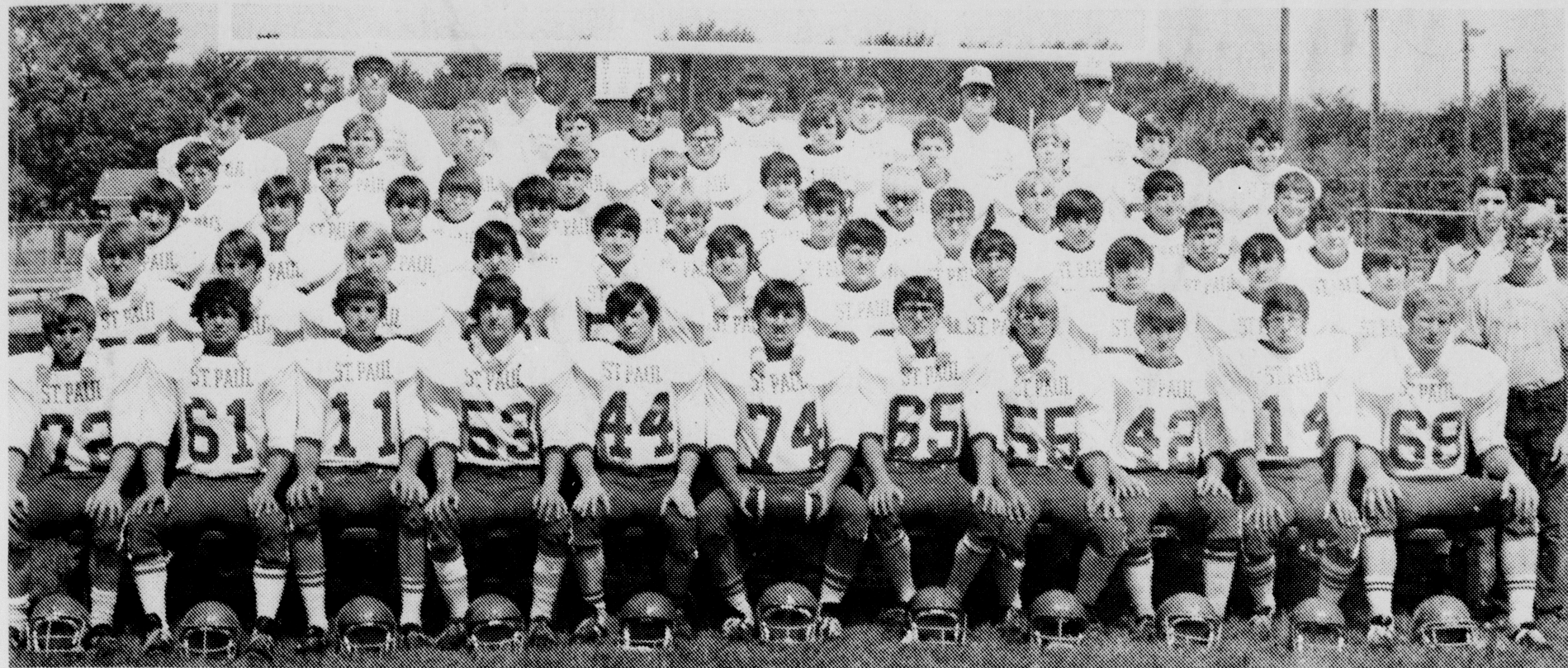

Borgeson Gains 144 Yards As Flyers Blank Plymouth

PLYMOUTH — Sophomore halfback Chuck Borgeson racked up 144 yards in 20 carries Friday night as the St. Paul Flyers finished the season with an easy 31-0 victory over winless Plymouth.

The loss by the Big Red was their 10th straight shutout of the campaign. St. Paul finished with a 9-1 record to go with a Firelands Conference co-championship.

The Flyers ran almost at will in the first half. Meanwhile their defense was halting the host team without a first down and a yardage total of minus one.

