## NL 'Flies' To First Win

Every member of the Firelands Conference has at least one victory at the halfway mark of the 1975 season.

New London became the last team to reach the victory column with a sensational come-from behind nod over Western Reserve to make homecoming a festive occasion.

The Wildcats produced more points in the first period (13) than they amassed in the first four games (8), but still had to come back to earn a 19-14 decision.

Western moved ahead at 14-13 with 10:31 left in the game, but New London roared back to forge ahead for good in 72 seconds.

On the second play after the kickoff, Rolly Schick retreated and fired the bomb to streaking end Brian Granneman who outraced the stunned Western Reserve secondary and grabbed Schick's well-thrown toss to complete a 60-yard scoring strike.



# Black River Has 'Extra' Punch In Halting Eagles

It will take an extraordinary matchup in the remaining four weeks of the Firelands Conference season to equal Black River's pulsating 21-20 victory over Monroeville Friday night in a head-on colli-

sion of unbeaten squads. It was a spellbinder from cover to cover, especially in the fourth chapter which eventually saw Monroeville's hopes for a perfect season end and a possible Firelands championship fade. The Eagles had won their first four games (two in

the FC) by shutouts. Slick quarterback Jim Young authored the victory for the hosts, who are now tied with Edison for sole possession of first place in the league with a 3-0 record.

Young clicked on 10 of 13 pass attempts for 119 yards, and although his effort did not outshine that of Monroeville's Mark Bores (seven of 12 for 161 yards and one touchdown), he made the key play time and again for coach Terry Forbes' Pirates.

The biggest of all the completions came with just under four minutes to play on Black River's winning touchdown drive. Young faced a second and 27 situation from his own 45 yard line, but calmly hit wingback Rod Rogers for 26 yards. The Pirates made the first down, proceeded to chalk up two more first downs and finally tallied the tying touchdown with just 50 seconds to go in the game.

In addition to his arm, Young used his toe to drive through three perfect extra point placement kicks and the final boot was the winning margin.

The Eagles' mentor complimented the Black River squad. "I would have to say they were a bigger, stronger, faster, quicker and better football team," he

Can anyone else in the conference beat Black River, Fornsaglio was asked "Just us," he muttered. "Just us."

The latter will have to be proven, but it was evident from the outset Friday night Black River is a strong, wellcoached ball club.

Monroeville gained just 81 yards on the ground, after averaging over 200 per game since the beginning of the year. Of

Behind Bores' passes of 13 and 28 yards to Schaffer and 13 yards to Tim Haughawout, and the best running of the night by Mark Hauler, Monroeville marched from its own 23 to paydirt on 16 plays. Hauler wedged into the endzone from a yard out on a fourth down play. Bores was sacked on the conversion attempt, but Monroeville led 12-7 with just 1:43 left in the third period.

Black River jetted right back into the lead. The Pirates drove from their 37 for the score with a 29-yard gallop by Rogers around left end and an 18-yard pass play from Young to tight end Dave Hamby the big ground gainers. Hartong again got the call on a short touchdown run.

Trailing 14-12, Monroeville got a big break with 8:12 left to play. Hauler fell on a Young fumble at the hosts' 36 yard line. Three running plays netted just five


