Olympics Disastrous For U.S.

UPI Sports Editor MUNICH (UPI) — The 1972 Olympics have turned Russia, it looks like the Kremlin drew the blueprint.

The latest in a series of United States reversals was Jim Ryun's tragic fall near the end of the third lap of the 1,500-meter qualifying. He collided with Billy Fordjour of Ghana, fell to the tartan, lay stunned for about eight seconds, got up and finished ninth in a field


