

Plymouth 42-6 Victim

St. Paul Seniors Romp

Tom Bellamy made believers out of the few who still doubted him Saturday night. Playing under the worst conditions possible, the versatile Flyer running back gained 199 yards in 20 carries as the Flyers rolled to an easy 42-6 win over Plymouth, ending an 8-1-1 campaign.

Although Bellamy stole the show, three other seniors responded with commendable performances. Tight end Norb Gross scored once on a pass from quarterback Chuck Hohler and split end Doug Coletta showed why he is on St. Paul's record-breaking relay team when he streaked 73 yards with a Hohler aerial to help open a 28-0 halftime bulge. Halfback Mike Pusateri also added two scores from long range on a night when everything went right for the locals.

"The seniors did it tonight. They came ready to play despite the condition of the field. I left them in there a little longer than what I would have liked to but they deserved to play. They worked hard all year and they should go out in style," Hubans said.

"This was our best team effort of the season. The penalties were the only mistakes we made. Patterns, blocks and the fundamentals were executed perfectly. We thought we could move the ball on them in certain areas and we did," Hubans explained.

But for Bellamy, it was a night to remember. His 39-yard touchdown run early in the third quarter was heralded as one of the finest ever witnessed at Whitney Field.

The play was set when linebacker Mark Spaar intercepted a Plymouth pass and returned it to the Big Red 44. Bellamy carried for 17 yards on his first three attempts and got the call from Hohler again on the fourth play.

The route was over right

tackle and after breaking a tackle at the line of scrimmage and one in the secondary, Bellamy found his path blocked by three more Plymouth players. Head fakes and stutter steps had all three flat on their stomachs between the 15 and the goal line. He then slammed into the end zone for the extra points before returning to the bench.

His 199 yards gives him 1,420 yards on the season and 3,520 yards over his high school career, both school records.

The Flyers got on the board midway through the first period when tackle Mark Schaffer jumped on a fumble after defensive end Charlie Brown ripped the ball loose from Plymouth passer Kim Carter on the Big Red 38.

After a five yard penalty, Hohler sent halfback Mike Pusateri toward the sidelines and then lofted a pass to him. Once Pusateri turned the corner it was a 43-

yard foot race to the end zone. The run for the extra points by Bellamy failed holding the count to 6-0.

Following the kickoff the Big Red moved to the Flyers 20 yard line using the runs of Carter for 30 yards on the first three plays. But a clipping penalty and two straight sacks by St. Paul linemen on Carter from his shotgun formation had the Big Red facing a third and 40 situation that forced a punt.

The Flyers blew the game open in the second period with three quick scores.

Spaar, who played his finest game of the season, recovered a fumble on the Big Red 25 on the first play of the second period. Bellamy streaked around the left side for the 25 yards on the first play and the fullback Tom Rekart used the same path for the extra points to make it 14-0.

Three minutes later, St. Paul had number three and

this one was even more sudden. Coletta, used primarily as a blocking back all year responded with a great catch on a fly pattern called by Hohler. He streaked 73 yards for the TD and the PAT try on a run failed.

The Flyers added one more before the half with the unheralded Gross stepping into the spotlight. He capped off a 13 play, 63-yard drive by taking a six-yard flip under the crossbars from Hohler for the six points. Bellamy tacked on the extra points with 52 seconds left in the half making it 28-0.

Bellamy then opened the scoring in the second half with his 39-yard effort to make it 36-0.

Plymouth then retaliated with a score early in the fourth quarter when a 12-play, 70-yard march paid dividends. Back-to-back 15-yard penalties aided the march. A 20-yard toss to

junior halfback Mike Hamman put the ball on the three and four plays later junior fullback Rich Dyer ripped into the end zone.

Dyer was held out on the extra point bid.

The Flyers got this score back quickly as they took the kickoff on the 33 and after Bellamy ripped for seven on the first play, Pusateri, seldom used as a running back, was given the call. He streaked 60 yards down the sidelines to signal the exit of the Flyer seniors on a night they will not soon forget.

Cleveland, San Diego In 'Mystery Team' Clash

SAN DIEGO (UPI) — Two mystery teams, the San Diego Chargers and Cleveland Browns, tangle tonight in the nationally televised National Football League game of the week.

The Browns have taken three straight and loom as challengers in the American Conference Central Division after a winless exhibition season and a miserable league start.

The Chargers have won only two but have scared the league's top teams, and Coach Harland Svare feels they have lost only because of mistakes in crucial situations.

Quarterback John Hadl exploded for four late touchdown passes against Dallas last week and Svare said afterwards that perhaps the team is ready to show what it can do.

