Sensational Plays Help WR Win

SOUTH AMHERST — The Western Reserve Roughriders used sensational plays to put two second quarter scores on the board and let their defense do the rest in a 14-0 opening season victory over South Amherst.
Defensive back Mark Strimpfel scored the first touchdown on a play that will be remembered for a long time, a 102-yard gallop of an intercepted pass. His teammates shouted at him to stay in the end zone, but the fleet-footed senior ignored them and dashed up the right sidelines. He slipped past tacklers at the 20 and again at midfield and outran two Cavaliers the rest of the way.
Senior halfback Lenny Dauch tacked on the extra point when he scurried around the left side on a counter play. The score came with 5:40 left in the half.
South Amherst, which gained most its yardage in the first quarter, fumbled on the second play after the ensuing kickoff. Senior Mike Chaffin jumped on the fumble and the Riders offense was back in motion 38 yards from paydirt.
Fullback Bill Schnell bulled for a first down to the

South Amherst 27. Then, on third and 11, Strimpfel passed to Dauch, running a post pattern. He was well covered but Cavalier Emil Ruth tipped the ball into the air, and Dauch picked it off in full stride and ran in for the second Western Reserve touchdown.
A right sweep to the right by halfback Steve McGuckin was short, holding the score at 14-0 with just over a minute left in the half.
The second half was a defensive battle as backs had trouble running in the mud.
South Amherst showed a good ground attack in the first period, moving to the Western four before Dan Dillon recovered a fumble and driving again until Strimpfel picked off the pass. But the Cavaliers got minus two yards on the ground and just 27 in the air in the second half.
Western's deepest penetration in the second half was to the South Amherst 16 midway through the final quarter.

Schnell paced the Riders on offense with 49 yards in 14 carries while running partner Bill Burras was called on

six times and responded with 32 yards.
Even Western Coach Ray Gontier called the touchdowns lucky.
"We did not win it with our offense, they gave us the ball game in two plays," he commented.
"The team that got the breaks was going to win this one. We happened to get them. I thought the defense did a fine job, especially tackle Jeff Emerick and defensive back Mark Strimpfel. But I am really disappointed in the offense. We had chances but we just lacked consistency," the second year mentor added.
The Roughriders travel to Sandusky St. Mary next Saturday night.

NL Loses

NEW LONDON — The 1975 football season has gotten off to a rocky start for New London.
The Wildcats dropped all three pre-season scrimmages by a composite score of 10 touchdowns to two. Coach Paul Nestor felt the players weren't adapting to a new split formation offense and "44" defense, so he held extra practices this week in preparation for Friday night's home season opener against tough Smithville.
The practices didn't appear to do much good as New London lost 32-0.

A dejected Nestor said he may scrap the new formation and return to the "I" formation and "50" defense of other years.
"We're going to have to make some adjustments, we'll have to make a decision," Nestor said. The New London coach said he would meet with his assistant coaches early next week to discuss the Wildcats' problems. He hinted that there could be several changes in starting personnel.
While Smithville, a favorite to take the Wayne County League, was rolling up 257 total yards, New London was eeking out 62.
Running backs Brad Potts and Dale Myers picked up most of the yardage, gaining 34 yards between them in 13 carries. Quarterback Roland Schick, under heavy pressure, completed one pass for 20

Paul Brown Turns 67

CINCINNATI (UPI) — Cincinnati Bengals head coach and general manager Paul Brown will be 67 years old Sunday but he won't use the birthday to look back on his 40 years of coaching.

"I take no interest and satisfaction in records and things that are behind me," he said when asked to reflect on the past. "I'm too busy and wrapped up in what I'm doing."

"This is a busy time of the year with difficult decisions to be made. It's the time of the year when we have as our objective to put together the best possible football team we can."

Brown, whose Bengals play the Detroit Lions in an exhibition game in Detroit today, declared, "I don't dwell on the past."

"I'm too consumed by what's going on. At my stage of life, things don't bother me. I've lived fully.
"I've had a very pleasant life. I never have felt that I was working. I can think back on games that I'd like to have won, that might have been won. But I can also look to the ones where we got lucky and won when we shouldn't have."
Brown's coaching record, from prep school to the pros, is 342-133-16.

Lamoreaux Stars As SC Ties 8-8

GREENWICH — Frank Lamoreaux sat out practices this week with a shoulder injury, but when game time rolled around Friday night he was ready.
"He could have played with anybody tonight," claimed South Central Coach Bud Ratliff.

Lamoreaux's performances on offense and defense helped the Trojans to tie visiting Plymouth 8-8 in a muddy football opener.

"They were bigger," Ratliff said of Plymouth, "and the field conditions slowed us down. I've got kids 150, 145 pounds playing on the line, and they were just too big for us to stop."

Plymouth scored its only touchdown in the first quarter when Brad Turson rammied in from the two-yard line. Turson also ran for the two-point conversion.

The two teams battled scorelessly for the next two quarters, setting up Lamoreaux's closing heroics. With 6:43 left the senior letterman scored from four yards out; then ran in the crucial conversion to tie the game.

Schaffer & Co. Pace 21-0 Eagles Win

LAKESIDE — A 5-5 basketball player who decided to give football a whirl in his senior year, a two-way end who wears "00" on his uniform, and a quarterback with a broken arm were instrumental in Monroeville's 21-0 whitewashing of Danbury-Lakeside in its season opener Friday.

Halfback Gary Schaffer (the basketball player) dashed 10 yards in the first quarter for Monroeville's first score, and led all runners with 115 yards in nine carries in his first varsity game.

Ken Leber, who wears "00" in emulation of the Oakland Raiders great Jim Otto, scored Monroeville's two other touchdowns on pass receptions.

The two-year letterman hauled in a 36-yard pass from Dan Bores (the quarterback with the broken arm) in the third quarter, then took a nine yard pass from Darrel Stein in the final quarter. Tim Haughawout kicked all three points for the Eagles.

Bores, wearing a cast to protect his fractured throwing arm, completed four of 11 passes for 101 yards before leaving the game in the second half. He was shaken up by a tackle and was removed as a precautionary step.

Junior Darrel Stein stepped in and completed both of his pass attempts for 19 yards.

"It wasn't the real Mark Bores, his timing was off...but he's coming along," said a satisfied but unsurprised coach Sam Fornasaglio, who expected his team to win easily.

"We were much quicker and that was the difference. They were much stronger, but we pounded them all night," he said.

Fornasaglio praised the work of his offensive linemen — center Randy Zipfel, guards Ken Schafer and Chris Ackerman and tackles Tim Jump and Kevin Miller. "They played pretty error-free," he noted.

Schafer, middle guard Mark Hauler and linebackers Glenn Opper, Tom Smith and Jeff Jones won their coach's plaudits for defensive work. Hauler also played fullback, gaining 40 yards in seven tries. Smith suffered a hip pointer in the second quarter and was hospitalized for x-rays. The injury appeared minor, but a final diagnosis probably won't be made until Sunday.

Kelly Jones picked up 44 yards in 12 carries for the Eagles. Gary Twarek paced the Lakers with 45 yards rushing. Monroeville limited quarterbacks Jerry Turniskey and Joe Piechocki to four completions in 13 tries for 25 yards.
