

Ryun Trips, Out

Olympics Disastrous For U.S.

MUNICH (UPI) — The 1972 Olympics have turned from disbelief to disaster for the Americans. And, for Russia, it looks like the Kremlin drew the blueprint. The latest in a series of United States reversals was Jim Ryun's tragic fall near the end of the third lap of the 1,500-meter qualifying. He collided with Billy Fordjour of Ghana, fell to the tartan, lay stunned for about eight seconds, got up and finished ninth in a field of 10.

Only four qualified. Ryun protested, but the judges disallowed it and the four self-sacrificing years the Lawrence, Kan., star put in to try to avenge his defeat by Kip Keino in the 1968 Olympics ended in those few seconds.

Dave Wottle of Bowling Green, Ohio, and Bob Wheeler of Lutherville, Md., qualified, but only Wottle has a chance for a medal and he admits he's not optimistic.

The United States lost two other big decisions without breaking a sweat. The International Olympic Committee (IOC) kicked

quartermilers Vince Matthews and Wayne Collett out of the Games for their behavior on the victory stand Thursday and revoked Rick DeMont's gold medal in the 400-meter freestyle swimming event because he used a banned drug for an asthmatic condition.

The loss of Matthews and Collett means a makeshift team for the U.S. in the 1,600-meter relay Sunday and probably the loss of another gold medal. The team now will consist of Lee Evans, Maurice Peoples, Tommy Turner and Jeff Bennett who came to Munich as a decathlon entry.

The U.S. also lost all of its Greco-Roman wrestling matches, three of four boxing matches and advanced only Marcia Smoke of Buchanan, Mich., to the finals in canoeing. The Russians have seven in today's canoe finals, one for each event.

The only boxer to win and make it to the finals was light welterweight Ray Seales of Tacoma, Wash. He defeated Zvonimir Vujin of Yugoslavia and meets Anghel Angheloy of

Bulgaria Sunday for a gold medal.

The losers in boxing were middleweight Marvin Johnson of Indianapolis, welterweight Jesse Valdez of Houston and bantamweight Ricardo Carreras of New York City. All won bronze medals.

The other medals won by the U.S. were in yachting — Glen Foster of New York City in the tempest class and Donald Cohan of Philadelphia in the dragon class. These kept the Americans ahead of the Russians in the medal parade 81-74, but the Soviet Union leads in golds 34-27.

Russia finished first and second in the decathlon to add the title of the "world's all-round athlete" to a pair of prestigious titles they already had won — the "world's fastest human" and the "world's strongest man." This is the first time in history Russia has won this triple crown of the Olympics.

It was only the second time since 1928 that the U.S.

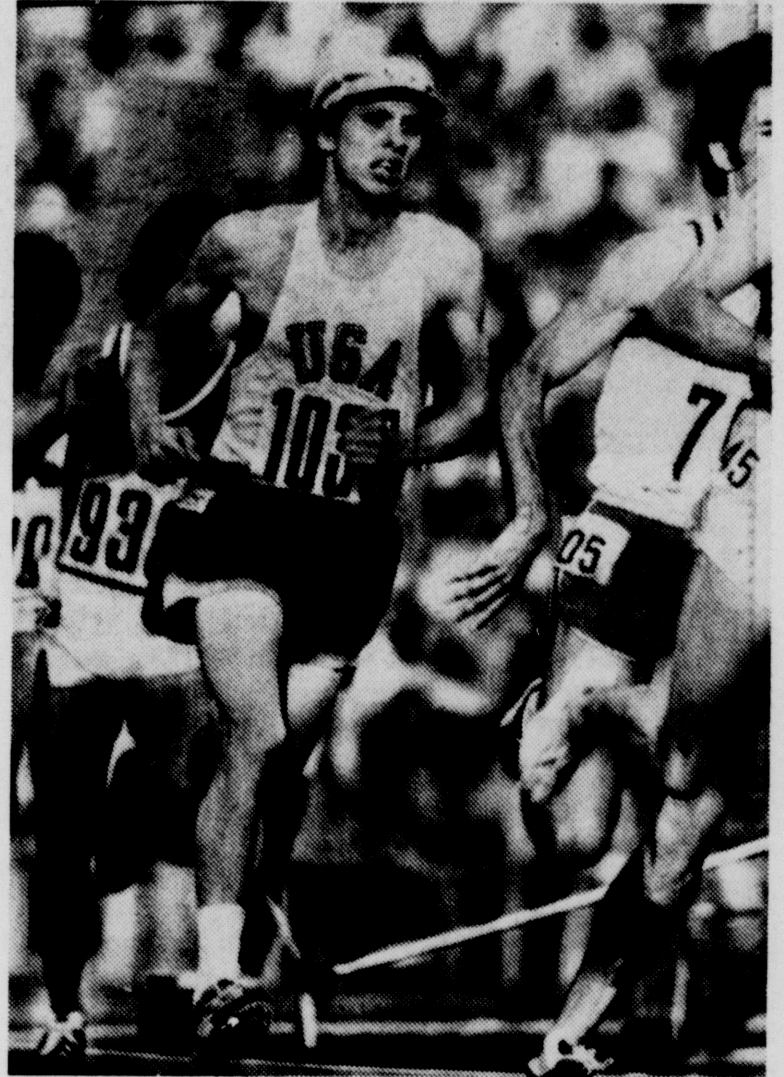
has lost the decathlon. Nikolai Avilov broke Jim Toomey's world record of 8,484 points in winning the grueling 10-event competition and teammate Leonid Litvinenko finished second.

