

Tiffin Calvert Wins 21-16

Turnovers Haunt Willard

WILLARD — The Willard Crimson Flashes found out Friday night that a ball game is not won or lost in the final 129 seconds. Fumbling the ball eight times prior to this was enough leverage for Tiffin Calvert to build a 21-0 lead and then hold on to spoil coach Don Graham's debut, 21-16.

Graham shouldered some of the blame for the defeat. "I tried to instill into the kids that this was the one they had to win to turn it around right now. They were real tight in that first half and this could have been the reason."

The Flashes had no offense in the first half. The Senecas dominated the line of scrimmage allowing the host team one first down and a meager 10 yards rushing.

Meanwhile, the Senecas were jumping on Willard miscues like gangbusters, scoring two first quarter touchdowns.

Tailback Tim Stultz, the workhorse of the Tiffin backfield, picked up both scores. He opened the scoring with a four yard sweep around the left side with 7:10 left in the period. This score capped a 28-yard drive. The Senecas got the ball in this position when Willard fumbled the opening kickoff and later faced a fourth down situation on their own seven. Then if times weren't tough enough, the Flashes were called for a face mask violation on the second play so actually all Seneca had to negotiate on their own was 15 yards, a fete it accomplished in five plays. Paul Weott tacked on the extra point to make it 7-0.

Two possessions later, Willard coughed up the ball on its own 30 with Calvert tackle, Russ Foxx, jumping on the pigskin. Stultz swept right for 12 on the first play and then blocked for fullback Tom Cool on the next two as the ball went to the eight. Stultz got the call again, sweeping right and getting a foot into the corner of the end zone. Weott converted and the score was 14-0 with 2:20 remaining in the first period.

Willard's only serious threat in the first half came on its last possession. Quarterback Mike Rosso fired strikes during the drive, but the only one held for any substantial yardage was the 22-yarder to Bob Secor. It was all in vain though as Tiffin ran out the clock from its own 35.

The Senecas opened the third quarter with a bang, a 65-yard jaunt by flanker Larry Reamer on the first play. This one came back due to a penalty, but the Senecas were to

pound what proved to be the final nail in the Flashes' coffin on their next possession. This time they drove 79 yards in 13 plays with Cool doing most of the hard work until junior quarterback Bob Zahn got outside the Flashes right end on a sweep for the final seven yards. Just 51 seconds remained in the third quarter when Weott drilled his extra point making it 21-0.

For the next six minutes it took a corps of statisticians just to keep track of the ball. Fumbles and pass interceptions were the name of the game until Willard was finally pointed toward the Seneca end zone.

Rosso got the first score when he fielded a Seneca punt and, running behind the forming screen on the left sideline, needed only a sidestep one Calvert tackler to complete a 66-yard run. He then rolled left and drilled a pass into the midsection of wide receiver Mark Hinebaugh for the extra points with 2:09 left in the game.

An onside kick was a failure, but the Willard defense forced a Calvert punt and with 26 seconds remaining, the Flashes offense was back on. Rosso had no choice but to go upstairs right away. He found Secor 25 yards deep in the secondary with a perfect strike. Secor then won the footrace to the end zone to complete a 62-yard scoring play. Just eight ticks were left on the clock when Curt Goodsite took the quick pitch from Rosso and slammed over the right side for the extra points.

Another onside kick failed, and the ball was never snapped again.

"Too many turnovers," Graham moaned, "but we will be all right. This ball club is going to improve. No team can win with a performance like we showed in the first half."

"No, a team can learn through losses as well as wins. This just did not happen to be our night," Graham ended.

Minoso Returns

CHICAGO (UPI) — Minnie Minoso, a Chicago White Sox coach, Friday was activated as a player and Saturday he should become the third oldest man ever to play in a major league game as well as the fifth player whose major league career spans four decades.

White Sox Manager Paul

Richards planned to start Minoso as the designated hitter Saturday against the California Angels and pitcher Frank Tanana. Minoso, a spry 53, made his first big league appearance in 1949 with Cleveland.

Minoso's appearance in the lineup will be his first since July 5, 1964.

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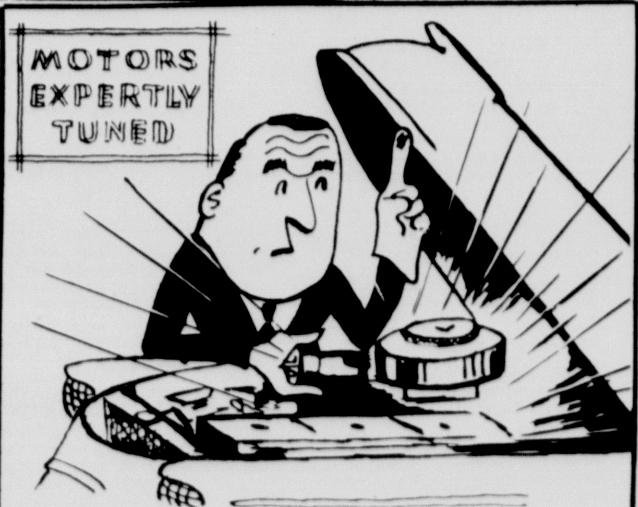
