 150 yards on the ground and 92 in the air, but there were four occasions when it stood in front of the Cougar goalposts with less than 30 yards to go to paydirt and couldn't score.

A pass interception halted a Red drive toward the end of the first quarter and Crestview set out from its 35. It pushed to the Plymouth 37 and ran out of 37.

HERE THE VISITORS began their first TD drive.

Kim Carter's 27-yard run off left tackle was the big gainer as Plymouth drove 62 yards in 11 plays for the score. Ray Hughes sneaked the last yard. The run for PATs resulted in a miserable fumble and a

fumble that nobody was sure who recovered.

By the end of the half, Plymouth was clearly the master. It collected seven first downs in 26 plays, amassing 86 yards on the ground and 25 through the air, having fumbled once and lost it once.

For its part, Crestview had its lone first down on the board, with 14 yards rushing and all of its passing yardage -- 27.

Mike Hamman's fumble -- and he was Plymouth's most effective runner this brisk afternoon -- halted Plymouth at the Crestview 45 early in the second half.

IN THE NEXT SERIES, starting from its 20, Plymouth could not move and was compelled to punt. The snap from center was poor and Carter was forced to eat the ball at his six.

Crestview had its golden opportunity and couldn't produce.

Whether it was the stout Red defense or the poor Cougar offense, no one will ever know. But it is a fact that Crestview could not score from the six in four shots and gave up possession at its 25, Hughes having made a second interception at the Red one and run it out that far.

A dubious tactical ploy blew up on Plymouth in the next series. A five yard penalty against the Cougars would have given the Big Red second and five at the Red 45. Instead, Plymouth opted for third-and-three at the 47.

Hughes fumbled and Crestview recovered. Twice again Plymouth was to penetrate inside the Crestview 30 without scoring. But the third time was a Big Red charm. Hughes' interception put Plymouth in business at the Cougar 31.

On second down Hamman hit left tackle for six. Carter took a pitchout to his left for five. A five yard penalty against Plymouth set the Big Red back to the 25. Hamman rounded right end for five. Carter fumbled and recovered, losing two. Hamman lost one going right and Crestview refused a penalty.

So on the fourth down, Hughes threw from a crowd and hit Carter in the end zone for the touchdown. The clock read 1:36.

Hamman ran the PATs and Crestview was dead. Crestview's first pass after the kickoff was intercepted by James Beverly, earlier the victim of his inexperience when Crestview completed its only pass right in front of him for 27 yards, and there was time for two shots into the line by Plymouth that were no more than a stall. Beverly was a stand-in for the injured Larry Reynolds.

It was not an exciting contest, but when you win, aren't they all exciting? Crestview is winless for the season. But it has possibilities because some of its freshmen are bound to produce in a season or two.

For Plymouth, it is all uphill from now on. Four of its five opponents are state ranked in the computer placement at levels far ahead of the Big Red. Score by periods:

Red 26th in district after four

First computerized rankings of Class AA teams in Ohio show Ontario rated fifth, Clear Fork in a three-way tie for 20th and Edison in a three-way knot at 25th.

Among Class A teams, St. Paul's ranks first, tied with Marion Pleasant.

Monroeville and New London are tied with Marion Catholic for 17th, South Central is alone in 23rd and Plymouth ranks with Bluffton, Danbury, Sandusky St. Mary's and Van Buren in 26th place. Western Reserve is tied with six other schools for 46th and last place in the northwest district.

Loudonville ranks 62nd among Class AA teams in the northeast district and Black River tied for 10th in the Class A division.

Crestline is tied for 50th, Crestview tied for 56th. Fredericktown ranks tied for 16th in the southeast district. The rankings are as of the fourth week.

Plymouth took first, third, fifth, sixth and 12th places. Ken Lucas fronted the field in 10:46. Mike Adams was third in 10:50, Ralph Noble fifth in 11:01, Brad Buzard sixth in 11:02 and Steve Adams 12th in 11:28.

Plymouth amassed 27, Hillsdale 37, Mapleton 76, Seneca East 82, Marion Pleasant 118.
