(UPI) — The impromptu news conference was pure Duffy Daugherty - it started with a joke. But when he was finished, his Irish eyes weren't smiling.

Daugherty tearfully concluded the news conference Friday evening by telling writers he had submitted his resignation as Michigan State's football coach, effective at the end of this sea-

it's an irrevocable deci sion," said the popular but heavily criticized Daugherty, whose 181/2 seasons and record of 106-68-5 are highs in the Spartans' proud football history.

"I wasn't forced out," he said. "I could have weathered it out and the administrators would have backed me. I want to make it completely clear I have been under no pressure from the administration."

But the public pressure and the pressure a coach puts on himself was there. The Spartans' 6-5 mark last season was their first winning year since the glory teams of 1965 - 66.

"I kept thinking I could turn the program around this year, but now I realize I can't," Daugherty said. "I feel Michigan State football deserves better and it isn't getting it." Michigan State was 2-4-1