The Americans were Bennett, of Vinita, Okla., in fourth, Bruce Jenner of Sandy Hook, Conn., in 10th and Jeff Bannister of Sandy Hook, Conn., in 22nd.

The only other gold medals went to East Germany's Annaliese Errhardt in the 200 meters and to the Russians in women's foil fencing. East Germany now has seven track gold medals to three for the U.S. Russia has six.

On the positive side, John Williams of Cranestown, Pa., is still leading in archery and the U.S. qualified three men each in the men's long jump and shot put.

The big event for the United States is the basketball finals with unbeaten Russia tonight. If the U.S. loses that one, it would be the crowning blow.

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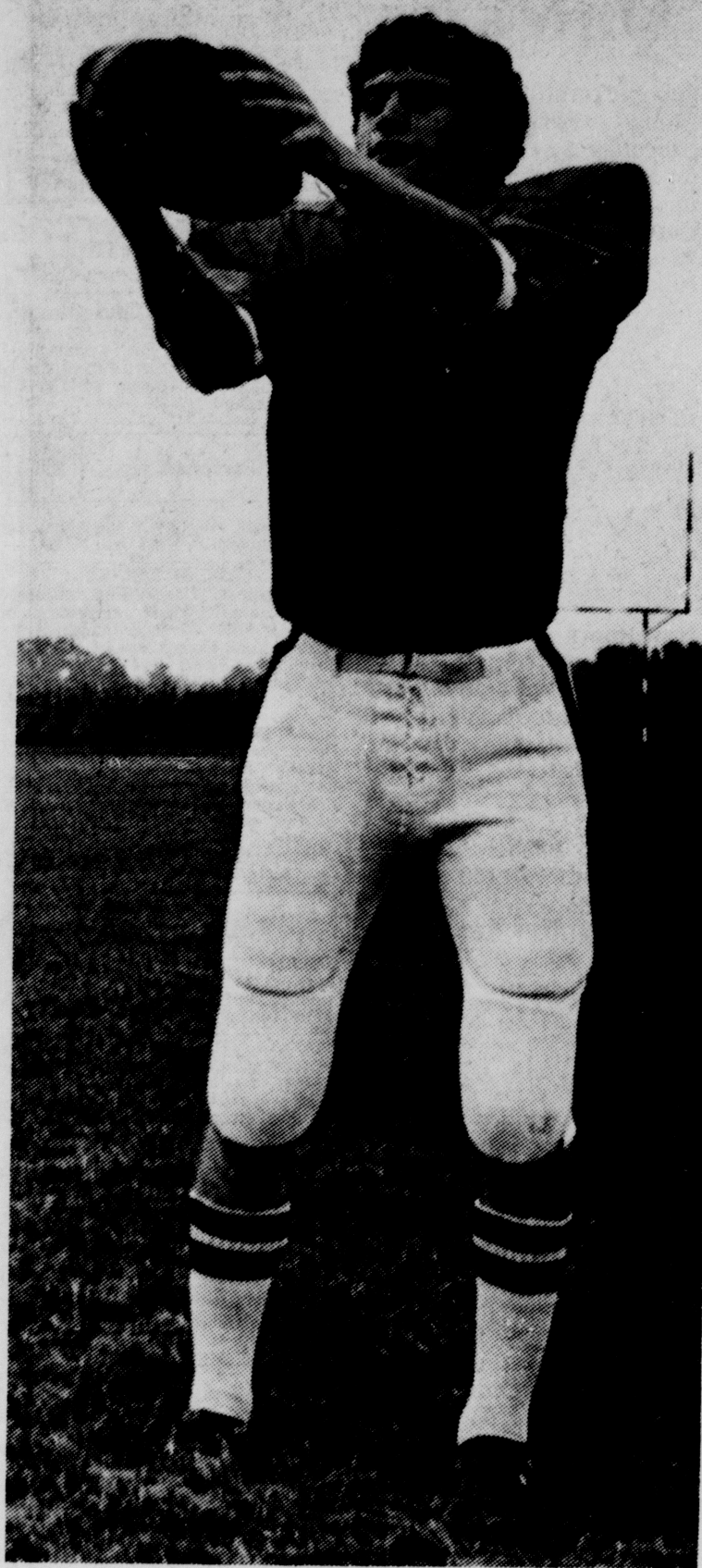
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South Central Shows It's For Real

