WILLARD - Daniel Boone or Davey Crocket couldn't have done it any better.

Friday night Mark Miller ran the gamut time and again past a hoard of blood-in-the-eye Redmen, determined to bring him to the turf, to lead Willard High School (2-4) to a 14-6 Northern Ohio League upset victory over Bucyrus High School (2-4).

Only an hour before the game, a physician examined the 170-pound halfback's badly bruised thigh and pronounced him able to play in the contest. Miller proceeded to shred the Bucyrus line for 182 yards, a season high for the Crimson Flash sophomore.

While Miller triggered the offense, the crimson-shirted Willard defensive line must have appeared to be a brick wall to the attacking Redmen, not bending to allow a score until victory was out of reach. Blanket coverage by the Flash secondary resulted in Bucyrus pass whiz Joe Teynor having his worst aerial game of the season, comPleting only two of eight spirals for a sub-par 26 yards.

Before a standing room only Parent's Night crowd, the Flashes scored the first time they got their hands on the ball. The 65-yard drive halted only when Miller crashed into the end zone with seven minutes still left in the first quar-

While a hundred or so parents in the crowd boasted "That's my boy," the Flashes continued to dominate the first half of the game.


