Cockroft Blossoming as More Consistent Cleveland Kicker

CLEVELAND (AP) - Amid all the adversity that has struck the Cleveland Browns football team this season, kicker Don Cockroft has stood out like a sore foot. Cockrost's first five seasons with the Browns were a model of inconsistency, but this fall he has blossomed into

the second - best punter in the National Football League and converted five of six field goal attempts. The Cheyenne, Wyo., native spent a year on the taxi

squad, then banged out 18 field goals in 24 tries in his first

season as a replacement for Lou "The Toe" Groza.

His punting never passed the mediocrity level with a career mark of 39.7 yards a kick for 251 boots and his field goal percentage fell under 60 per cent.

But all of a sudden, the blond - haired kicker turned into a tiger. Going into Sunday's game against the Chicago Bears, he has averaged 46.7 yards on his 25 punts, second only to Jerrell Wilson of the Kansas City Chiefs.

Cockroft isn't sure what caused the transformation. 'Concentration is the big thing," said Cockroft who ad-

mits being affected by bad boots. I'm the type of person that likes to do well in every-

thing. When I'm not playing up to my potential it puts me in a position that I don't like to be in. I'm letting a team down that works hard to score. If we can't get seven, we should get three." Cockroft's sense of responsibility so affected him after a

bad start last fall that his career marks were his worst ever and the Browns drafted George Hunt of Tennessee for competitive purposes. Coach Nick Skorich also hired Alva Tabor as specialty

coach and assigned him to work with the kick return teams and with Cockroft. "Now Don has someone to relate to and who can serve a

constant reminder about concentrating, keeping his eye on the ball and getting his whole foot into the kick.' The commence of the second contract of the contract of the contract of

Tabor, however, refuses to take credit for Cockroft's improvement.

'It's not me." said Tabor, "it's the personal attention one coach can give Don. He's a highly sensitive man and I felt he thought he was being left out of things before. Now he's made aware daily that he's an integral part of the whole picture."

Cockroft agreed with Tabor. "Kicking is the principle of mental discipline and all it takes is a fraction of a second of loose concentration to cause any kick to go bad."

Cockroft said Tabor has helped him because the specialty coach is constantly reminding him to concentrate and each week sets for Cockroft the goal of heating by five yards the average of the other club's punter.

The only exception this season was Wilson. Tabor told Cockrost just to match the Chiefs booter - and he did, responding with a 48 - yard average.
