Loudonville kept rolling last night in high school football, winning its sixth straight game to continue as the Johnny Appleseed Conference leader.

The Redbirds (4-0 and 6-0) blanked Ontario (2-1-1 and 3-2-1), 17-0. Clear Fork (3-0-1 and 4-1-1) stayed close with a 16-14 victory over Crestview (0-4 and 2-4).

Crestline (2-2 and 5-3) shut out Plymouth (0-4 and 1-4-1), 21-0 and Lexington (2-2 and 2-3-1) beated Fredericktown (2-2 and 2-4), 25-14.

Fredericktown couldn't stop the power running of Tim Milligan or the end-around sweeps by Al Martin and when Lexington wasn't running through the Freddiees, Ryan was lobbing his "bloopers" to wide-open ends. The Minutemen gained 233 net yards on the ground and threw for 166 more.

Milligan ran for two touchdowns and gained 135 yards in 22 carries, while Martin was zipping for 92 yards in 17 rushing attempts. Ryan connected on 11 of 14 passes for two touchdowns and in one span hit nine in a row.

Dave Moore was on the scoring end of both of Ryan's touchdown passes. The first came on the first play of the

The clincher was the 81-yard drive at the end of the first half. Lexington took the ball over following a punt on its own 19-yard line with 2:35 on the clock. Three running plays moved the ball 36 yards until Ryan went to the air and hit four in a row, including a 20 yarder to Andy Auer on third-and-16. Two plays later Moore made a sensational catch between two defenders in the end zone.

Fredericktown scored on two dandy passes from Dave Ramsey. The first touchdown came in the opening quarter to Dave Koelbl for 30 yards to initiate the game's scoring and the second one was a 45-yard fling to Doug Snell in the second quarter to give the Freddiees back the lead, 14-12.

The actual difference in the game was a first-period safety forced by Clear Fork's Tim Remy, who caught Osborne in the end zone. The other Colt score was a beautifully thrown 26-yard aerial from Mike Snyder to Rick Turner in the second period.

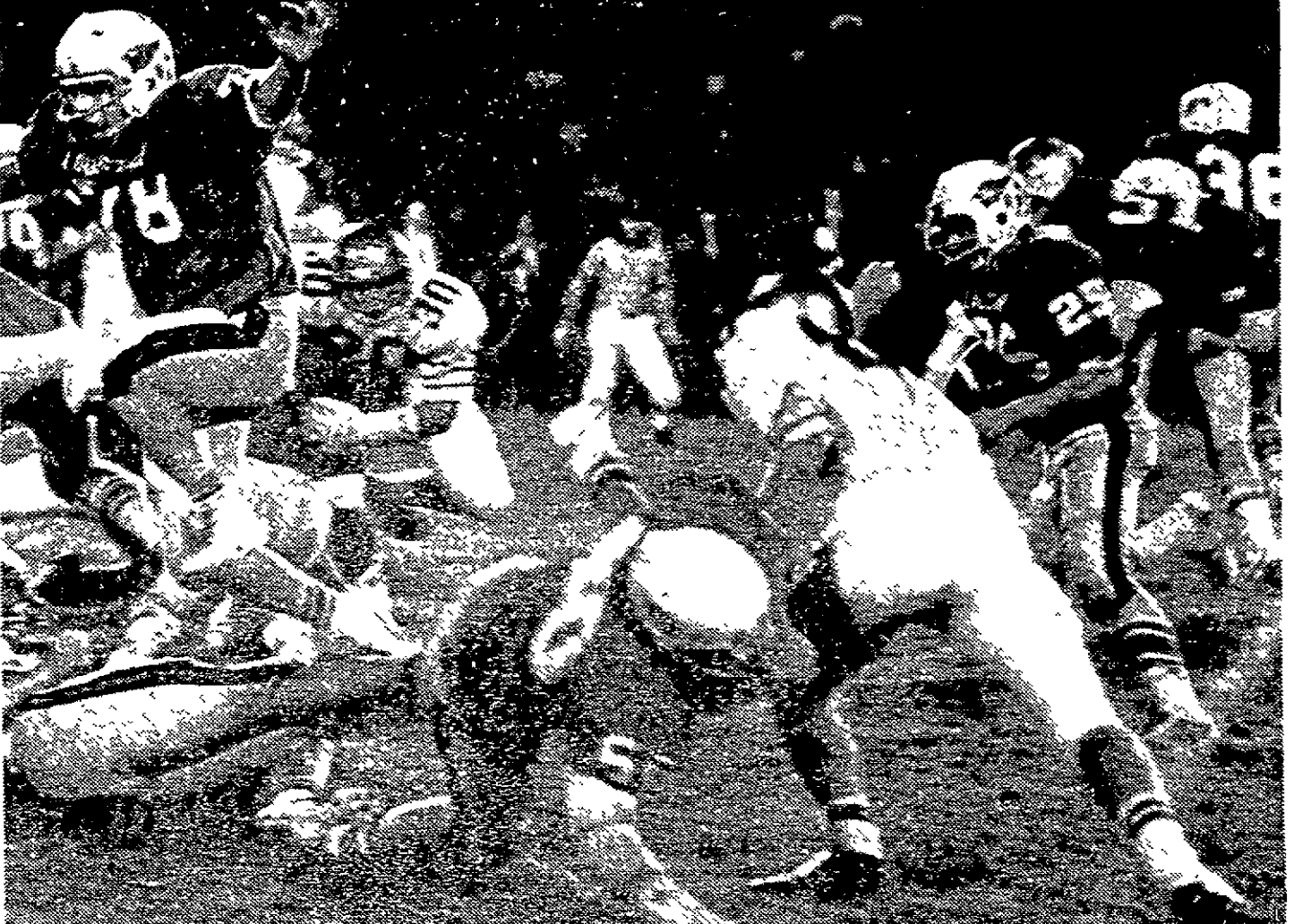
Herb Chatman claimed the Bulldogs' second touchdown when he scored on a 23-yard run with 2:46 showing on the clock in the second period.

