New London survived a last-period scoring barrage by host South Central Friday night for a 35-29 victory. The win keeps the Wildcats undefeated overall (6-0)

and in a tie with St. Paul for the league lead (4-0). South Central dropped to 2-3-1, 1-3.

The winners posted 22 points in the third period, to overcome a 7-6 halftime advantage by the Trojans. With 7:57 left in the third period, Bob Williams scored from three yards out, and grabbed a conversion pass from junior quarterback Kevin Nestor for a 14-7 NL lead.

Just over four minutes later, halfback Doug Brown tallied on a six-yard run with Tom Dunlap booting the conversion for a 21-7 lead. With just 15 seconds to go in the third canto Williams scored from nine yards out, with Dunlap booting the PAT.

The visitors ran the count to 35-7 at 8:45 to go in the game, when Rod Bilton scampered 28 yards to paydirt, and Dunlap again was perfect with his placement.

From that point on, it was all South Central, as Guy Ebinger scored on a four-yard run at the 6:52 mark, and Ben Uselton ran for the conversion. Just over three minutes later Ebinger scored on a six-yard blast. Randy

Garner completed the scoring with 12 seconds on the clock as he grabbed a 36-yard pass from Ebinger, who then ran for the conversion.

In the first half, the contest appeared as if it would be a tough defensive struggle before the teams combined for 51 points after the intermission.

The hosts pleased the homecoming crowd by taking a 7-0 lead in the second period, when Uselton grabbed a fouryard pass from Ebinger. Doug Shepard kicked the point-

New London narrowed the count to 7-6 with 7:18 to go in the half, as Williams chalked up a 23-yard run. Brown set up the score with a 50-yard run. The run for the conversion failed.

Williams exploded for 212 yards on 25 carries, in addition to scoring 20 points. Brown ran for 170 yards on 15 cracks, as the winners totaled 424 yards on the ground.

'I have all the respect in the world for South Central to be able to come from behind like they did," commented New London coach Paul Nestor. "I'm proud of both teams. South Central has always been good hitters. They hit us as hard tonight as anybody did all year. Ebinger,

(Howard) Krikke and Uselton are the best three athletes on any team I've seen.

'The third quarter hurt us,' said South Central coach Ron Minard. "Guy Ebinger was injured for awhile and could not play, and this hurt us also. But this was his best game. We should have taken to the air more in the first

"New London was quick and tough. Coach Nestor is a good coach. He found the two plays going against us and used them. Our offense was decent. We wanted to stick to the ground, but we had to open up in the last half."

Jim Robson paced the Trojans in rushing with 46 yards on eight tries. In the air, South Central hit on 11 of 16 passes for 206 yards.

The Firelands Conference lead will be on the line Saturday, as the Wildcats visit St. Paul. South Central hosts Western Reserve Friday.

## Eagles Kush Past Mapleton 30-10

Monroeville remained in the thick of the Firelands Conference race Friday night with a convincing 30-16 conquest of visiting Mapleton. The Eagles now sport a 5-1 mark overall, and a 3-1 tally in Firelands Conference play, one game back of St. Paul and New London.

Mapleton dropped to 3-3, 1-3. The hosts jumped out front 8-0 on their first possession of the game, as Jed Myers broke loose on a 32-yard TD run with 9:42 left in the first period. He also ran for the

conversion and an 8-0 lead. The winners added 16 points in the second stanza, sparked by a successful fake punt play. The six-pointers came as mark, and Bob Grose scampered 27 yards. Grose snared a pass from quarterback Joe Moore after the first score, and Moore ran for the two-pointer after the second for a 24-0 halftime edge.

Joe Collins scored the first of two touchdowns for Mapleton with 3:58 left in the third period on a six-yard run, and Mark Newell ran for the conversion.

However, the Eagles countered on a 25yard scoring pass from Moore to junior end Doug Long. This time the run for the conversion failed.

Collins rounded out the scoring in the final minute of play when he bulled over from one yard out. Again Newell ran for the two-pointer.

Monroeville rushed for an impressive 344 yards, sparked by Myers with 151 yards and Grose with 95.

'They were big and strong, but we really did the job," commented Monroeville coach Sam Fornsaglio. "We just blew them off the offensive line. They had some tremendous kids. This Collins is the toughest kid we've played against all

"I'm really elated with the offensive line. And Jed Myers looked good at fullback, and so did the other two halfbacks. We might have had a letdown in the second half with that 24-point lead. And they're too big a team to let down

Collins paced Mapleton with 135 yards rushing. Sterling senior quarterback Phil Biddinger suffered an arm or shoulder injury on the last play of the first half, and saw no action after the intermission.

Monroeville now must prepare for Saturday's showdown at Edison.
