

New Philadelphia Routs Malabar Falcons, 34-7

State-ranked New Philadelphia made the most of its aerial game last night before 1,400 chilled fans at Arlin Field.

The Quakers, rated 10th in Ohio, completed only seven passes against Mansfield Malabar in a Cardinal Conference football game. How-

ever, three of them produced touchdowns in a 34-7 victory over the injury-depleted Falcons.

The first two completions in the opening period went for touchdowns and Malabar (1-4 and 2-5) never really was in the Parent's Night contest. Altogether, New

Philadelphia (4-0-0 and 6-0-1), hit on seven of 16 tosses for 140 yards as it moved into a tie for first place with Dover in the Cardinal league.

Malabar got on the scoreboard midway in the third quarter to cut the Quaker lead to 21-7. Sophomore Jim

Bagley went the final 18 yards in a burst up the middle as Malabar moved 58 yards in nine plays. The key came on a fourth-down punting situation when Punter Tom Evans ran 12 yards to the Quaker 41. Sophomore Brad Hahn set up the touchdown run by carrying 12 yards on a keeper to the 18.

Quarterback Les Freshwater passed 13 yards to Matt Incarnato to cap a seven-play 73-yard march to open the scoring then hit Ted Metcalf on a scoring 31 yarder four minutes later.

Casey Reeves returned a punt 58 yards for the third New Philadelphia score late in the first half.

Malabar stopped New Philadelphia drives on the five and the 21 in the third quarter but couldn't harness the Quakers in the fourth quarter.

The first of two fourth-quarter touchdowns came on a fake field goal attempt. Holder Jim Bird took the pass from center and lofted an aerial to Rick Denzer in the end zone for 23 yards.

The final score came after Dan Homan returned an intercepted pass 26 yards to the 13. On the fifth play Ken Stiffler went over from the two.

Bagley gained 88 yards and Bill Donaldson 89 for the Falcons while Jeff White picked up 88 and 210-pound fullback Phil Tidrick 78 for the Quakers.

Malabar's band show spotlighted a black-light number and a jitterbug routine to "At The Hop."

Blazers Edge Cavs, 131-129

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — Rookie Bill Walton won a standing ovation from a sellout crowd when he fouled out in the third overtime, but reserve center LaRue Martin was the hero in Portland's 131-129 victory over Cleveland in a National Basketball Assn. opener Friday night.

"LaRue Martin came on and just did a fantastic job for us, us," said Blazer player-coach Lenny Wilkens, who played 60 minutes himself in the four-overtime contest.

Walton hit only 39 per cent of his floor shots but scored 18 points and grabbed 24 rebounds in his professional debut. He picked up his first foul 15 seconds into the game.

Martin, Portland's slow-blooming No. 1 draft choice in 1972, got a hand on a tip-in that tied the game 129-129, finishing with 10 points and 11 crucial rebounds.

"Walton is a good player now and he will get much better," said Cleveland Coach Bill Fitch. "but Portland couldn't have won tonight without Martin. He has come a long way."

Wilkens, 37, was Portland's momentum with 15

points, 10 assists and seven steals. But he said he thinks the Blazers can play better basketball.

Portland struggled from a nine-point deficit in the third quarter to manage a 97-97 tie at the end of regulation play. Walton didn't show any jitters as he sank two free throws with six seconds on the clock to send the game into its first overtime.

Austin Carr, who scored 12 points in the overtime, topped all scorers with 34 points. Dick Snyder had 25 for Cleveland. Sidney Wicks and John Johnson finished with 29 each for the Blazers and Geoff Petrie had 24.
