

# Ticket Exchanges 'Common' at OSU

EAST LANSING, Mich. (AP) - A former Ohio State University All-American fullback confirmed that Buckeye football players exchanged their season tickets for cash and may have used the money to buy cars, the Michigan State University newspaper reported today.

Harold (Champ) Henson told the State News, "That sort of thing (exchanging season tickets for cash) goes on everywhere, including Ohio State,"

Henson, who played fullback for Woody Hayes' team during the 1972-74 seasons, is the third former Buckeye to corroborate the exchange of OSU tickets for cash.

Earlier, Tim Fox and Rick Middleton, two ex-Ohio State players now in the National Football League, revealed the practice had occurred during their careers at OSU. Such an exchange is a violation of NCAA rules.

OSU Coach Woody Hayes admitted recently such ticket trading may sometimes have occurred.

Henson told the State News, "I never sold my tickels because I have a large family and they always use them, but I know that other guys did it. It goes on everywaere.

Henson declined to identify the Ohio State players who sold their tickets. But he did say "some guys sold their tickets to businessmen in Columbus, but I never got close to those people (the businessmen). You know, they take their six tickets, for example, and work something out with those people. How much they got. I don't know."

Fox, quoted earlier in a copyrighted article in the Oklahoma Journal in Oklahoma City, said, "A lot of players will dealer for a car."

Henson could not substantiate if the players were exchanging their tickets for cars, but he did say "Yeah, some players like Corny Greene and Pete Johnson had a new car every year, but I don't know where they got the money

Fox, meanwhile, had also been quoted. as saying "in fact, some of the assistant coaches there (at Ohio State) were doing that (selling tickets in exchange for a car)."

Henson could not recall that hap-pening while he was at OSU. However, the State News has a receipt from a Columbus car dealer which shows that in 1973, an assistant football coach leased a new automobile for 12 months at no cost.

Attempts to discover if the coach had exchanged tickets for the car proved futile. A season book of tickets can be worth \$150 to \$180 at face value. OSU ticket director Bob Ries empha-

sized that "we follow the rules to the letter. Each player is allotted so many tickets and then he designates who is to pick them up. Only the person chosen by the play-

er," Ries continued, "is allowed to pick up the tickets. We have each person sign when they pick them up." Ries also stated that the university

keeps a record of all such transactions. but he refused to allow the State News to examine them, "unless orders came

CHICAGO (UPI) - The Illinois Racing Board has voted to investigate mes-senger betting services in the Chicago area to see if they have links with organized crime or are cheating the players.

We've invited the public to come in and tell us what their experiences have been," Board Chairman Anthony Scariano said.

Board Secretary William Masterson said as of Oct. 15 there were 80 messerger services in Chicago and some citizens who placed bets with them have complained they are not being paid off when they win.

Most messenger services are storefront operations that carry bets from individuals to Illinois racetracks for a

Besides deciding to investigate messenger operations, the Racing Board voted to ask the Illinois General Assembly to make a similar probe. And the board asked Illinois Attorney General William Scott for a legal opinion on whether it has power to regulate messenger operations. Board members said they will at-

tempt to determine who owns messenger services, how much money they handle, whether they're linked to organized crime and whether customers are being cheated.
