scamper around left end. The six-pointer was set up by a fumble recovery by teammate Mike Gilliland on the Mt. Gilead 25-yard line.



Jamie McGraw, the leading scorer in the area last year with 98 points, left the game with an injured ankle, but not before he scored a six-pointer on a four-yard


