Fatal Blocked Punt Spurns Margaretta's Upset Hopes

CASTALIA - Margaretta stamped the victory letter, sealed the envelope and shoved it down Fremont St. Joe's throat Friday

But somebody forgot the zip code. After doing commanding the Sandusky Bay Conference football battle, the Polar Bears watched their fourth quarter punt attempt backfire and their hard-fought 3-0 lead vanish into a 6-3 defeat.

"The team with the fewest mistakes wins," Margaretta coach Tony Kijanko shrugged. "We shut off their offense and then gave them the ball on our 3-yard line. They had a good back and four tries from there. Five out of every 10 times, he's going to make it.'

With 6:39 remaining, Polar Bear Barry Geiger went back to punt, standing near his own 20-yard line. Three blockers were bunched together in front of him. But Fremont's Rich Ackerman barreled through - untouched - and blocked the punt.

Ackerman tracked down the ball at Margaretta's 10-yard line and was tackled by Geiger on the three. From there, standout halfback Jeff Gottron, the game's leading ball carrier with 20 carries and 110 yards, ran over right tackle for the winning touchdown.

"We've got to keep our heads up," reasoned Kijanko, whose team could very well be leading the SBC without the misfortune on the punt. "Our kids played a good game. They put everything into it.'

Margaretta, with its rugby-style, bowl-em-over offense, did everything but push the Crimson Streaks into Cold Creek during the first half.

The Bears, in their tight-T forma- but on third-and-eight, quarterback tion, rolled up 182 yards rushing on 33 carries and 14 first downs in the game's first 24 minutes. They controlled the ball 15 minutes. Deroy

Knowlton had 85 yards in 12 tries. But the hosts scored just three points, on a Mark Bodey 23-yard field goal with 6:36 left in the half.

Margaretta, stalling on the Fremont 13, 5 and 9-yard lines, hit only one of three field goal tries for a 3-0 halftime lead.

"We keep knocking on the door, but can't take it in," Kijanko said. "Every time we getting going on offense, an offside or motion penalty sets us back.'

The Polar Bears were riddled with 10 penalties for 81 yards, but

pigskin to the F-32 with 3:25 left in the game.

But then an illegal motion penalty set back the Polar Bears, now 2-1-1 overall and 1-1 in the SBC.

Pfeil got the ball back to the F-30,

Bob Day was sacked for an 18-yard loss. A desperation screen pass fell incomplete and an upset bid fizzled.

St. Joe remained unbeaten at 4-0 and alone atop the league with a 2-0

Perdue ran for 136 yards - 120 of them in the first half — and scored two touchdowns in Huron's 30-6 win over Clyde.

What started out to be a nip-andtuck game opened up considerably in the second quarter, thanks to Perdue's running and the hosts'

Both teams traded field goals early, the Fliers' being a booming 47yarder by Mark Rosenberger. Then Huron took a 10-3 first quarter lead on Perdue's first touchdown.

Rosenberger hit a 41-yard field goal to narrow the gap to 10-6, but Huron had enough. No more time was wasted.

Less than two minutes later, Perdue swept left end for 22 yards and his second score. The Tiger defense, which held Clyde to negative yards rushing, closed down the Flier offense for the evening.

Meanwhile, the Tiger offense went 68 yards on its next series, aided by a 29-yard Perdue run and a 29yard pass from John Kenning to Rick Langhals. Tony Munafo Jr. capped the drive with a 1-yard scoring plunge. The Tigers led 23-6 at


