

It was this kind of a night at Arlin Field Friday.

- Mansfield Senior High School (0-4-1 and 1-6-1) and Sandusky (2-2-1 and (2-4-2) met in a Buckeye Conference football contest before 890 fans and neither team scored in 48 minutes.

-Sandusky fumbled nine times and recevered only four.

-Sandusky completed only one of eight passes for one yard and had one intercepted.

Mansfield fumbled five times and recovered only one.

-Mansfield Sophomore Tv Darson returned the second-half kickoff 88 yards into the Sandusky end zone, but a teammate was detected clipping on the 21 and the score was nullified.

-Mansfield got the ball on the Sandusky four on a fumble and Cliff Belmer looked as if he was going to score but fumbled the ball into the end zone and Sandusky recovered for a touchback.
