Phils Blame Umpire For Stunning Defeat

PHILADELPHIA (UPI) — A smile of Christian charity was on Manny Mota's face and that automatically assured the Los Angeles Dodgers everything was going to turn out all right, although there were two out and two strikes on their 39year-old pinch-hitter in the top of the ninth inning.

"When he turned around and smiled the way he did, I knew he was going to hit one for us," said Dodger second baseman Davey Lopes, who was kneel-ing in the on-deck circle at the time with the Dodgers trailing the Phillies 5-3 in Friday's playoff contest.

"I've seen him do the same thing seven or eight times before," Lopes added. "Every time he does that, he comes through with a base hit. It's as if he's saying to me, 'I'm going to do my job, make sure you do yours.'

Mota, the ageless Dominican who collected 14 pinch hits in 36 times up for a .389 average this season, did his job so spectacularly Friday that the Dodgers

Manager Tommy Lasorda said to Mota. 'You're hitting.'

That was the extent of Lasorda's instruction. He didn't have to say any more. Mota, with 20 years professional baseball experience behind him, knew what he had to do. Garber got his first pitch over for a strike and Mota swung at his second delivery, a slider on the inside, and missed for strike two.

That's when Mota turned around and smiled. Lopes saw that smile and so did all the players on the Dodgers' bench.

"I was just trying to tell them I was relaxed," explained Mota later. "I had tried to hit a home run on my second swing but now I knew I was going to have to protect the plate."

In came Garber's next pitch and out it went when Mota swung and drove it toward the left field fence. Greg Luzinski, the Phillies' left-fielder, threw himself up against the fence, tying to keep the ball from going over it and he did. The ball hit his glove, then the fence, then his chest and before he could get a handle on it, Davalillo had come all the way around with the Dodgers' third run and Mota, credited with a double, legged it all the way to third when Phillies' second baseman Ted Sizemore let the relay get past him.

Unquestionably it was Mota's dramatic pinch double which fueled the Dodgers' three-run rally that powered them to their 6-5 victory. Mota had done his job and now it was up to Lopes, who sent Mota across when he was safe at first on a close play after he beat out an infield hopper that bounced off the heel of third baseman Mike Schmidt's glove.
That tied the score at 5-5 and, after

Lopes moved up on an error, Bill Russell singled home the winner.

Lasorda, who has put in 32 years in organized baseball, said he "never saw a finish like this one.

"I'm never too surprised at what Manny does for us," said the Dodger manager. "I've seen him do it so many times for us before."

Mota, already signed by the Dodgers for next year, when he'll be 40, credited Jim Gilliam, one of the Dodgers' coaches, with helping him come up with Friday's clutch hit.



But Leonard got Willie Randolph on a groundout to short to end the inning. New York's only other run came in the ninth on a double by Roy White and an error by Kansas City first baseman John Mayberry.

"That may be the best game he's pitched all year," said Royals catcher Dar-rell Porter. "He mixed his pitches up real well. He had really good stuff from the start."

'He was throwing real easy out there," said Kansas City manager Whitey Herzog. "He had good life to his pitches. Any time he's not trying to overthrow he does a good job.

"It was one of his best games this year but I wouldn't say it was his best. He beat them 5-1 the last time he faced them."

Leonard finished second in the AL in strikeouts with 244 but said he was not that concerned with striking out Yankee batters Friday night. "I didn't need to strike them out," said

Leonard. "I wasn't looking for the strikeouts. We had really good defense and I just wanted to keep the ball in play. They got me six runs and I didn't want them to slip away."

Leonard downplayed the fact he was born in New York, saying it was no great

thrill beating the Yankees. He admitted he was not a life-long fan of the Yankees, although he once rooted for them.

"I was a front-runner," said Leonard. who now resides in Sarasota, Fla. "I lik**ed the Yankees when they were winning** but when they started going bad I switched over to the Mets."


Plymouth Absorbs 1st Loss
