Butkus Charges Bears In Suit

CHICAGO (UPI) - Dick Butkus, former linebacker for the Chicago Bears football team, has filed a \$1.6 million suit in U.S. District Court charging the Bears with breach of contract.

Butkus has another \$1.6 million suit pending in Cook County Circuit Court.

The federal suit, filed late Thursday, claimed the Bears refused to pay Butkus his annual salary of \$115,000 for the remaining four years of his five-year contract. He was injured in November, 1973, and could no longer play. The contract was signed Jan. 13, 1973.

Rain, alternating between drizzle and torrent throughout, the game handicapped both COL powers. Upper Arlington turned to 197-pound Ben Tenuta and 195-pound Geoff Shaw and kept its attack on the ground. The Blue Devils, unable to run consistently against the mud and bigger Golden Bears' defenders, took to the air with Raymond-to-Martin the big

With a scoreless deadlock at halftime, the Blue Devils kicked off, electing to go against the wind in the third frame and then have the wind at their backs for the fourth quarter.
