

Clear Fork Stops Mt. Gilead, 10-0

BELLVILLE — Doug Kelly of Clear Fork seemed to be the only football player completely unaffected by the heavy rains which pelted the Colts' season opener with Mt. Gilead here last night.

The 5-9, 185-pound senior quarterback did the job both on offense and defense as he led the Colts to a 10-0 victory between the raindrops.

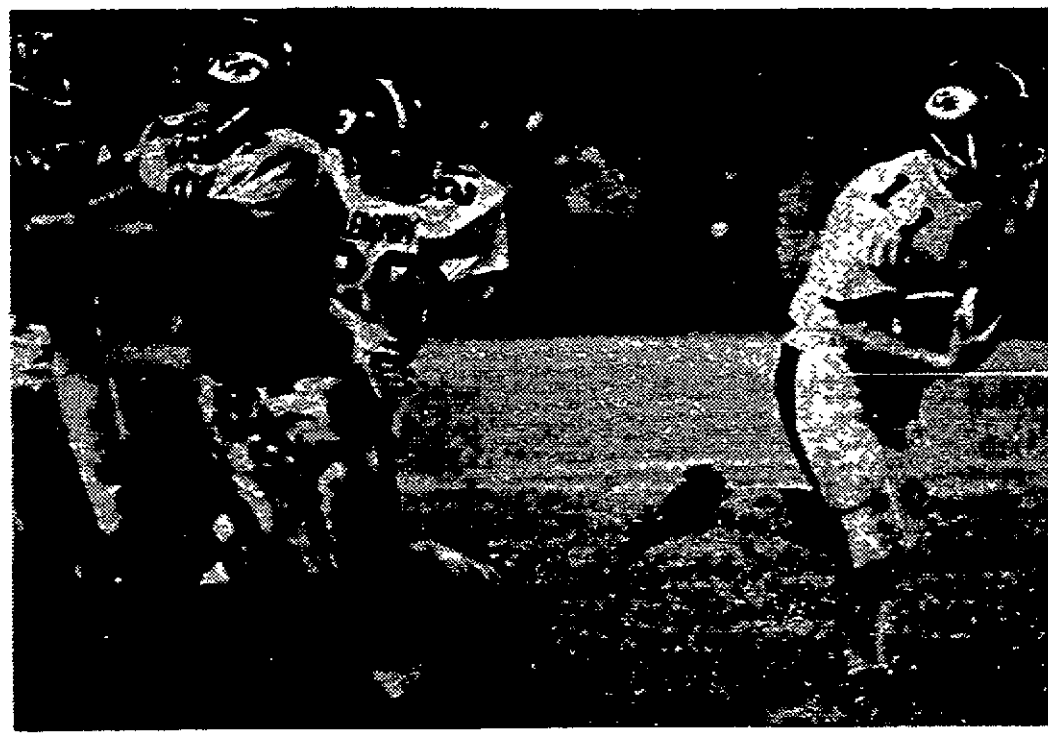