This was to be a

rebuilding year for the Browns, especially after early injuries sidelined many starters. But the constant improvement of quarterback Mike Phipps and last week's shutout of Houston by the defense indicates they may have arrived.

The Browns have the always dangerous running of Leroy Kelly and Bo Scott but have also shown versatility in their passing attack. Phipps has divided his passes up among ends Milt Morin, Fair Hooker and Frank Pitts while still hitting the backs on occasional short ones.

The Chargers also have

devoted much of the year to running, with Mike Garrett and Cid Edwards both proving effective at moving the ball. They have failed to score much with the ball-control attack, however, and the big weapon remains long passes.

Both clubs showed a little in defense last year, but this year they have rebuilt to the point at which each is respectable.

The Chargers are slight favorites if they eliminate their mistakes. This year San Diego has lost the ball 30 times on fumbles and interceptions while Cleveland has lost it only 15 times.

Lenny Wilkens' Homecoming Bad For Sonics

SEATTLE, Wash. (UPI) — Lenny Wilkens got a warm homecoming Sunday night as he helped lead the Cleveland Cavaliers to their first win ever over the Seattle SuperSonics, 113-107, in National Basketball Association action.

Wilkins, who played the last four years in Seattle, three of those as player-coach, was afforded a two-minute standing ovation from 13,174 fans, the second largest crowd in the Sonics' history.

Wilkins, along with backcourt mate Austin Carr, wound up with 22 points. Carr opened the scoring with a 15-foot jump shot, with the assist going to Wilkins. The Cavaliers took the lead 2-0 and were never headed. The closest Seattle got was to within four points, 109-105, with just 24 seconds remaining in the game.

Scoring honors went to the Sonics' Spencer Haywood, who had 28 points. Haywood also lead all rebounders with 18.

It was Seattle's seventh straight loss and Cleveland snapped its own four game losing streak.

The 76ers, being creatures of habit, are back to their losing ways. Philadelphia, which had tied the National Basketball Association record for most losses at the start of a season with 15, finally won

its first game of the year on Saturday, defeating Houston.

But Charlie Scott, who set a club record of 20 points in the third quarter, led Phoenix to a 119-108 win over Philadelphia on Sunday, making the 76ers 1-16 thus far.

In the only other NBA contest Sunday, Portland nipped Kansas City-Omaha, 102-100, as Sidney Wicks hit a 20-foot jumper with four seconds left in the game.

The 6-5 Scott, who wound up with 33 points, broke the Suns' individual scoring mark for one quarter formerly held by Gail Goodrich, who tallied 19 in one 12-minute session against Los Angeles in 1969.

K.C. Fumbles Open Door For Pittsburgh

The ingredients were different — Pittsburgh used Ham and Miami used Mercury — but the results were the same — a step closer to the National Football League playoffs.

Jack Ham, the second-year linebacker from Penn State who has been the star of the Pittsburgh defense this season, recovered two fumbles Sunday to enable the Steelers to score 10 points in the last six minutes and upset the Kansas City Chiefs 16-7.

The victory, combined with Oakland's 20-14 triumph over Cincinnati, pushed the surging Steelers two games in front in the American Conference Central Division race and dropped the Chiefs a half-game behind Oakland in the West.

Miami, meanwhile, unleashed Mercury Morris on New England the elusive running back from West Texas State scored three TDs in the first half to set the stage for a crushing 52-0 rout of the Patriots. The victory was the ninth without a loss for the Dolphins, who now are

threatening seriously to become the first unbeaten team in the NFL since the 1942 Chicago Bears.

The triumph, the 100th for Miami coach Don Shula, left the Dolphins three games ahead of the New York Jets, 41-3 conquerors of Buffalo, in the AFC East with six games left.

In other action Sunday, Washington beat the New York Giants, 27-13, Minnesota held off Detroit, 16-14, Denver upset Los Angeles 16-10, San Francisco downed Baltimore 24-21, Atlanta ripped New Orleans 36-20, Green Bay topped Chicago 23-17, Dallas whipped St. Louis 33-24 and Philadelphia edged Houston 18-17. Cleveland is at San Diego tonight.

Kansas City led 7-6 on Jim Kearney's 65-yard return of a pass interception when Ham recovered an Ed Podolak fumble on the Chiefs' 37 to set up a 49-yard field goal by Roy Gerela, his third of the game, with 5:10 remaining. On the next series, Ham recovered Jim Otis' fumble on the Kansas City 18 and Franco Harris ran seven yards for the crushing TDK.

Charley Johnson threw a seven-yard TD pass to Jerry Simmons and Jim Turner kicked three field goals to lead Denver to its upset of Los Angeles and Steve Spurrier threw a 25-yard TD pass to Ted Kwalick with 5:20 left for the winning points in San Francisco's triumph over the Colts.