Borgeson and senior fullback Jim Soisson did the majority of the work the first time the Flyer offense gained possession. The drive covered 60 yards following a Plymouth punt.

Borgeson showed runs of 13 and 19 yards but it took a six-yard belt by Soisson on a key fourth-and-inches play. This put the ball on the eight. A half-the-distance penalty on Plymouth moved the ball to the four, and two plays later Soisson bulled in from the one. The attempted kick for the extra point was blocked, holding the score to 6-0.

After their second possession was halted by a pass interception, the Flyers made the third one count for eight-points. This drive covered 75 yards with the big play being a 36-yard aerial from quarterback Chuck Hohler to junior end Scott Tinker. A 15-yard holding penalty moved the ball to the Plymouth 25. Two plays later Soisson raced 17 yards through

the secondary before he was caught on the three yard line. Borgeson smashed in over tackle for the TD and used good blocking to sweep to the right for the extra points.

The Flyers put eight more on the board before halftime. Borgeson carried on five of the six plays it took to cover 57 yards. His 36-yard run on the second-last play featured great balance on his part as twice he was hit but refused to go down until he reached the two yard line. He then raced in on the next play. Soisson bulled over for the extra points making it 22-0 at the half.

Flyer Coach Bill Hubans used all 11 seniors on defense in the first series in the second half. Plymouth was quick to take advantage of the switch and moved for two first downs. The drive fizzled however, and St. Paul took over on its own 34.

Again the Flyers' offense was not halted. Even though faced with a first-and-25 situation after a dead ball foul, the Saints still kept the chains moving. A 10-yard pass from Hohler to Tinker and then a 19-yarder to Soisson, who slipped out of the backfield, moved the ball to the Plymouth 22. Five plays later halfback Bill Rospert swept to the right side and ran four yards untouched for the six points. Matt Gross, injured in the Monroeville game, came on to add the extra point to make it 29-0.

The Saints added two more points via a safety with just under three minutes left in the game. Running from a shotgun

formation, Plymouth punter Jim Miller could not handle a high snap from center. The ball sailed through his hands. Both Flyer tackles Dale Rinner and Mark Schaffer, nailed Miller in the end zone for the safety.

Rinner had one of his finest games of his career as he made five solo stops in the Plymouth backfield.

But the entire Flyer defense did an outstanding job in holding the Big Red backs to just 34 yards in offense for the game.

"The kids did just what they had to do to win. Our offense ran right at them and it almost ran at will. We had the game under control at all times and this allowed us to let the seniors work out there alone," a satisfied Hubans said after the game.

"This was certainly a good way to end it. Some of our younger kids got a chance to work in a couple of series and all in all I was more than satisfied with the teams performance," he added.

Willard Rushes For 300 Yards In Win

CRESTLINE — Willard closed out its 1973 football season with an impressive 26-6 independent decision over host Crestline Friday night. The win was the second in a row for the Crimson Flashes, and improved their season's mark to 4-6.

The Flashes exploded for 300 yards rushing and 56 passing, while limiting Crestline to just 135 yards.

Coach Bill Biggers' squad scored on its first try, as junior tailback Dana Shockley broke loose on a 25-yard run with 8:56 to go in the first period.

Sophomore tailback John Goodsite scored at the 9:19 mark of the second period on a five yard run. Senior fullback Dennis Snook ran the count to 20-0 with less than one minute before the half, running in from 11

yards out. Goodsite ran for the conversion.

After a scoreless third period, Goodsite notched his second TD of the game on a Trojan run with 10:41 left.

Crestline scored against the Willard second unit with 4:51 left in the game.

Snook led the Willard rushers with 106 yards on 10 carries, and Shockley and Goodsite combined for 156 yards on 21 attempts.

"It was a real good performance all the way around," said Biggers. "The defense played well, and the offense executed well. And we got a lot of people in the game."

"Dennis Snook had a good game, and so did our blocking back Mike Rice. And on defense, it was pretty much of a team effort."