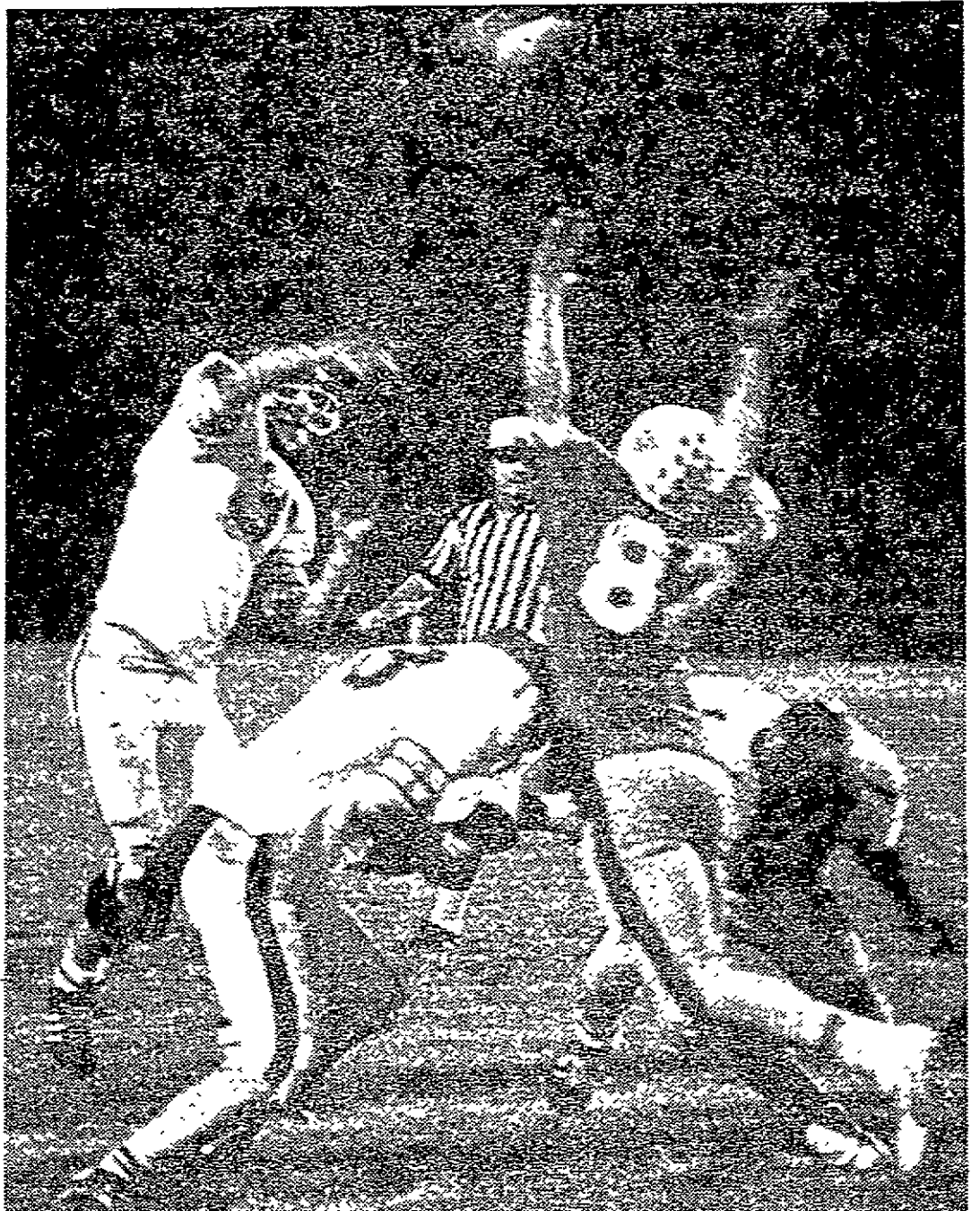
Plymouth, gaining only 33 yards on the ground and 72 on four pass completions, never threatened the Bulldogs' goal line.
