Bellevue Takes 'Air' Out Of Port Clinton

Two touchdowns in 27 seconds carried Bellevue to a stunning 26-12

victory over highly-touted Port Clinton Friday night. The hosts, in fact, exploded for 19 points in two minutes and 38 seconds of the last quarter . . . all on pass plays.

Two of the touchdowns were on pass interceptions.

The titanic battle was a defensive duel for 42 minutes.

It was all Bellevue for the next 21/2 minutes as the points almost went up before the official scorer had a chance to press the button to put them on

The first touchdown aerial came when halfback Dave Ball arched a 33yard scoring strike to 145-pound halfback Frank Schmitz with 5:34 left in the game and Bellevue holding a slim 7-6 lead. Ball kicked the extra point and the hosts were suddenly on top by a 14-6 margin.

On the second play after the kickoff, Ball stepped in front of Port Clinton's intended receiver and plucked a pass thrown by Doyle McDonald out of the air and scampered 25 yards to paydirt. The score came with 5:07 still left in the wild period and the count was suddenly 20-6.

Bellevue wasn't finished. Schmitz came back to get his second score, this time while playing de-

fense. He raced 64 yards with another Port Clinton pass and Bellevue's lead soared to 26-6 with 2:56 left in the game.

Port Clinton, which has high hopes for a big season, faintly connected 50 seconds later as McDonald hurled a 47-yard toss to Jeff Scott with 2:06

Bellevue, the defending Northern Ohio League champion, relied heavi-

ly on a sophomore, Gary Haynes. Coach Terry Adams remarked before the season he had high hopes for

the 175-pounder, and Haynes came through in his first test in flying colors. All Haynes did for openers was rambled for 158 yards in 15 carries and put the first points of the season on the board. He dashed 40 yards mid

through the first period for a touchdown with 6:50 to go. Ball kicked the

PAT for a 7-0 lead. Held scoreless the first half. Port Clinton struck paydirt on fullback Dennis Dodge's one-yard run with 2:05 left in the third canto. The kick at-

tempted failed and the Redskins were down by a point, 7-6. Bellevue's defense was superb, holding Port Clinton to 62 yards rushing and although the visitors had 100 yards in the air, the Redmen came up with five interceptions which was more than the losers completed. McDonald managed only four of 20.

With Haynes slanting every which way. Bellevue amassed 220 yards on the ground and added 73 in the air.

The hosts were penalized $\,$ 14 times for a whopping 138 yards.

Monroeville 32, Seneca East 7