PLYMOUTH — South Central gave prompt notice Friday night that it is not going to roll over and play dead this season as the Trojans stunned Plymouth 20-6.

Heroes in the convincing Trojan win were Roy Howard and Chuck Rinehart. They accounted for all the scoring as the Trojans downed the Big Red for the first time in six years.

Howard shot 13 yards for a score late in the first quarter and Rinehart kicked the extra point for a 7-0 lead.

The Trojans pounded away for the next quarter and a half before Rinehart blasted loose for a 54-yard scoring run in the third quarter. The kick failed, making it 13-0.

Plymouth threatened briefly in the final quarter after Don Cunningham pilfered a Guy Ebinger pass and took it back 55 yards for a score.

The Trojans then did something that they have not been able to do in the past several seasons — they came right back with a score.

This time, senior tailback Rinehart broke off a 24-yard scoring run. Howard notched the kick this time for the final 20-6 slate.

Northern Ohio League teams opened the 1972 season on a successful note Friday night as six of the eight schools picked up victories in independent contests.

In Willard, the Crimson Flashes pushed across a touchdown in the third period to beat the tough Tiffin Calvert Senecas, 6-0.

Bellevue had little trouble getting by Port Clinton 21-6. Shelby annihilated Perkins, 39-0. Galion dumped Clear Fork, 22-13. Upper Sandusky edged Delphos 6-0, and Tiffin Columbian blanked Mansfield Madison, 14-0.

In a loss, Ontario nipped Bucyrus, 7-0. Tiffin Calvert won every department but the score in Willard. Willard fullback Herb Garcia put the only points on the board with a six-yard run at 3:26 of the third quarter.

Each team missed a golden scoring chance. In the second period, Calvert drove to the Willard three only to stall out there. In the final period, the Flashes

fumbled the ball away on the Calvert one-yard line.

The Flashes amassed 139 total yards to 252 for Tiffin. Calvert notched 17 first downs to just nine for Willard.

Bellevue's Chuck Baptista scored two touchdowns to lead Bellevue's victory. His first was a six-yard run in the second period. In the third quarter, Baptista was on the receiving end of a Kip Loudenslagel pass that went for 34 yards and a score.

The Tornadoes held the edge on the ground and in the air, piling up 150 yards over land and 96 through passes. Madison collected 122 and 32 yards respectively.

Upper Sandusky's Kevin Newman scrambled five yards for a touchdown with 11:48 remaining in the fourth period to give the Rams' their opening night win over Delphos St. John.

Ontario's Mike Riley scored a 25-yard touchdown in the second period to give the Warriors the win. The only bright spot for Bucyrus was its passing game, which amassed 88 yards on eight of 12 passes.

WEST SALEM — Scoring in every quarter, the New London Wildcats flexed their football muscles in a convincing 39-6 win over Northwestern here Friday.

Junior running back Bobby Williams and senior Mark Mullins each picked up a pair of touchdowns with Dale Marshall and Tom Dunlap accounting for the rest of the points.

With less than five minutes gone, Williams chalked up an 18-yard TD run. Dunlap added the kick.

Williams and Dunlap teamed up the same way in the third period with Williams going 35 yards this time.

Mullins ran over the Huskies in the second quarter, as he scrambled 21 yards to paydirt at the 11:21 mark and then covered 54 yards four minutes later. Neither conversion was good.

Kicker and defensive lineman Dunlap picked up the final Wildcat score on a 40-yard run after a fumble recovery. He kicked his own conversion to make it 39-0.

Northern western quarterback Randy Yoder hit Dan Smith with a six-yard scoring pass with just 1:17 left to prevent the shutout.

Coach Paul Nestor, who hopes to revive both the football and basketball dreams for the Cats, should have been heartened by the 322 yards rushing and the 15 first downs for his squad.
